

THE KILLING PACE.

False living by the moderately well to-do was the theme of a St. Louis pastor's Sunday sermon. It strikes a note that applies to the modern pace by which our daily existence is being measured, Money burns the pockets far more in this generation than it did in the former one and those who are burning

it seem to belong to that portion of the population which we term American as distinguished from the naturalized citizen.

The idea of having earned the right to spend money does not appear to be very clearly associated with the American demand for luxury, especially when there is no good basis for affording extravagance. By common assent, the moderately fixed person is known frequently if not generally to be living up to his income. He is periously near debt most of the time or else the margin between his expenditures and savings is too narrow to permit a comfortable feeling of security. The feeling of an imperative need for constant strain in order to keep up with procession is what makes the killing pace in American life.

A little study of the combined thrift, economy and absolute determination of our naturalized citizens not to buy what one can not or may not be able to pay for probably will save the American from deteriorating mentally and physically in his abnormal race to survive constantly increasing






