Delivery of heroin to agent nets Bartley 15 years in pen

An 11-man, one-woman jury deliberated almost three hours Tuesday before assessing a 15-year sentence for James Dexter Bartley, Jr. for delivery of a controlled sub-

The jury had taken just less than one and one-half hours to find Bartley guilty of the charge of delivering heroin to Karen Mann, undercover narcotics agent during the Shade Tree operation of the Big Spring Police Department.

The guilt-innocence phase of the trail went to the jury at 11:48 a.m. Tuesday. State's witnesses called by District Attorney Rick Hamby included Mann, who had posed as one of three operators of the Shade Tree Pawn Shop, buying stolen goods and collecting evidence against burglars and drug dealers.

Taking the stand in his own defense, Bartley denied delivering 2.28 grams of heroin to Mann and receiving the \$200 payment that had already been arranged with a dealer by telephone.

After the guilty verdict was returned, the jury heard two prosecution and three defense witnesses in the punishment phase of the

Hamby called Big Spring Police Detectives Avery Faulkner and John Burson. Bartley himself took the stand again, as did his attorney, Roy Ford. Ford professed knowing Bartley for the past eight years and expressed his opinion that Bartley should be given a second chance with a probated sentence.

Ford stepped down and called Howard County Sheriff Aubrey Standard to the stand to testify to the fact that Bartley, during the five weeks in jail prior to the trial, Bartley had given no evidence of drug withdrawal symptoms. This supported the defense's statements that Bartley, with no previous convictions on his record, had shaken his addiction to heroin last January and was at-

Water and Sewer Fund shows deficit

Things look worse, but they are really better with the city's Water and Sewer Fund, according to Tom Ferguson, city finance director.

The fund shows a deficit of \$66,124.96, its deepest plunge into the red so far this year.

"Actually we are pretty pleased with the way things are going. That figure reflects all of our big bills, such as \$75,000 to CRMWD (Colorado River, Municipal Water District), for July, said Ferguson.

As Ferguson views the situation, with most of the month's expenditures out of the way, and with water revenues larger than expected, the picture should improve drastically by

the end of July. 'Water usage is heavier than expected, so revenues will increase and the deficit should decrease by the end of the month," said Ferguson. "I am confident that the fund will be in the black by the end of this fiscal year,

In closing arguments, the defense asked for a probated sentence for Bartley. The range of sentence for the first degree felony conviction is five to 99 years confinement, with any sentence of 10 years or less open to probation if the jury so desired.

DA Hamby requested a 20-year term for Bartley, stating that the three reasons for such a sentence were reform of the convicted felon, punishment and as a deterrent to

The jury began punishment phase deliberations near 3:45 p.m. Tuesday, and returned with the 15-year sentence at 6:27 p.m.

Spain's coast is site

Almost 135 die when gas truck explodes

TARRAGONA, Spain (AP) - "It looked like a flame thrower," said a Frenchwoman who survived the holocaust when a runaway tank truck loaded with propylene gas exploded in a campsite on Spain's northeast coast.

Police estimated that between 125 and 135 persons died as a result of the Tuesday explosion at the seaside resort, 50 miles south of Barcelona. Nine of those died in the hospital

overnight, hospital officials said. More than 200 other campers were hospitalized with burns. Many were reported in critical condition.

Most of the 500 to 600 vacationers registered at the camp on the Costa Brava 50 miles south of Barcelona were from other West European countries. Many of the bodies were burned beyond recognition, and identification was slow.

The campsite "resembles hell or what we think hell is like," said one police officer working amid the charred remains of automobiles, trailers, campers and tents.

The permanent campsite is one of a score along the popular Costa Brava. The lunch-hour explosion blackened more than 160 acres and was heard two miles away.

Earlier reports put the death toll at near 200. Officials blamed the higher estimate on "great confusion."

Vincente Mirabet, the head of a burn treatment unit at a Valencia hospital, said 40 victims had been admitted there and most were in critical condition

"I don't think many will survive," he said.

Police at noon put the death toll at 119 and said half a dozen persons were missing.

Police said the 38-ton single-trailer truck was loaded with 43 cubic meters of gas when it left the highway while rounding a curve, crashed through a stone fence and exploded.

Witnesses said the truck was going about 40 mph when the driver lost

control.

The blast set off a chain of explosions as campers' bottled cooking gas blew up. No trace of the Spanish driver was found.

The bodies were taken by helicopter to the nearby town of Tortosa until they could be moved to Barcelona.

Attorneys general have no power to sue state

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Texas attorneys general have no authority to sue state agencies to nullify decisions they consider illegal, the 3rd Court of Civil Appeals ruled today.

In two separate decisions, the court dealt a blow to Attorney General John Hill's contention that he had a right to defend the public against state actions he thought improper. Hill sought in the courts to block

state water agency orders governing protection of the Edwards Aquifer and approving a South Texas Nuclear Project contract to buy water from the Lower Colorado River Authority.

In one case, Hill contended the Edwards Aquifer was illprotected by an order of the Texas Water Quality Board. In the other, he contended the LCRA did not own water the Texas Water Rights Commission said it could sell to the nuclear project for some \$50 million.

Both water agencies since have been absorbed by the new Texas Department of Water Resources.

Trial judges in Austin refused to accept Hill's suits, saying he could not sue agencies the Texas Constitution binds him to defend.

Hill took his case to the appeals court, which upheld the district

"To uphold the attorney general's position would give rise to an in-tolerable situation which, as was aptly observed by the trial court, would put him on both sides of the lawsuit," said Chief Justice John Phillips' opinion in the Edwards Aguifer suit.

Associate Justice Trueman O'Quinn wrote in the LCRA case that the Texas Constitution makes state agencies the attorney general's clients and leaves no room for him to sue them.

O'Quinn said no constitutional provisions "arm the attorney general with authority to sue the state or any of its arms or agencies, even when the attorney general holds a view different from the decision or discretion exercised by an administrative

Volunteers search for fourth victim

chers this morning returned to their grisly task of looking for the fourth victim in the rubble of what was the old Denver Hotel

A police spokesman said the search was stopped late last night "because of darkness and just sheer exhaustion." Volunteers were back digging, however, by 7 a.m.

Three bodies were dragged from the ruins of the 65-year-old building Tuesday evening, including that of Weldon Johnston of Webberville, owner of Johnston's Used Building Materials and Demolition, which was preparing to tumble the building safely on Sunday.

Johnston headed a five-man crew which was weaking the abandoned structure's support columns when it suddenly collapsed about 4:50 p.m.

One worker, Roy Turner, was thrown clear of the falling debris and later helped search the jumbled heap for the bodies of his co-workers.

Johnston was killed when a huge slab of concrete crushed him. His body was found quickly. The bodies of Sylvestra Castro and an unidentified man were uncovered later Tuesday

The four-story brick building had been closed since 1971. A Victoria bank purchased the building earlier this year and had contracted for its

"There was a rumble. Jesus Christ just a rumble," said Manuel Villareal, who left the building moments before it crumbled.

"The damn place just caved in. There was no time for the people inside to get out," he added.

Firemen, police, sheriff's deputies, local contractors and volunteers used front-end loaders to peel away the crumbled remains of the building as they sifted through the rubble for the

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -West Texas needs reliable sources of future water supplies, proponents of the Stacy Dam project on the Colorado River told the Texas Water Commission Tuesday.

The Colorado River Municipal Water District has asked for authority to build the damand-reservoir project near Ballinger and divert 113,000 acre feet from

the Colorado River annually. The Lower Colorado River Authority, the city of Austin and Lake Travis residents say the project would divert too much water from downstream communities which depend on the Highland Lakes system

along the Colorado River. Water needs developed faster downstream along the river than in West Texas, said Fred Booth, attorney for the water district.

"At the time the LCRA in hospital was created in 1934, the people of West Texas were concerned about the possibility of having all resouces of the water basin being appropriated at the lower end of the basin where the need was developing






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
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Some blunders can't be erased from record

very sensitive about the manner. One of those who discovered that the world is listening, more particularly organizations and individuals dedicated to the proposition that such an act is a crime, is Walter Pickett, a Common Pleas Court judge in Con-

On the basis of evidence that one of four men arrested in the abduction and assault of a woman had not been able to rape the victim, Pickett ordered that he not be bound over for

JUDGE PICKETT couldn't pass up the opportunity to comment on the

decision. "You can't blame somebody for trying," he was moved to remark. He would have been better off turning to other matters.

Pickett's statement got into the papers, with the result that several groups took him to the mat. They see in Pickett's remarks an insult to all womanhood and they want him to answer for his remarks. There are those who even think the judge should step down from the bench

The outcome of a somewhat similar incident in Wisconsin last year provides no comfort for Judge Pickett. In that case, Judge Archie Simonson pieced together a connection between permissive public attitudes, the prevalence of revealing female attire and the sexual arousal of a young man accused of assault.

It's obvious. Rape is not a subject to be treated lightly these days. As a matter of fact, it never was. As a criminal act, it is more than a form of assault - it is the defilement of a personality with psychological consequences invariably far more serious and enduring than the physical damages inflicted.

MUCH OF THE male public still may not be fully aware of the true and repellent nature of the crime, but a more enlightened attitude is to be expected of the learned judiciary. It is thus especially offensive when in-sensitive and ill-informed comments are delivered from the bench.

Judge Pickett, no doubt, wonders what hit him. He defends his remarks as appropriate "in the context" in which it was offered. He notes that there was an attempt, but no action. Therefore, there was no reason to bind the accused over to court for trial.

Few faulted the judge for his decision. The storm center concerns the remarks he made in connection with it. In the context of the court record, it would appear to have been uttered with some degree of facetious

If that be the case, it only compounds the offense and adds to Pickett's problems. Man heaps together the mistakes of a lifetime and calls it destiny.

Trained for Amin

WASHINGTON -Washington's elite Georgetown enclave, with its expensive town houses, seems a strange training ground for cutthroats who have helped dictator Idi Amin put to death hundreds of thousands of his Ugandan subjects.

Yet we have learned that the Central Intelligence Agency recruited at least 10 of Amin's handpicked henchmen for special police training in a strange "prep school" that the American taxpayers established in

These Ugandan police and intelligence agents attended the International Police Academy, ostensibly operated by the Agency for International Development but secretly supported by the CIA. They returned to Uganda to torture and execute Amin's victims

THE ACADEMY WAS located in an old streetcar repair center in Georgetown, not far from the gardened dwellings where such Washington eminences as Dean Acheson, Henry Kissinger and John F. Kennedy have resided. More than 5,000 police agents from 77 governments received training in "The Carbarn" before the operation was closed down under congressional criticism in 1975.

Three of the Ugandans went on to take a post-graduate course at the International Police Services, Inc., another school hidden away in a Washington brownstone mansion. The school operated as a commercial cover for the CIA for more than a quarter century and exported police equipment to foreign governments paid for covertly with CIA money.

In addition, the CIA had a full-time police instructor stationed in Uganda in the early days of Amin's regime, and a CIA liaison officer was posted there until the United States closed its embassy in 1973. His duty was to exchange information with the psychotic dictator's police and intelligence officials.

Shockingly, the Ugandan contingent was brought to this country and trained at Georgetown long after Amin's murderous policies were

evident. His victims, indeed, included some Americans.

AS FAR BACK AS July, 1971, two Americans were hustled off to a Ugandan military camp from which they never returned. We traced the steps of free-lance writer Nicholas Stroh and researcher Robert Siedle, and then published an account of their

According to reports, they were spread-eagled over inflammable oil drums, which were set ablaze by tracer bullets fired by executioners. Their burned bones were dumped into a river by a lieutenant who later signed an affidavit. The officers responsible for the atrocity were later promoted by Amin.

In 1974, we also reported that some of the foreign students at the police academy had written papers favoring torture tactics. The school's ad ministrators denied, however, that torture techniques were taught.

We wrote that many of the academy's graduates later became CIA informants and operatives. We quoted from a secret letter from former CIA Director William Colby boasting how "relationships" built up during the 15-week training later paid off in "obtaining foreign intelligence."

One of the Ugandan graduates was J. Bigirwa who went home to work for Uganda's dread Public Safety Unit which carries out Amin's murder orders. We have also learned the names of other CIA-sponsored trainees from Uganda who later held powerful police or intelligence posts under the bloodthirsty Amin. They include:

-Gerad O. Malinga. He was an assistant commissioner of police. After his U.S. experience, he was promoted to the Public Safety Unit, which is widely involved in carrying out Amin's genocide against his own people.

-Joseph Wambua Peter. He is now an investigator for the Ugandan Criminal Investigations Division, known for its brutal interrogations and for arresting innocent Ugandans in the middle of the night for trivial

possibility, and there is nothing in the Bible that would deny it. The Bible, however, is concerned about life on this planet and does not give us any firm answer to your question.



WASHINGTON - On the night before she was named by President Carter to head a blue-ribbon national women's committee, Bella Abzug was a New York City's Union Square cosponsoring a "mass tribute" to executed traitors and atom spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg - a bizarre juxtaposition that points to many troubles in the White House.

Mrs. Abzug's presence in Union Square suggests the president's wife and daughter-in-law had good reason to doubt the wisdom of the appointment. As co-chairman of the new National Advisory Committee for Women, Abzug will not help the embattled Equal Rights Amendment (ERA), a cause to which the entire Carter family is firmly committed.

But beyond ERA, the Abzug ap pointment points to this hard fact of life: after 18 months on the job, the Carter team remains surprisingly naive and uniformed about national politics. What's more, the internal debate over Abzug reflects a larger, more important contest within the White House about how Jimmy Carter can best regain his former standing.

ABZUG HAS LOST three elections in New York in three years and is considered a plague on ERA less because of her aggressive personality than her extremist politics. Her cosponsors of the Rosenberg "tribute" were aging warriors of the Old Left (John Abt, of the Ware underground Communist group of the 1930s) and activists of the New Left (David Dellinger of the Chicago Seven). Henry Winston, venerable national chairman of the Communist party, delivered a major address.


"What's wrong with Bella attending a New York liberal rally?" asked one White House aide, improbably ushering John Abt and David Dellinger into "liberal" ranks. But rter staffers enough to understand Abzug's impropriety found out too late to do anything about it. "Oh, no." moaned a senior Carter adviser, "did she really

do that? The impact of such antics on middle-class America explained the First Lady's misgivings about the appointment, as related to the National Press Club: "I sometimes am concerned about the legislators in North Carolina and South Carolina and Florida where we need (ERA) votes. Can they identify (with Abzug)? Will it help the ERA pass?" Daughter-in-law Judy Carter, a doughty ERA campaigner, not only wondered but actually opposed the

appointment. Bella was saved by a strange benefactor: Anne Wexler, the bright new star on the president's senior staff. Abzug has never disguised her contempt for the pragmatic political methods of Wexler as a Connecticut Democratic leader. Yet, Wexler convinced Mrs. Carter that Abzug's appointment will do more good than

Why? Partly because Wexler feels Abzug deserves a reward for defending Mr. Carter against women's caucas attacks at the 1976 Democratic national convention. But mainly out of fear of reprisals. MS Magazine editor Gloria Steinem, women's activist and Abzug's close friend, was persistent in demanding the job for Bella. Wexler determined that risking attack from the women's movement was not worth

To many sophisticated liberal politicians, Wexler greatly politicians. overestimated the influence of women on Abzug, even when allied with Steinem. "Bella brings you nothing in New York, nothing in the women's movement, nothing in liberal circles,' one veteran New York City Manhattan reform leader told us. 'What she does is kill ERA for you."



Don't paint allergy with too broad a brush

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Our two-yearold son gets diarrhea when he eats fruits and vegetables. Our doctor does not seem to know the cause or how long it will last. It's been over a year now. Over a long period of pime, isn't he missing some valuable nutrients? His skin is getting an unhealthy look.

You have painted your son's allergy with a mighty broad brush — all fruits and vegetables. Can't things be

narrowed down a bit more than that? Legumes (peas, etc.) are potent allergens (reaction producers), but depending on the individual, celery, cabbage. tomatoes. cauliflower, white potatoes, carrots, squash, even lettuce can be irritating. Soybeans, which are found in all sorts of prepared foods these days, can be allergy producers. The same goes for fruits. Some are more potent allergens than others. The ones with seeds seem to be more so than those without. But there is no point in going down the whole list, which is literally endless when one speaks of allergies. Has the possibility of a milk in-

tolerance been suggested? Indeed, this youngster is missing many valuable nutrients by excluding all of the fruits and vegetables. That leaves only grains, meats and dairy products. The skin condition you mention in your letter could stem from deficiencies of those vegetable and fruit nutrients

If you cannot do your own detective work in tracing specific causes of his reactions, you should consult an allergist, who is trained in these matters. Fruits and vegetables provide a wide range of vitamins he needs to grow properly. If he is not getting them, he will need supplements.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My blood pressure is 160-100. Because I cannot take the regular medication for this, my doctor has put me on tranquilizers. They seem to have calmed me down and my pressure has come down a bit. I've never heard of tranquilizers being used for high blood pressure. What do you think? — Mrs.

Tranquilizers are commonly used when anxiety and tension are a factor in high blood pressure. If your pressure has dropped, then there is nothing wrong with it. But you might help eliminate the need by understanding and conquering the

causes of your tension. It is important to know why you cannot use regular high blood medicines. Tranquilizers do not get at the other (non-anxiety)

part of your problem, About a year ago I had my cervix removed and the doctor used some silver nitrate. I've been afraid to get into the tub for fear there is still some of it in me that would get into the water. I am afraid even to touch my underclothes and I wash my hands seven or eight times a day. I am worried about touching

food. - Mrs. E.F. It is too bad your fears put you to all of this trouble. The silver nitrate (a cauterizing agent) has long since disappeared from your body and you can return to a sensible routine.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Many thanks to you for your excellent column. Even while living in Alaska (Anchorage) I benefited from it. I identified (from your explanation) a thrombophlebitis in my leg and went to a physician where it was verified and treatment begun. God bless you. -Mrs. L.W.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Is it possible for a person to have two gall bladders? During a routine examination I guess the X-ray showed I had two of them. The doctors said not to worry, but that it is rare. How rare is it? -

You're the one person in about 4.000 who has this anomaly. There are two separate bladders and two separate ducts leading from them. It's a plus for you. If you develop stones in one, the other will be there standing by for emergency action. These anomalies are genetic quirks.

Are you having a gall bladder problem? To find out how the gall bladder works and what kinds of trouble to look for, read Dr. Thosteson's booklet, "You and Your Gall Bladder." Write him in care of the Big Spring Herald, for a copy, enclosing a long, self-addressed,

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Can liquid or powdered protein supplements help me gain weight? I am a 20-year-old man in good health. I get plenty of exercise. — M.D.

People are below weight for their height and frame for three reasons heredity, malnutrition, or a disease that is causing faulty metabolism (which is how the body utilizes nutrients in the diet). If you are hereditarily thin, nothing will help. If malnutrition is a factor, only more calories and other nutrients will make a difference. If you have something organically amiss, only correction of that will help

So if you are healthy, getting exercise and receiving sufficient calories, protein supplements, won't help and would be a waste.

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

Sexual revolution resulted in changes, but not drastic

after all? A generation after Kinsey opened the door to sexual frankness, it's really only slightly ajar.

BLOOMINGTON, (AP) - Thirty years ago in this quiet college town, America took its first bite of the apple — and lost its sexual innocence.

In the three decades since, Americans have wandered through a sexual landscape that many felt bizarre and disturbing.

But a new report from Alfred Kinsey's Institute For Sex Research, due this year. indicates that some conservative bells are sounding in the American mind. There will be continued

openness in sexual discussion. The divorce rate will climb. There will be more premarital sex, until perhaps nine out of 10 will enter marriage no longer

Yet there is a strong vein of conservatism underlying all of this, says Dr. Paul Gebhard, the scholarly 60vear-old director of the institute, who has been engaged in sex research since 1946.

"We asked how they (Americans) felts about different varieties of sexual behavior, and we discovered that the great majority are against extramarital intercourse. They are strongly down on prostitution. They violently disapprove of homosexuality.'

Some of this is disguised Americans questioned by the institute agree homosexuals should have jobs. But what kind of jobs? They may be musicians, actors, florists, interior decorators — but not judges public officials, policemen physicians, teachers. Marriage and the nuclear

Nuclear industry may die for lack of plan, man says

MIDLAND, Texas (AP) - A high-level Department of Energy official says the nation's nuclear power industry may die for lack of an acceptable plan for storing its

deadly radioactive waste materials. "There has been a striking change in the energy outlook in this country," said John O'Leary. "Unless things change, we are not going to have a nuclear power

O'Leary, DOE deputy secretary, addressed his remarks to about 60 persons Tuesday who gathered in Midland for the first of three public information sessions on the routing of nuclear wastes through Texas.

O'Leary defended a proposed nuclear waste storage facility near Carlsbad, N.M., as "essential to the development of nuclear power in this country."

Texas Attorney General John Hill requested the meetings, planned for Amarillo today and El Paso Thursday Hill said he wants the DOE to explain plans for hauling

the radioactive waste through Texas on its way to the proposed Waste Isolation Pilot Plant in New Mexico. The proposed plant, which would store low, intermediate and high-level nuclear wastes, would be

located in underground salt mines about 25 miles Officials didn't elaborate on the exact route the wastes

would take through Texas on its way from the Savannah River Plant in South Carolina other than to say it would enter New Mexico by rail from Amarillo in the Panhandle. The route surprised some who expected the more direct Texas and Pacific Railroad haul from Dallas-Fort Worth into Midland-Odessa

Dr. Charles Hyder of Albuquerque, N.M., a member of the Albuquerque-based Southwest Research and Information Center and a long-time opponent of the waste plant, pressed DOE for justification of the apparently

James Liverman, acting DOE assistant secretary for environment, said the Midland-Odessa route did seem

"I don't know how they come up with Amarillo," he Hyder charged there is a conspiracy to keep high-level decision makers in the DOL from learning about adverse

aspects of the waste plant program. Texas Railroad Commissioner Mack Wallace sent a representative to the meeting to ask for "full local participation" in the transportation planning stage of the waste plant project.

Residents want town left alone

LOCKE, Calif. (AP) This block-long riverside Chinatown of decaying crackerboxes looks like it was worked over by bombers. But everyone seems to want it. The state wants to preserve it. Hong Kong investors want to develop it. Its 65 residents want it left alone.

Meanwhile, the lazy crossroads 65 miles east of San Francisco has become a mecca for tourist buses. For years, Locke has been

crumbling to leisurely destruction, a mirage out of the Old West with woodplank sidewalks, two-by-four uprights supporting tipsy second-story porches, a couple of bars and restaurants.

Eighty years ago there was no Locke.

Walnut Grove a mile away was the Chinatown. It catered to the Chinese immigrants who tilled the soil and harvested crops. When Walnut Grove burned down, they moved to land owned by the George Locke family. At one point the population was 300. It was a wide open river center where thousands of workers swarmed on weekends for women, booze, opium and gambling.

The town has been a watering place and social center for hundreds of Sacramento River yachtsmen for years.

It mouldered in sleepy, anonymous decay until Ng * Doo Tai of Asian City Development Inc. bought a big chunk of acreage from the Locke estate last year.

Rumors started that old Locke was to be razed for x construction of a new Locke, to be populated by overseas Chinese. The company wants to develop a housing subdivision and a cultural center but it is waiting to see what the state does.

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Advancement uneven for women

NEW YORK (AP) Although the number of women in the workforce has increased dramatically in recent years, job advancement has proceeded at an uneven pace, studies indicate.

Women, who now comprise about 40 percent of the total labor force, have made some gains in getting higher-

as a group they have lost ground when their earnings are compared with median earnings of men

A recent study by the Conference Board, business research group, shows that the proportion of women managers in the United States rose from 13 percent of all managers in 1970 to 19 percent in 1975.

Another survey shows that some gains in getting higher-paid, higher-status OBS. But who traditionally received

lower starting pay, are now starting at about the same salaries as their male counterparts.

But the twin trends of more women seeking advancement and more women entering the labor force have helped create an apparent paradox in overall pay differences.

The apparent paradox is due in part to the large numbers of inexperienced

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Heart surgeon campaigns to legalize euthanasia

seems a strange subject for chimps. God, they were so Christiaan Barnard, the man much like human beings! who held human hearts in his hands and made medical history with the renewed life he brought through trans-

The subject is death, more specifically, Barnard's quiet, personal campaign to legalize euthanasia — mercy killing.

"It's important realize," says Barnard, "that death is sometimes good medical treatment. Sometimes it achieves what medicine cannot achieve it stops suffering.

He pauses. It is a sunny morning on the tree-shaded patio of a luxurious hotel. Birds sing. How can one think of death?

'We shouldn't consider death as an enemy always. Barnard says. "We should consider it as an ally. Barnard, the brilliant

South African surgeon who pioneered heart transplants, was here to talk about his novel, "In The Night Season." It is about a surgeon and about euthanasia.

It is a different Christiaan Barnard who is speaking, not the confident medical pioneer. At 55, he weeps in recalling the moment he cut out the beating heart of an ape. His hands are crippled by arthritis.

'I've become softer as I've grown older," he confides. Working with animals gives me tremendous emotional pain... I don't think I could be forced to take out the heart of a chimp

He holds out the hands that deftly transplanted hearts and he speaks of the arthritis. "I'm never really physically well," says Barnard. "I have pain all the time. It's sapped my energy. I've lost that tremendous drive.... I've made the decision that I will stop active surgery at the end of this year.

Barnard is not the usual author-on-tour, either. must confess I have forgotten exactly what I wrote in the book," he says at the outset. But the book's subject is very much in mind. It is the focus of his deepest thoughts

The protagonist of his novel is a doctor who finds that the woman he loves has breast cancer which has invaded her whole body. He decides not to tell her. Ultimately, he faces lawsuits and the moral crisis of whether to help her die.

Barnard has thought about euthanasia for years and made headlines in his native South Africa when it was learned that he and his brother have a death pact. If one brother should be incapacitated - a vegetable kept alive by machines - the other brother would kill him.

Euthanasia — another word for murder? Perhaps. "But there are degrees of murder," says Barnard.

"The primary goal of medicine is to improve the quality of life," says Bar-"to alleviate suffering. This, he notes, was the

purpose of heart transplants. "These operations I do are never intended just to prolong life - but to improve the quality of life for the patients.

Even those who died after a few months or years had renewed vigor in the time they survived, he says.

But the man who advocates mercy killing now regrets killing a baboon and a chimp whose hearts he implanted in two patients to aid their damaged hearts. The technique failed and Barnard has abandoned it.

"I stopped that not because I'm so convinced I'm on the wrong track," he says. "But I got emotionally involved with the chimp.' Two of the animals had

been flown in from Holland for Barnard's use. "At first I said, 'Human life is more important.' But

"They told me that when

one was taken away the other cried so much." His blue eyes cloud with pain. The expected cool detachment of the surgeon is ab-

"I often cry," he says.
"Sometimes that is embarrassing. But I'm made that way. To me, the death of a patient is very traumatic.' Yet, he would kill in

hopeless cases if it were Barnard stresses he has never practiced mercy

killing because it is illegal. He believes the law will someday change and doctors will be permitted to stop treatment "when the treatment serves only one purpose - and that is to prolong the suffering of the patient The question arises — does

Barnard's view euthanasia encompass belief in an afterlife?


"I would like to believe in it," he says quietly. "I do believe there is some higher force or power that has created this wonderful human being and this world we live in. I do believe life is like energy. It is indestructible

"In what form my life will continue I don't know," he says quietly. "whether I will be a cat or a tree or light. But I believe life will continue." He stares into space for a moment, lost in thought.

"We must not think anything is impossible because a human brain cannot grasp it," he says finally. "I believe there is something things which do not end.

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

The young Ward had always wondered what it would be like to have the great players of the two leagues fighting it out among one another. And without the knowledge of his superiors, he guaranteed that his paper would pay all expenses if the game was rained out.

Ward's best buddy just happened to be Will Harridge, president of the American League at the time. Needless to say, Harridge was enthusiastic about such a contest. Soon thereafter, a meeting of the owners was held, and the American League agreed unanimously to participate, with it understood that this would be a one-year affair.

Over in the National League, the Giants, Boston Braves and Cardinals were raising a stink. Rescheduling difficulties and the contention that it would set a precedent were the main objections. But after Ward sweet-talked the owners involved and gained their cooperation, John Heydler, president of the National League, gave his okay...on the same stipulation that it be played for one

So what happened? Comiskey Park, where it was played, was sold out in 48 hours. The weather was perfect, a crowd of 47.595 turned out (fans from all states, Canada and Mexico,) and Babe Ruth hit a two-run homer to lead the ALers to a 4-2 win. The owners were so impressed they agreed, indeed...insisted that the game continue. Counting last night, there have now been 49 All-Star games played. I think you could say it's a hit.

Camera buffs are urged to properly prepare film being sent through the mail for processing to help preserve those summer photographic memories.

Each year, thousands of film packages end up in dead letter offices throughout the country because of careless wrapping and addressing. often resulting in a missing pictorial record of vacation

The following tips, according to Big Spring Postmaster Frank Hardesty, will help ensure safer handling of film while in the mail stream. Place film cartridges in sturdy envelopes. when possible, use the envelopes

usually supplied by film processing companies Make sure that the processor's mailing address as well as a return address are written legibly on the outside envelope. Use Zip



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Skylab alteration postponed

Houston (AP) - Scientists at Johnson Space Center say it likely will be Thursday before they attempt maneuvers to correct the attitude of the 85-ton Skylab, which has been partially without power since last Saturday

The giant satellite has been wobbling around its Earth orbit since last Saturday when an electrical power failure caused its computer and gyroscopes to lose power. A spokesman at JSC said

Tuesday scientists won't be able to reprogram the satellite's computer and gyroscopes until batteries in one of two sets onboard have been recharged. Engineers currently are

preparing a schedule of procedures for returning Skylab to its original position, which provided for minimum atmospheric

minimum drag position is necessary to keep the craft in orbit until late next year when astronauts can go up during a Space Shuttle mission and boost Skylab into a higher orbit. Robert O. Aller, Skylab coordinator, said Skylab

apparently is more sensitive conditions than anticipated and will need closer monitoring until the Space Shuttle mission. Aller said despite the power loss problem, he is

confident no major damage occurred and and scientists will be able to correct the problems on board the craft.
