San Antonio ae lowly and neglected peanut has sprung into popular favor in Texas as a forage erop and a wave of peanut enthusjasm is sweeping over Texas. Alselling for \$14.00 a ton less than ready two large peanut mills have been established one in East Texas and one at Falfurias, in this section. This latter now building will have a capacity of 100,000 bushels of peanuts, a month and will give employment to 100 persons. This factory announces that it will pay 75 cents a bushel for peanuts of the right variety. Arrangements have acres in peanuts this spring. In addition hundreds of acres over Southwest Texas are being put into peanuts. In some localities they are pulled up by the roots and baled for forage as hay and alfalfa. At other places the hogs are turned into the peanut fields and fattened for market. As feed for hogs and mules the peanut is considered superior to all other forage plants.
