Inconsistency of Merchants.

From The Ledger, Attica, Ind.
MAIL ORDER ARTICLE NO. 2

For a long time the Ledger has printed many articles to enlighten the trade by showing the inconsistency and misrepresentations of the mail order house, says the editor of the Attica (Ind) Ledger. We have given the subject much thought and the more we study the matter the more we are convinced that it is cheaper to buy at home than to patronize the big city dealers. And as we study the matter more we grow more enthusiastic in the work. But candor compels the statement that we do not have the sincere support of every merchant. True, there is not one that does not say that we are right in our position. And so we have the moral support of all. But it takes more than opinions to pay the force that helps us get out the paper. In a number of instances we have noticed that those who say that our articles will do much good for the Attica trade, have not helped us in our struggle to support the city. Their advertisements have not yet been noted as an evidence of their material endorsement of our effort.

The mail order house knows the value of newspaper space, and they believe in advertising in newspapers. They consider circulars and catalogues, effective as they are, as sufficient for their purposes. These houses surely ought to know, as their very life depends upon the use they make of advertising.

Some of Attica's merchants are inconsistent; they insist that the Ledger and the Press and the Democrat boom the city as a trading point at the expense of the papers alone; they do not give the paper even the narrow margin of profit there is in a small advertisement. The first thing they should do is to give their moral and material support to the newspapers, the institutions that always represent the best interest of the city and constantly cooperate with the merchant in his effort to fight the battles of trade-winning.

The Ledger is sincere when it says that it believes in Attica as a good place to trade. It is an act of justice to buyer and seller as well, to persuade men and women to buy here: for we believe that it is advantageous to both. Hence we do not hesitate to do our part and to say that we are doing it. What we want is for the merchant to realize that it must not be a battle fought by us alone. We want your help—justice demands that the merchant should support us by their

advertising. We want to awaken the merchant of Attica who are asleep at the post of their duty while the outside advertiser is getting the results that belongs to them. Their competitors are getting matter into the very home of Attica people, and the merchant sit on the counters of their stores and wonder why the business is getting away from them.

One of the leading business men of Attica said to the Ledger that he would at any time duplicate the price that any house makes on his line of goods. This offer has been made for years by another of Attica's leading merchants. Yet they have not said that any one has availed himself of the offer.

Our work takes us into the stores of the city almost every day and we know that the stocks are well selected and are fresh, and the prices, as we have been saying, are as reasonable as one can find. More than this, nearly every merchant backs up his goods by his personal guarantee, and this in itself is more than the mail order houses do.

There are a few merchants in Attica that are building up and holding trade for the entire city. They advertise their inducements and bring the people to the city, and in some instances the non-advertiser reaps part of the benefit.

The Ledger is willing to do any thing that is fair to the buyer to help the local merchant, but we feel sure that the way to get and hold trade is to get your advertisement in the local paper—then trade at home yourself. We know the business men of the city who are inconsistent and we appeal to them to get right themselves before they do attempt any missionary work. Little personal grievances must be laid aside and success must be obtained by persistent, patient, persevering, pushing cooperation.

Gov. Folk on Mail Order Houses.

Addressing a meeting of retail merchants in Jefferson City a few days ago Governor Folk, of Missouri, said: "We are proud of our splendid cities, and we want to increase in wealth and population and we also want our country towns to grow. We wish the city merchants to build up, but we also desire the country merchants to prosper. I do not believe in the mail-order citizen. If a place is good enough for a man to live in and make his money in it's good enough for him to spend his money in. No merchant can

succeed without advertising in one way or another. Patronize your own town papers, build them up, and they will build the town up in increased, trade and greater opportunities. Do not be afraid that business is going to be hurt by the recent exposure of wrong-doing in the commercial world."

TABLE DELICACIES.

APPETIZING AND EASILY PREPARED DISHES.

For Luncheon on a Busy Day—Two Extremely Popular Sandwiches—Sparkling Lemonade a Delicious Beverage.

Luncheon Dish for a Busy Day.—Take three cups of good, well-seasoned tomato sauce thickened with a heaping teaspoonful of flour rubbed into one of butter, and keep it hot in a saucepan set at the side of the stove. Toast slices of bread, butter them, and spread them on a dish, putting a tablespoonful of tomato sauce on each. Into the remainder of the tomato sauce turn two cupfuls of minced mutton, and put the saucepan over the fire. Stir the mixture until the meat is thoroughly heated, season it to taste, and pour it upon the toast.

Potato Luncheon Biscuits.—Boil eight potatoes and mash them smoothly with a little milk, and beat into them two tablespoonfuls of melted butter, eight tablespoonfuls of flour, two of grated cheese, one teaspoonful of baking powder sifted twice with the flour, half a teaspoonful of salt and just a suspicion of cayenne. Mix these ingredients into a light dough, with one tablespoonful of cream and the yolk of an egg, and roll it out half an inch thick; then cut it into rounds, and brush it over with the beaten white of an egg. Bake these in a quick oven, split them open while they are hot, and serve them at once. They will also be found useful for afternoon tea.

Salmon and Cucumber Sandwiches.—Cut rounds of bread slightly larger than the slice of cucumber, and spread them with butter and sprinkle the under sides with a few grains of celery salt, then spread them with a layer of chopped and pounded salmon. Next add a few drops of vinegar and a little white pepper, then a thin slice of cucumber and the top round of bread. Garnish the dish with a few slices of cucumber or crisp lettuce leaves.

Egg and Cress Sandwiches.—Rub several hard boiled eggs through a sieve and season them with salt, pepper and lemon juice, and mix them well together with butter to a rich paste. Spread white or brown bread evenly buttered rather generously with this mixture, then sprinkle one-half with plenty of finely-chopped fresh cress, and press the pieces together.

Lamb's Tail Soup.—Cut six lamb's tails into joints, and boil them till tender in some weak stock, with a slice of raw ham or a ham bone. Season with a little onion, parsley, a bay leaf, a blade of mace and a few mushrooms. Simmer slowly for four hours, and then strain through a cloth. Thicken the soup with flour, add salt and cayenne and white wine to taste. Boll up, add the pieces of tail, and serve.

To Make Sparkling Lemonade.—Some people prefer the effervescence of the lemon squash beverage, and often soda water runs short. Sparkling lemonade may, however, be made, with the addition of bicarbonate of soda. Take half a teaspoonful of the powder, and dissolve it in a glass of water, adding a little sugar; then, having squeezed out the juice of a lemon, add it to this, and a very active sparkling beverage will result.

Teach Child Gospel of Work.—A liberal amount of work sprinkled through a child's leisure is decidedly wholesome. Activity is a necessity to children's growth and it might as well be put to practical use.

Let it not be inferred that heavy tasks should be put upon weak shoulders, that a man's work should be exacted from a growing boy, but that steps should be saved for a mother who needs leisure and that the little attentions which all women prize should be given her according to the age of those who should give them—Exchange.

Common Sense Cold Cures.—Look out for the coming of colds. Several common-sense dealings may ward away the microbe. Bathe the feet in hot water and drink a pint of hot lemonade. Then sponge with salt water and remain in a warm room. Or, bathe the face in hot water every five minutes for an hour. Or, sniff up the nostrils hot salt water every three hours. Or, inhale ammonia or menthol. Or, take four hours' active exercise in the open air. Sixthly, 24 hours in bed is said to be able to break up the severest cold.

A Pineapple Dessert.—Shred fresh pineapple and sprinkle with sugar, or cut canned sliced pineapple in small pieces; if one does not object to the use of alcohol, flavor with orange curacao or any cordial, cover and let stand one hour, says Fannie Merritt Farmer, in Woman's Home Companion. Put a small quantity of the prepared fruit in each glass, cover with vanilla ice cream and garnish with candied cherries, candied pineapple and angelica; set on fancy plates covered with doilies.

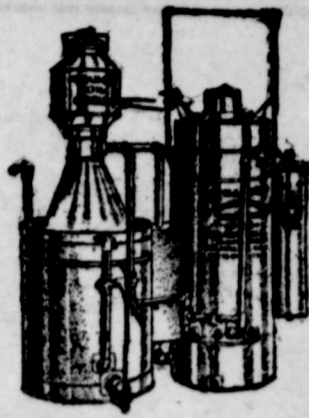

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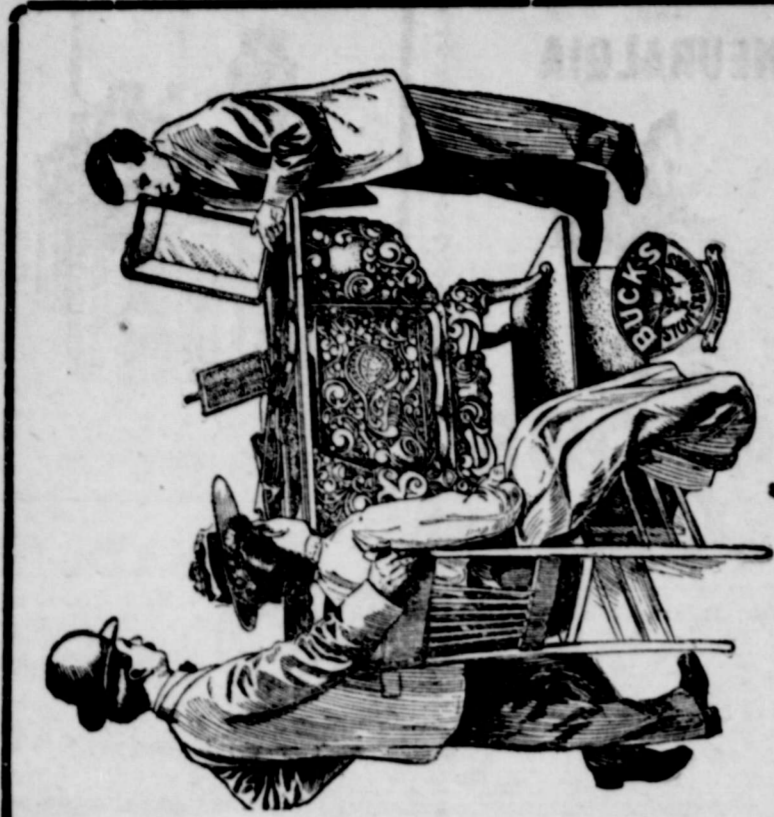
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
