The Rev. August (Augie) Aamodt, pastor of Wesley Methodist Church in Big Spring, left this morning for the Honduras to help with hurricane relief

Augie is well-loved in the Honduras. having sponsored four work camps there after the hurricane wiped out the area about four years ago. That was Hurricane Fifi.

This time, Hurricane Greta selected the area for its forceful winds of

The local minister had sent out a letter last week telling Methodists in many areas that Greta passed over the Bay Islands of Honduras and that the Island of Roatan where "we have sponsored four workcamps got the full force of this extremely destructive storm. Greta then headed for the British Honduras where there have

been workcamps in the past."
Since he has written the letter, the extension of damage has been discovered. The Rev. Mr. Aamodt, pointed out that there is little, if any protection or safety for the people in that area as most homes and churches are at sea level. Most of the damage was in property this time instead of

Workcamps were already scheduled tentatively from Dec. 27 to Jan. 13 so that many young people can help during college holidays. It is sure to be needed now

They had planned to hold one camp in Rotan, a remote village on the north side of the island and another at Flowers Bay, Roatan where they planned to replace the church steeple which was blown away by Hurricane

Odessa man granted stay of execution

HUNTSVILLE; Texas (AP) James Paul Burns, scheduled to be executed today for the torture-murder of an Odessa, Texas, man, has won a stay of execution pending a hearing ir federal court.

Burns has been on Texas' Death Row for four years, and state prosecutors say he is likely to be one of the first condemned prisoners in Texas to be put to death since 1964.

The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans granted Burns a hearing Oct. 30 on his appeal. If his appeal is turned down there, he could take his case to the U.S. Supreme Court, but Assistant State Attorney General Anita Ashton said Burns is "pretty close to the end" of By Mayor Wade Choate

Hangar claims discounted

Mayor Wade Choate released a statement to the Big Spring news media this morning concerning a release which appeared in the Big Spring Herald Sunday about a petition that had been circulated in the city to stop the impending construction of a hangar on the Big Spring Industrial Park. The petition, which contained 567 signatures, asked that a bond election be called in the city of Big Spring before allowing the construction of a large aircraft hangar on the former Webb AFB property.

Mayor Choate said "we have reviewed the petition and have called many of the people who signed the petition to see why they supported the bond election. From the information we have received from these people, it appears that a lot of false information has been spread in the community concerning the construction and cost of the hangar.

"For example," Choate said, "the City of Big Spring is eligible to receive a \$1 million grant under the Economic Development Aid program, which the city does not have to pay back. All we have to do is provide matching funds of approximately \$330,000.00. If we do not proceed with the construction of the hangar, we will lose this grant.

"If Lockheed is awarded the contract on the F4N Navy Fighter planes, the city will have to spend an additional \$500,000 on the hangar. However, this additional money will be used only if Lockheed receives the contract. Should they receive the bid, they will be paying the city \$1.4 million during the contract period of four years and ten months, thus retiring any loan the city might take for the construction of the hangar.' Choate said.

"And should Lockheed not receive the contract, the city will only have to pay \$330,000, which would be recovered from lease funds received from other companies who have stated that they would need such a hangar before they could build on the former Webb property.

"I feel it is important to point out that we have received proposals from two large aircraft-related companies who have said that they too would require such a facility in order to consider locating in Big Spring. If we do not provide the hangar, then our chances of attracting either of these two companies would also be very limited if not impossible

"The large facilities at Webb have all been leased," Choate said, "with the exception of the aircraft-related facilities. These are the facilities that were used by the base for the maintenance and storage of aircraft. Without the hangar, these facilities are useless to the city.

"So," Choate said, "what it all boils down to is whether the City of Big Spring is to actively recruit large companies such as Lockheed or not. If we have a bond election concerning the hangar, Lockheed will bypass Big Spring in its bid and withdraw its contract since the election would make it impossible for Lockheed to meet the contract dates set by the Department of Defense in the bid

"I also feel that it is very important to say that the city will not spend the additional \$500,000 on the hangar until after Lockheed is awarded the contract. The contract, by the way, would mean an additional 500-600 high paying jobs for the citizens of Big

"Should we not receive the contract, we will only pay the \$330,000 for the hangar, which would be recovered through the lease of the hangar, and related facilities, to other aircraftrelated companies. The City of Big Spring needs to proceed with a positive attitude," Choate said, "if we are to recruit the industry at the Industrial Park that we are capable of attracting.

Should Lockheed win the government contract and set up operations here, it would pump an extra \$45 million annually into the local economy, a member of the Big Spring Steer Committee said this morning.

Such money usually turns over at least three times within a community, so the net impact would exceed \$100 million annually

Harry Nagel, Big Spring City Manager, said the respected bond law firm of McCall, Parkhurst and Horton of Dallas, and fiscal agents Rauscher and Pierce had handled the legal arrangements for the issuance of the Certificates of Obligation from the start and agents for the firms had assured local officials that everything was in order

Talk of the city being ultimately obligated for sums exceeding \$3 million is totally irresponsible, Nagel

Coincidentally, two representatives of Lockheed Aircraft Service Co., are here today checking for additional space available at the industrial park. One of those is Rudy Geller, chief of Lockheed's proposal team.

It was learned this morning that the deadline for submitting bids for the aircraft modication contract with the government has been moved back 15 days to Oct. 16, a factor that could prove very significant for Lockheed. The bids are due to be opened Dec. 1 in Washington.

Nagel said aircraft modification work is being emphasized more than ever by the armed forces because the government has cut back sharply on

Throngs of mourners huddling out of the rain filed into St. Peter's Basilica today for a last glimpse of the body of Pope John Paul I. "People loved him," explained one of those on line, Giovanni Oliviere.

"He was a real pastor of the people. He's left a personal example of what the people want, which will be difficult for his successor to follow," said the 35-year-old Oliviere, standing beneath the Bernini colonnade in St. Peter's Square.

The start of a new work week reduced the size of the crowds today. On Sunday an estimated 300,000 people braved pelting rain to view

the body after it was brought from the papal palace to a catafaloue in front of the main altar of Christendom's largest church.

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — Honeybees appear to use the Earth's magnetic field to find their way when the sun, stars or landmarks are not visible, according to a Princeton University professor.

Biologist James Gould, 33, says bees can use the magnetic field to navigate because of a compound of iron and oxygen called magnetite that is present in bees' abdomens. Each honeybee carries millions of crystals of magnetite and the crystals appear to rearrange themselves in response to changes in the bee's position in the magnetic field, Gould said.



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

WASHINGTON - It has become almost a truism that federal regulatory agencies eventually wind up living in sin with the industries hey were set up to keep under con-

A sweetheart relationship of almost unbelieveable scope and duration has just been disclosed in a confidential report by a House subcommittee. Its investigation turned up a "blatantly improper," seven-year liaison between the Maritime Administration and a shipping industry association called the National Maritime Council (NMC).

The federal agency not only set up the private trade association but ran its day-to-day affairs for the next seven years, using approximately 40 government employees at a cost to the taxpayers of at least \$200,000 a year.

THE RELATIONSHIP between the Maritime Administration and the Maritime Council "was a blatantly improper one from its inception in 1971 and demonstrated an utter disregard for conflict-of-interest requirements and considerations,' declares the still unreleased report of the House Commerce, Consumer and Monetary Affairs Subcommittee headed by Rep. Benjamin Rosenthal,

The excuse offered by the agency for supporting a private group was its authority, under the Merchant Marine Act, to promote U.S. maritime interests and "maintain liaison" with the shipping industry. But this, the subcommittee concluded, "is wholly inadequate justification for the agency's intimate daily ties, through the NMC, with shipping interests affected by subsidy and regulatory

The ties between the federal agency and the private association were close and all-pervasive. The executive secretary of the trade group was a federal official. The head of the Maritime Administration sat on the council's board of governors. And for two years, government employees performed legal and accounting services for the NMC, in apparent violation of federal law.

The Maritime Administration workers who helped run this private group evidently had a good thing going. The subcommittee report states that they "showed a careless disregard for taxpayers' dollars by traveling excessively and unnecessarily to meetings and social functions' of the council, and accepting "meals, trips and other valuable consideration" from the council or its industry members.

THROUGHOUT THE WHOLE expensive romance, the Maritime Administration lavished public money on the companies that belonged to the NMC. Between fiscal 1975 and the first

half of fiscal 1978, the subcommittee found, more than \$1.37 billion dollars in subsidies and other payments, plus \$1.66 billion in financing guarantees, were provided to NMC mem

It's not as if the bureaucrats entered into their illicit relationship in innocence or ignorance. The relationship was established over the strong objections of the general counsel of the Commerce Department, who warned of "a troublesome conflict of interest," the subcommittee report notes. One internal document the House investigators dug up cautioned the agency brass about "potential conflicts and embarrassment." And a government attorney warned of potentially serious and adverse legal consequences.

The congressional watchdogs first caught wind of the intimacy between the federal agency and the private trade association when they were sniffing out suspected illegal lobbying efforts by the National Maritime Council. Though otherwise taxexempt, non-profit trade associations are specifically forbidden to claim exemption for the expenses of socalled "grass roots lobbying" intended to create public pressure on

The NMC denied that it engaged in any such activities, despite some fairly obvious advertisements in national publications in support of a bill to require that a fixed percentage of oil imports be carried by American tankers. The NMC's 1977 "Don't Give Up the Ships" ad campaign was clearly designed to induce citizens to write their congressmen in favor of the cargo-preference bill.

public relations work in connection with the campaign went to Rafshoon Communications Company. That was headed by Gerald Rafshoon, who had just handled Jimmy Carter's publicity in his presidential race, and now does similar chores for the president and the White House

The House report states: "Because employees of the Maritime Administration were instrumental in the development and execution of this public relations campaign, appropriated funds were expanded . in possible violation of (federal law)." The shipping industry association, in other words, was not only avoiding taxes on its promotional campaign, but was getting the free services of federal employees as well.

Summit to reality

DUBUQUE, IOWA - President Carter's Camp David spectacular has strengthened his faded appeal among voters in this quintessential mid-American town but summit success is only the thinnest veneer covering deeper problems of inflation, high taxes and big government.

Indeed, our political scouting here with the help of Patrick Caddell's expert field staff and a questionnaire prepared by Caddell's Cambridge Survey Research revealed some voter skepticism even on Mr. Carter's Mideast peace efforts.

"It's looking as if the summit at Camp David is not working out like it first appeared," said a 49-year-old housewife in curlers whose husband is a maintenance man at the local John Deere plant. Although agreeing that the summit was the best thing Mr. Carter has achieved as president, she quickly turned to what really matters inflation.

That refrain became familiar in our interviews with 63 registered voters in Dubuque's 18th Precinct, a pleasant, lower-middle-income workers' suburb which split about 50-50 in the 1976 Carter-Ford presidential election, almost exactly as the state of Iowa. The voters we sampled reflected the same 1976 voting pattern.

Despite recent findings by reputable national polls that Camp David at least temporarily turned the president's political fortune around, voters here were more restrained. Only a third of them agreed that Mr. Carter's performance "during the last month" has improved, while 10 surprisingly rated his performance as 'worse." Almost one-half the total -31 voters - saw "no change" in performance despite Camp David.

Likewise, the president was given an "excellent" performance rating by only one voter, while almost 57 per cent rated him as "poor" or "only fair." A talkative, 34-year-old iron worker spelled out the president's continuing problem this way: "That summit thing was just done to put a feather in Carter's cap. He should do something about the cost of living and the job situation." A 22-year-old chemical plant employee praised the "headway" at Camp David, but said the U.S. "should be more concerned with its own problems.

LARGELY ON the basis of Mr. Carter's new assertiveness with Congress and his mediator role in the Arab-Israeli struggle, three voters who backed Gerald Ford two years ago have now turned to Mr. Carter. But three times that many said they would switch their 1976 Carter vote to Ford if the election were held today.

That pinpoints this conclusion: neither Camp David nor the president's recent hard line with Congress — his successful veto of the defense authorization bill and his apparent breakthrough on gas deregulation - has fully rehabilitated him in his moderate-conservative area.

To our question, "Do you think the president deserves a second term?" fully one-half of those who backed him in 1976 either said no or were uncertain. Altogether, our voters divided on the second-term question this way: 25 yes, 21 no and 17 un-

The president's handling of inflation was clearly an overriding reason, with "strong disapproval" expressed by 22 voters, "some" disapproval by 13. These disapproving voters far outweighed the 14 who approved the administration's anti-inflation campaign.

The Achilles heel of inflation is only part of the president's vulnerability on economic issues

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I am a man in my late 60s. My problem is sleeplessness. I can get to sleep, but awaken about 3 or 4 a.m. and can't get back to sleep. I am using sleeping pills, but they only make me drowsy the next day. I try drinking wine, but it doesn't work. Please discuss in-

somnia. - J.J. There's a whole grab bag of causes of sleeplessness. Your letter offers a

First, your age. Sleep needs tend to lessen with years. A man your age might expect to awaken at 3 a.m. or 4 a.m. if you retire at 9 p.m. after an active day.

I assume the pills are barbiturates. These come in many varieties and strengths. They are useful in certain situations, but can easily be overused or abused


There are two basic kinds of insomniacs. Some can get to sleep, but awaken later. Others cannot fall asleep to begin with. The pills can be tailored to individual needs. Shorteracting ones may help those who cannot fall asleep to begin with. Longer-acting ones may help those, like yourself, who awaken in the early morning hours. The latter often cause daytime drowsiness.

Wine alone can be sleep inducing. It should NOT be used with barbiturates, which in conjunction with alcohol can dangerously multiply depressive effects and add to daytime

You don't mention your mental state. Depression and anxiety can cause insomnia, and sleeping pills can worsen this situation. If this shoe fits, put it on. Try to resolve any personal problems in the daytime. You can't settle much in the pre-dawn hours.

Nor do you mention when you last had a good physical examination. A distended bladder from prostate enlargement, leg cramps, even nervous bowel can cause early awakening in sleeplessness.

Your pills aren't helping and they can be addictive, so little would be lost in weaning yourself from them. Avoid smoking or drinking excessive liquids at bedtime. A protein snack (cheese, meat, etc.) can ward off a late night blood sugar drop that causes awakening. Have a radio or some reading material on hand. You may



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

Transcript of conversation to be made public today

SAN DIEGO (AP) — The jetliner was falling, plunging 2,600 feet after colliding with a small Cessna. But its pilot and copilot still struggled — for "about a half minute's time" - to control the plane, making what investigators say was calm, casual conversation with air traffic con-

The transcript of that conversation was to be made public today, said investigators of the nation's worst air tragedy. The transcript covers all comments from ground to air and back before and after the Cessna and a Pacific Southwest Airlines 727 collided over the North Park residential area of San Diego a week ago.

At least 144 persons died, including seven on the ground, said Deputy County Coroner Max Murphy. He said during the weekend that the death figure was revised downward from 150 to 144. He said six persons believed killed on the ground were not in their homes at the time of the crash.

A spokesman for the National Transportation Safety Board said in an interview with The Associated Press Sunday that the impact between the planes may have ruptured the jetliner's hydraulic system, in effect killing its power steering

and some braking power The spokesman, Rudolph Kapustin, who heads the 100 investigators looking into the cause of the crash, said, "The aileron on the right wing was fully deflected and pointing upward," indicating that despite damage to the wing, the plane's steering mechanism wasn't knocked out entirely.

Ailerons are hinged sections along the trailing edge of the wing that enable the pilot to control the rolling movements of

Kapustin said the PSA pilot and his first officer appeared to have tried to control the jet from the instant of the collision to the crash on the ground, "about a half minute's time.

"Fire broke out immediately, leaving an indication that the fuel tank was damaged" when the jet's right wing was hit, he said.

Kapustin said further that he was unable to find any truth to published reports that there had been "bantering and joking" before the crash in the cockpit of the jetliner, which carried 135 people

He said the cockpit conversation would be made public at a hearing that may be held in November.

Two off-duty PSA pilots were reportedly in the cockpit jumpseats after joining the regular three-man crew of the Sacramento-to-San Diego flight. Kapustin said he couldn't confirm the number of persons in the cockpit, but said the recordings provided no indication that either the pilot or copilot was distracted.

"It sounded like a low-level conversation, such as I conducted myself in a jumpseat with another jumpseat rider," Kapustin said, after studying the tapes.

The activities and conversations that take place in the jumpseats have absolutely no relevance to the operations of the flight," Kapustin said.

Increases outnumber decreases 2-1 in supermarket prices, survey shows

Bargain hunters had a hard time tracking down good buys at the super-market last month. An Associated marketbasket survey showed price increases September outnumbered decreases by almost two to one.

The AP drew up a random list of 15 commonly purchased food and nonfood items, checked the price at one supermarket in each of 13 cities on March 1, 1973 and has rechecked on or about the start of each succeeding month. One item, chocolate chip cookies, was dropped from the list at the end of November 1977 because the manufacturer discontinued the package size used in the survey.





BURNET, Texas (AP) — An autopsy has been ordered on the body of a Fort Hood soldier who was shot to death by sheriff's deputies after leading officers on a wild, high-speed chase through two Central Texas counties in a stolen highway patrol

Spec. 4 David Samuel Fullington was killed early Sunday when Burnet County deputies opened fire on him as he crashed through a roadblock about 12 miles east of Burnet on Texas 12, according to Sheriff Roy Hilliard.

"He had tried to run over two of my deputies and me," said Hilliard. "Then he ran this roadblock.

Fullington was deceased by gunfire." But a Department of Public Safety spokesman said officers opened fire only after Fullington raised on hand holding what officers mistook for a

Hilliard declined to comment on details of the shooting. "It's under investigation," he said.

He said Fullington drove through a fence, across a pasture, and back onto the

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


