

HOME GROWN CELERY. How It May Be Stored for Winter Use.

We take a long box about 14 inches wide and the same in depth and raise it one or two inches above the cellar bottom. Put a layer of earth about two inches deep in the box. We now lift the celery plants from their ridges in the garden with a crowbar, taking pains to drive the bar well down under the roots and keeping on them as much of the soil as we can, explains a writer in Farm and Home. As the plants are taken up they are set into a large basket to be carried down cellar. They are now ready for packing. Beginning at one end of the narrow box we stand the plants on end close together so that there shall be as little space between the stalks as possible. When a

in close to the roots with earth from the garden and proceed in this way until the box is full. A blanket of old bran sacks is thrown over the whole to shut out the light and help to blanch any stalks that have not already been whitened. Stored in this way we keep celery nice and crisp until February.

After trying several methods of storing celery, I find that it keeps best in the ground where it is grown, with the roots undisturbed, says another grower. Celery will keep in a cellar or cave all winter, if the roots are placed in moist sand or earth, of corn in such a manner as to minibut the plant gradually loses its fine, nutty flavor.

GROWING BUCKWHEAT.

Wisconsin Farmer's Experience in Raising This Crop.

I do not often raise buckwheat, but like to grow it occasionally. It does comes in very nicely as a late crop. If I have a piece of land which has been neglected until too late for other grain crops, this land can be seeded to buckwheat. Or if I have a field of corn where the seed failed to sprout this can also be sown to buckwheat. If the ground is very poor it should have an application of stable manure. It may be plowed any time before seeding. The ground should be fitted as for any other small grain crop. It is advisable to have the seedbed thoroughly prepared and the more work put on it the better the results. I sow buckwheat any time between June 20 and July 4. As the acreage is not large I usually sow by hand, using

about one peck to the acre. The crop should be harvested before frosts occur, explains this writer in Orange Judd Farmer. If sown later than July 4 there is danger of a frost catching it. If it is sown much earlier than June 20 the hot weather is likely to cause a light yield. The crop dozen plants have been packed we fill may be cut by hand, using a cradle, or with the ordinary reaper. Each bundle should stand by itself, with a band around the top. These should be left in the field until the straw and grain are dry. After that the crop can be stacked and threshed as any other small grain. I sometimes sell buck

wheat to the millers. At other times I have it ground and put the buckwheat flour up in 25-pound sacks and sell these at retail. All in all, buckwheat is very satis-

factory when grown in a small way. If I have a piece of land which is very weedy and want to partly summer fallow it, I begin by plowing early in the spring to a depth of six or seven inches. I disk this every week until the time for seeding buckwheat. After this crop is off I find my field practically free from bad weeds. In this way it can be used very successfully as a cleaning crop

To protect banked celery, put a thick layer of leaves over the top of the ridges, and weight down with boards. Manure from the horse stable will keep the ridges, but this is not needed if enough leaves are used.

What Tuberculin Is.

Tuberculin is the result of many experiments to obtain a curative antitoxin, or serum, for tuberculosis, says Farming. It is a product of the growth of the tubercle organism in artificial cultures but it is a perfectly harmless product when properly used. It will neither cure nor cause the disease to spread in an affected animal; neither will it injure a healthy one in any way. In skilled hands it is almost infallible and with ordinary judgment, the errors are only a few per cent. In Pennsylvania 4,000 animals it Will Aid in Pulling the Crops by that had given characteristic reactions were slaughtered and examined, and the presence of the disease was demonstrated in all but eight.

Growing Pond Lilies.

A Saco, Me., florist, after cultivating flowers and vegetable for years, turned his attention to pond lilies, with the result that last summer he had a pond of lilles not equaled by any other in New England. While small compared with some in Massachusetts, being 300 by 60 feet, it yields thousands of blooms during a season. During August it has been no uncommon thing for him to pick 500 lilles a day. There is a ready market for the lilies in the big citles, the prevailing price being \$4 a hundred.

If the cabbage that is not headed good this fall is buried with the roots on they will make nice white heads in the ground. The root must be covered with earth so it cannot freeze. -Farm and Home.

Cover the onion sets this fall with a dressing of well rotted stable manure. It will keep them from freezing, and they will need no cultivation in the spring.

TABLE DELICACIES.

APPETIZING AND EASILY PRE PARED DISHES.

For Luncheon on a Busy Day-Two Extremely Popular Sandwiches -Sparkling Lemonade a Delicious Beverage.

Luncheon Dish for a Busy Day .-Take three cups of good, well-seasoned tomato sauce thickened with a heaping teaspoonful of flour rubbed into one of butter, and keep it hot in a saucepan set at the side of the stove. Toast slices of bread, butter them, and spread them on a dish, putting a tablespoonful of tomato sauce on each. Into the remainder of the tomato sauce turn two cupfuls of minced mutton, and put the saucepan over the fire. Stir the mixture until the meat is thoroughly heated, season it to taste, and pour it upon the toast.

Potato Luncheon Biscuits. - Boil eight potatoes and mash them smoothly with a little milk, and beat into them two tablespoonfuls of melted butter, eight tablespoonfuls of flour, two of grated cheese, one teaspoonful of baking powder sifted twice with the flour, half a teaspoonful of salt and just a suspicion of cayenne. Mix these ingredients into a light dough. with one tablespoonful of cream and the yolk of an egg, and roll it out half an inch thick; then cut it into rounds, and brush it over with the beaten white of an egg. Bake these in a quick oven, split them open while they are hot, and serve them at once. They will also be found useful for afternoon tea.

Salmon and Cucumber Sandwiches. -Cut rounds of bread slighthly larger than the slice of cucumber, and spread them with butter and sprinkle the under sides with a few grains of celery salt, then spread them with a layer of chopped and pounded salmon. Next add a few drops of vinegar and a little white pepper, then a thin slice of cucumber and the top round of bread. Garnish the dish with a few slices of cucumber or crisp lettuce leaves.

Egg and Cress Sandwiches.-Rub several hard boiled eggs through a sieve and season them with salt, pepper and lemon juice, and mix them well together with butter to a rich paste. Spread white or brown bread evenly buttered rather generously with this mixture, then sprinkle onehalf with plenty of finely-chopped fresh cress, and press the pieces together.

Lamb's Tail Soup .-- Cut six fambs' tails into joints, and boil them fill ten der in some weak stock, with a slice of raw ham or a ham bone. Season with a little onion, parsley, a bay leaf, a blade of mace and a few mushrooms. Simmer slowly for four hours, and then strain through a cloth. Thicken the soup with flour, add salt and cay enne and white wine to taste. Boll up, add the pieces of tail, and serve






