In two civil cases tried by me without a jury I was reversed by the Dallas Court of Civil Appeals but was afterward sustained by the Supreme Court.

I have been reversed in a number of criminal cases appealed from Houston and Henderson Counties, but believe I can connince any intelligent and reasonable man that in at least a majority of those cases I was right and should have been affirmed. At any rate, I believe my record in such cases will compare favorably with any Judge in the State.

I shall not make any trades if I ask for the office again I will your paper of Nov. 14th. as I have done in the past, appeal to the individual voter through the press, the mail, and the stump. In spite of local feeling against a candidate from Anderson County I feel that my record should entitle me to a fair consideration from all the voters, regardless of county lines.
