# Probation clerk suspended pending probe of shooting

Rojelio H. Monje, 21, probation clerk with the 118th District Court probation office has been suspended from his duties pending an investigation into the Saturday night shooting of Joe M. Garcia, 34, of 4204 Parkway.

Garcia remains in the intensive care unit of the Veteran's Administration Medical Center today in critical condition.

"Effective today, ... (Monje) is suspended from all official duties and acts pending a full investigation by the Big Spring Police Department and consideration of the Howard County Grand Jury of the incident which occurred on the night of Oct. 21, during off-duty hours," probation officer Guy Talbot said in

an official statement According to police reports, two cars pulled adjacent to each other on North Scurry, and the occupants of both cars exchanged insults. Garcia got out of his car and approached the other, and according to reports, was struck in the stomach by one of three shots fired from the other car. Police pursued the other vehicle while Garcia was taken by friends to the V.A. Medical Center where he underwent surgery Saturday night. The incident occurred shortly before 8

A warrant for Monje was issued by Justice of the Peace Lulu Adams on the basis of reports taken from witnesses at the scene.

According to Talbot, Monje surrendered to authorities at 11:45 p.m. Saturday after learning that there was a warrant out for his arrest. Monje has been released on \$5,000 bond set by Justice of the Peace Bob

# Gas bill uppermost concern of attorney general candidate

"Declaring the section of the national energy bill on the natural gas act as unconstitutional is probably the most important thing now facing the office of Attorney General of Texas,' Mark White, Democratic candidate for the post, said here today

He made a brief tour of the courthouse visiting court officials, ac-companied by Drew and Clynna Mouton, local campaign coordinators. When White appeared here last spring, he listed narcotics-related

crimes as a top priority. He said today, "I still have this near the top, but the gas act is so important to Texas. I will join two other states, if elected, in hotly pursuing a lawsuit on this matter.'

In connection with the narcoticsrelated crime, he again pointed out, "We need to get the guys at the top. We also need to work well with federal agencies such as the border patrol and immigration. And I would like to call on the federal government for more equipment to help detect planes flying across the border at night.

White continued, "We all know that when the sun goes down, planes fly across the border nightly landing in places, such as areas around here, and unload illicit drugs."

White also said that he would be

Thousands of Big Spring and area residents weathered gusty winds on Saturday and intermittent rain on Sunday to attend the second annual Big Spring Arts and Crafts Festival. The festival, which was the largest to be held in Big Spring's history, is now firmly established as one of the top shows in the state according to topname artists who participated in the

At the close of the festival at 6 p.m. on Sunday, 74 artists and craftsmen had already reserved booths for the third annual festival to be held next October and many more said they would be calling the festival committee this week as to whether they wanted one or two booths for the 1979

Artists such as George Boutwell, Austin; Paul Kime, Helotes; Michael Story, Wichita Falls; Walter Dick, Austin; Bert Gilbert, Lubbock; Donna Lee, Portland; W.A. Smith, Gardendale; Jim Thomas, Amarillo;

Charles McKaskle, Stanton; Jim Alexander, Fulton, Brenda Claxon, Big Spring, M. Caroselli, San Marcos; L.D. Cheatham, Lubbock; F. Delaney, Midland; and Jerry Seagle, Austin, said the show was excellent this year.

Many said the sales were so brisk that they would need to bring much more materials to the show next year and would need two booths instead of one. Some also said they were scheduled to do shows next weekend but would not have enough items to participate in the other shows.

Most of the artists also remarked on how well organized the festival was and on the facility. Many out-of-town artists, who participate in numerous shows throughout Texas and the Southwest each year, said the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum was one of the finest coliseums they had seen

#### Action / reaction: Social Security info

Q. I want to know what the maximum fee is that an employment agency can charge for getting somebody a job.

A: State law regulates the amounts that employment agencies can charge for finding people jobs that pay up to \$8,000 a year in gross salary, says a Texas Department of Labor and Standards spokesman. The maximum legal fee for any job paying up to \$5,000 a year is 4 per cent of the annual gross pay and the fee may go up 1 per cent for each \$1,000 beyond \$5,000 to a maximum of 7 per cent for salaries between \$7,000 and \$8,000. When the salary is to be beyond \$8,000 the fee amount is negotiable between the agency and the job applicant, with no legal ceiling. Whether fees are paid in a lump sum, by the month or some other arrangement is also a matter between agencies and job applicants.

# Krueger, Tower race 'tight'

Democratic challenger Bob Krueger, campaigning in Big Spring today, has a narrow lead over incumbent Republican Sen. John Tower, according to the Texas Monthly poll.

The poll of 1,000 registered voters indicates that by Oct. 7, Krueger was ahead of Tower by a 42.7 to 38.9 statewide percentage, with 17.3 per cent say they are undecided. Only 1.1 per cent sided with La Raza Unida candidate Luis Diaz DeLeon.

Granted the standard margin of error, it's a dead heat, and the election will be decided by the undecided

Those results aren't far from Krueger's own most recent poll, completed Thursday, which shows Krueger with a 42-40 per cent lead over Tower.

It is ludicrous that the major issue developing in the U.S. Senate race is a smear sheet written by a Tennessean and reactions to it, Scott Carpenter, Harte-Hanks election team chief points out.

But both incumbent Republican Sen. John Tower and Democrat challenger Bob Krueger are trying to make the most of the matter.

It all started when Krueger's office sent out copies of a column written by Tom Anderson, an American Party candidate for U.S. Senate in Tennessee, about an unnamed heavy-drinking, woman-chasing member of the Senate. Kruger's office said it was Tower because language in the column obviously referred to one of Tower's fund raising letters.

Tower said Krueger is running a low-level smear campaign and not dealing with issues. Tower promptly canceled all four scheduled television debates.

# Proposed fence would cut down on illegal aliens, officials say

U.S. officials say a proposed fence between this Texas border city and Juarez, Mexico, will help cut down the flow of illegal aliens.

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The plan, however, is drawing fire from critics who compare the 12-foothigh barrier to the Berlin Wall and call it a "Tortilla Curtain.

The U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service plans to start construction on the 61/2-mile-long wall within 60 days. The project would cost about \$1.4 million and take about six months to com-

"This fence will be very much like the fence that exists between East and West Berlin — a symbol of something between two countries," said Gaston De Bayona of Juarez, the city's director of international "What can we say? It's foreboding. It's ominous.

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
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# Older students are actively wooed

The age gap of college students is

A generation or so ago, an individual who went to work im-mediately after leaving high school would never think about enrolling in college again. Today, the college class is made up of students of all ages, including the very old.

Currently, something like 23 per cent of college and university students are on the mature side of 30. Numerically speaking, that figures out to 2.5 million

THE TREND has been under way for several years. Federal Bureau of Education figures covering the 1972-77 period reflect an enrollment increase of 80 per cent for the 30-34 age bracket and 69.7 per cent for individuals 35 years of age and older.

For the same period, the 18 and 19

year olds, the traditional new men and women on campus, registered a gain of only nine per cent.

The mature students are returning to class for a number of reasons. Some grow disenchanted with what they're doing and reason they have no

prospect for advancement.
Others are improving job skills, planning to return to the same companies they left with better educational credentials.

Some are bored with their home and social life and want a change of pace. Many reach the point they can financially afford to quit jobs to pursue educational benefits, whereas their economic circumstance when they were very young allowed no money for enrollment in school.

Women whose children are growing into adulthood or have already

The impact is most noticeable in the two-year schools like Howard College the numerous community colleges which have proliferated in recent decades

Some two-thirds of the students in two-year schools are over 21 years of age and the average of enrolled students is about 30.

JUNIOR COLLEGE officials welcome such students with open arms, it goes without saying, because it enables them to broaden their curriculum.

The influx of the more mature students is most timely because it comes at a time when the wave of students generated by the postwar baby booms is moving away from the campus.

## Points from grave

Jack Anderson,

WASHINGTON - From the grave, the gangster who accepted the CIA mission to kill Cuban Premier Fidel Castro has cried out that the pilot backfired against President John F.

Police believe the late John Roselli was rubbed out, gangland-style, to keep him from talking. But unknown to his executioners, he had already told the startling tale to his attorney Edward P. Morgan, a former FBI official, who tipped off the FBI on March 20, 1967.

WE HAVE obtained a confidential FBI report quoting Morgan's cautious account. Because of attorney-client privilege, he did not identify his informant to the FBI. But he has now acknowledged to us that the details came from Roselli

Morgan told the FBI that his client, with "the highest government ap-proval," had plotted to assassinate Castro. Even to the FBI, this was explosive news in 1967. But Morgan's next statement was even more explosive.

Recounted the FBI report: "The project almost reached fruition when Castro became aware of it and arrested a number of suspects. By pressuring captured suspects, he was able to learn the full details of the plot against him.'

The Cuban leader, as the supreme irony, decided to turn the tables. "He too could engage in the same tactics," Morgan recounted to the FBI. "Castro thereafter employed teams of individuals who were dispatched to the United States for the purpose of assassinating President Kennedy

Morgan explained to the FBI that his clients had planted informants "in key posts ... close to Castro." The clients learned about the counterplot, said Morgan, from "feedback" from

these confidential informants.

Added the FBI report: "Morgan further described how one client, when hearing the statement that Lee Harvey Oswald was the sole assassin of President Kennedy 'laughs with tears in his eyes and shakes his head in apparent disagreement."

Morgan had Roselli's permission to pass on the tip but not the specifics to the FBI. Now that the mobster is dead, Morgan told us he could identify his informant and confirm the story. "Roselli told me very definitely and dramatically about the feedback he got from Cuba on the counterplot against President Kennedy," Morgan

Fidel Castro has denied repeatedly and emphatically that he had anything to do with Kennedy's murder. But Roselli had confided the same story to us, albeit in less certain

We first encountered the debonai Roselli more than seven years ago. We were investigating his role in the CIA plot to assassinate Castro. The CIA case officer, William Harvey, told us that Roselli had been the hero of the abortive adventure. Harvey broke his oath of secrecy because he thought it might help Roselli, who was in trouble with the law. The CIA agent had nothing but praise for Roselli's

In the strictest of confidence, Roselli himself confirmed that he had directed six assassination attempts against Castro. We protected his confidence, so he came to trust us. We were the only newsman he would talk

SPEAKING CRYPTICALLY from a lifetime of Mafia habit, Roselli told us the same basic story that he had outlined to his attorney. He suggested that Castro had enlisted the underworld elements whom he had caught plotting against him. They purportedly belonged to the Santos Trafficante organization.

Working with Cuban intelligence, they supposedly lined up an ex-Marine sharpshooter named Lee Harvey Oswald, who had been active in the pro-Castro movement. It has been established that Oswald called at the Cuban embassy in Mexico City before the dreadful day in Dallas.

According to Roselli's version, Oswald may have shot Kennedy or may have acted as a decoy while others ambushed him from closer range. When Oswald was picked up, Roselli suggested, the underworld conspirators feared he would crack and disclose information that might lead to them. This would have brought a massive U.S. crackdown on the

So Jack Ruby was ordered to eliminate Oswald, making it appear as an act of reprisal against the president's killer. At least this is how the late mobster explained the tragedy in Dallas.

There is no proof, of course, to support Roselli's version. He also modified his story when he was hauled behind close doors to the Senate Intelligence Committee.

# Blood pressure medicines

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Are there blood pressure medicines that do not cause depression? My friends have high blood pressure and have no trouble with their medication. But I am on four kinds and become so deeply depressed I quit them. When I do, the depression lifts and I feel fine. My doctor is very unhappy about this and lets me know it. Also, please tell me what part a diuretic actually plays

There are several anti-hypertension drugs. Some act on the nervous system, and may cause depression. Some just lower blood volume (diuretics). You don't specify just which drugs you are using (when the spirit moves you to use them). Many of these drugs contain compounds that may cause weakness and depression. Your friends might have less serious blood pressure problems and need less potent medicines than you do. That might account for their lack of


in lowering blood pressure. - Mrs.

symptoms. Simple diuretics lower blood pressure by removing fluid volume, also by changing the balance of the blood, chiefly the amounts of sodium and potassium. Excessive loss of potassium can cause a depressed state. There are medicines that promote fluid loss without causing potassium depletion.

Drugs can sometimes be an all-toohandy way of treating mild hypertension. Did you know, for example, that weight loss, if needed, can by itself lower pressure and reduce the need for drugs? With many high blood pressure patients the fault lies with themselves. I am thinking of the obese patient who just will not try to reduce. The physician cannot follow the patient home and arrange meals. In this situation, the doctor turns to drugs as a certain alternative in control.

I don't say this is your problem, but if it is, act accordingly. Sit down for a frank discussion with your doctor about your alternatives.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My 26-year-old wife had her spleen removed when she was 11 years old. In fact, she was written up in a medical journal by her physician. Now she says she needs a

shot to present pneumonia because she does not have a spleen. Is this true? We are planning a family soon. and are wondering what problems the lack of spleen poses for children -The spleen is a relatively large

organ in the upper left quarter of the abdomen under the ribs. Among other substances it produces are those to help clear the blood of infecting organisms. When it's missing there is increased potential for infection. It is best to be protected. The pneumonia vaccine you refer to is relatively new, but effective against a variety of those germs. Her spleen surgery should have no effect on any children.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My friend tells us green vegetables contain cholesterol. Is this true? I thought it came from animal products alone. —

You thought right. Plants and vegetables do not contain cholesterol. non-vegetable foods do.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Can a young man develop prostate gland trouble from getting V.D.? — B.B. Indeed, he can.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Explain about Morton's neuroma. The doctor told me this is my problem. I have tried to get information about it. So far, no luck. - V.M.J.

It is known as "Morton's toe," a very painful condition usually (between third and fourth toes) due to a small tumor on the nerve serving the toe. Special arch supports can help.

The only permanent cure is surgery to remove the tumor.

FOR MRS. W.O. — It can take some time to completely recover from a bout of mononucleosis. In that respect your son's poor performance at r certainly mis be laid to that. Many college careers have been knocked flat by the "mono" bug. Talk to his counselor about this.

CONFIDENTIAL TO R.L. -Testing the infant for blood type might prove who is NOT the father. It's more complicated than this, but basically, that's the "bottom line," as they say.

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

in 1972. Following congressional approval of extension, Phyllis Schlafly, national chairman of Stop ERA, predicted it would be challenged in court.

Mrs. Schlafly argued that the only measures that can have legal effect are laws "passed by a majority of both houses and then signed by the president," con-stitutional amendments approved by two-thirds vote and ratified by the states and treaties signed by the president and ratified by

two-thirds of the Senate. She argues that the ERA extension -- a resolution rather than an act of Congress - is "none of these and therefore cannot have any legal effect.'

The ERA, outlawing discrimination on the basis of sex, requires ratification by 38 state legislatures to become part of the Constitution. It has been ratified by 35, but those of Idaho, Kentucky, Nebraska and Tennessee later voted to withdraw their approval. The Justice Department has said it will be up to Congress to determine whether the

withdrawals are valid. The extension marks the first time Congress has granted additional time for ratification of a constitutional amendment after setting a deadline. It did not set any deadlines until 1917 but has called for ratification within seven years in the cases of most recent amendments.

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
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# Third parties paying majority of medical bills; increase likely

While politicians argue about national health insurance, consumers are left to seek their own protection and individuals can find that thousands of dollars depend

on their making the right decision.

A report issued last week by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare said 57 percent of all medical bills were paid by third parties, including government and private insurers, in 1975. By the year 2000, third parties are expected to pay 75 percent of the bills.

An estimated 80 percent of the population is covered by some type of health insurance; Americans pay over \$20

A new government publication, "How to

Shop for Health Insurance," issued by HEW's Public Health Service, offers some help for consumers. It is available, at no charge, from Consumer Information Center, Dept. 582G, Pueblo, Colo., 81009.

Most health insurance is sold to groups - of employees, association members, etc. Group coverage is usually cheaper than individual protection and is often more comprehensive. The disadvantage of group insurance is that when you leave the group, you lose the coverage. You probably can convert your policy to an

individual one, but you are likely to pay more for less protection. There are two basic types of coverage:

hospital and medical-surgical. Basic hospital coverage provides protection against hospital bills for such items as room, food, x-rays, laboratory tests, drugs and use of operating room facilities. Some plans provide what are called service benefits. These plans cover the full cost of hospital expenses for a specified number of days. Other plans offer indemnity benefits; they pay a stated

amount or percentage of the costs. Basic medical-surgical coverage is designed to pay doctors' bills you incur while hospitalized. You will get a list of the amounts allowed for different types of operations \$150 for an appendectomy, for example. The allowance may or may not cover the surgeon's actual bill; it depends on your policy and your doctor. Some medical-surgical policies - the more expensive ones — cover the costs of a doctor's services in your home or at his or her office, as well as in the hospital.

These basic policies are not intended to insure you against the cost of a major

# China, Japan sign peace treaty today

TOKYO (AP) - World War II enemies China and Japan concluded a peace treaty today which Chinese Vice Premier Teng Hsiaoping said would contribute to friendship "for generations to come.

Many Japanese newspapers hailed the start of a "New Era" after the exchange of instruments of ratification of the pact signed in Peking Aug. 12, some 33 years after hostilities ended.

Teng and Prime Minister Takeo Fukuda witnessed the final signatures on the brief documents by their foreign ministers, toasted each other with champagne, then kissed on both cheeks.

After murmuring "kampai," Japanese for "long life," Teng said the "helps build more treaty solid foundations for relations between our two countries. He added it would intensify

political, economic, cultural and scientific exchanges as well as safeguard peace in Asia and the Pacific. He also invited Fukuda to visit

The peace treaty follows a series of multibillion-dollar deals between the two countries which link Japan to China's drive to become a modern industrial power by the year 2000. Though China and Japan

established diplomatic relations in 1972 the peace pact expected to follow soon after ran into opposition from the Soviet Union and pro-Taiwan ultra-rightists. Following years of hesitation, Japan signed

no military clauses, aimed at

However, Moscow claims the treaty is a plot to create an anti-Soviet military alliance of Japan, China and the United States because the pact opposes hegemony, dominance, which the Russians interpret as aimed at them.

A rightist carrying a protest note against the treaty tried to rush into Fukuda's private residence this morning, but was halted by a policeman. Following the conclusion

of the treaty, Teng and other Chinese leaders with him on his eight-day visit to Japan were received by Emperor Hirohito and the empress for a state luncheon at the imperial palace.


