

Proposed fence would cut down on illegal aliens, officials say

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — U.S. officials say a proposed fence between this Texas border city and Juarez, Mexico, will help cut down the flow of illegal aliens.

The plan, however, is drawing fire from critics who compare the 12-foot-high barrier to the Berlin Wall and call it a "Tortilla Curtain."

Fences now separate El Paso from its Mexican neighbor along most of the wall site's length, but Border Patrol agents claim they are easy to cut, climb and tunnel under.

The new five-foot steel

She explained that in those days, you could take a test on 23 subjects after you were 16 years old and get a teacher's certificate.

She turned 17 in the December that she was working in Sparenburg. She remembered that the school was across the road from a small house and the post office.

The mail wagon stopped every other day. "It drove up to Lamesa one day and back the next," she recalled.

Mrs. Turner said that their family moved from Anson to Tahoka in a covered wagon. Her father was Wesley Swann. She said he and her mother's two brothers had the Swann and Shook Realty firm, one of the early ones in that part of the state.

She recalled that the lumber for their house was freighted from Big Spring. A wagon pulled by mules would bring in lumber anytime anybody built a home around Tahoka," she related. "It would take about two weeks."

She said that they would come to Big Spring twice a year "to shop for staples and drygoods. It really was an exciting trip," she laughed.

She didn't move to Big Spring until in recent years. She and her husband lived in El Paso most of their married life and then moved down to Ingleside on the Gulf Coast because they liked to fish and "it was 30 minutes to fishing," she laughed.

But when he became terminally ill, she moved back to Big Spring to be near Lucibelle since they were the only members of the family left.

She recalls coming to a musical program in a tent one week in Big Spring that was "a really fine musician. It sticks in my head it may have been Paul Whitman in his early days."

But she said that she especially remembers riding into Big Spring in the surrey behind those "two beautiful horses."

And she never dreamed in those days that she would ever move here permanently. But she's done it. And enjoys it and still likes to go out around Sparenburg — one of the many areas where I ride fence.

Fast-moving cold front hits Texas

A fast-moving cold front, accompanied by howling wind gusts of up to 40 mph and some rain, moved across western and northern portions of Texas today.

Forecasters said most of the state could expect cooler temperatures, cloudy skies and some light rain as the front moved through the state. Highs were expected to range from the lower 40s

in the Panhandle to the 70s and 80s in far South Texas.

Wind gusts of up to 40 mph were reported Sunday night and early today in the Panhandle. Rain was widespread over western portions of the state, but initial reports indicated the rainfall was mostly light. Midland had .79 of an inch, El Paso had .41 and San Angelo had .18.

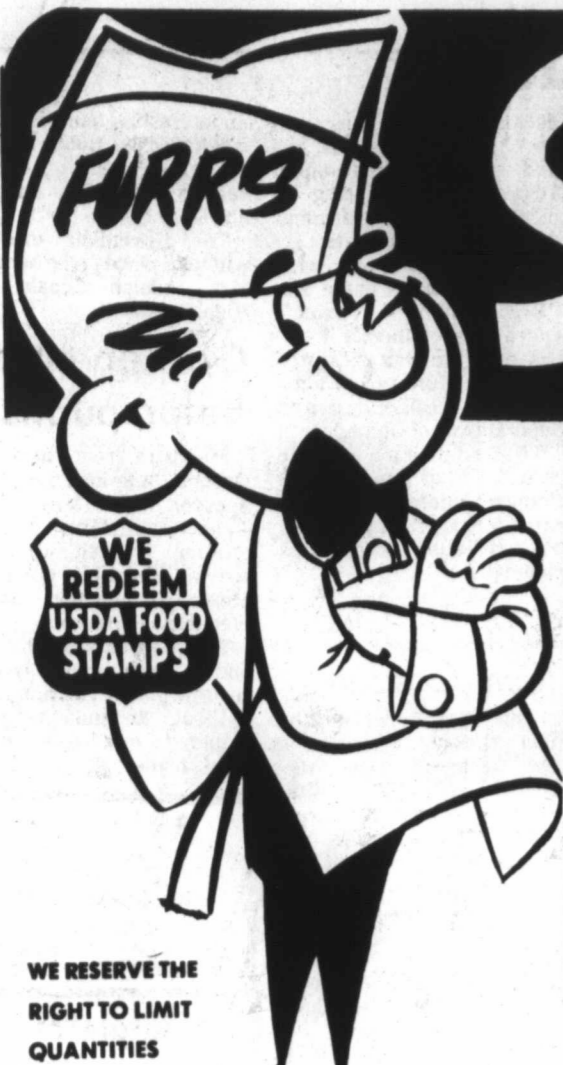

Third parties paying majority of medical bills; increase likely

While politicians argue about national health insurance, consumers are left to seek their own protection and individuals can find that thousands of dollars depend on their making the right decision.

A report issued last week by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare said 57 percent of all medical bills were paid by third parties, including government and private insurers, in 1975. By the year 2000, third parties are expected to pay 75 percent of the bills.

An estimated 80 percent of the population is covered by some type of health insurance; Americans pay over \$20

billion a year in premiums.

A new government publication, "How to Shop for Health Insurance," issued by HEW's Public Health Service, offers some help for consumers. It is available, at no charge, from Consumer Information Center, Dept. 582G, Pueblo, Colo., 81009.

Most health insurance is sold to groups — of employees, association members, etc. Group coverage is usually cheaper than individual protection and is often more comprehensive. The disadvantage of group insurance is that when you leave the group, you lose the coverage. You probably can convert your policy to an

individual one, but you are likely to pay more for less protection.

There are two basic types of coverage: hospital and medical-surgical.

Basic hospital coverage provides protection against hospital bills for such items as room, food, x-rays, laboratory tests, drugs and use of operating room facilities. Some plans provide what are called service benefits. These plans cover the full cost of hospital expenses for a specified number of days. Other plans offer indemnity benefits; they pay a stated amount or percentage of the costs.

Basic medical-surgical coverage is

designed to pay doctors' bills you incur while hospitalized. You will get a list of the amounts allowed for different types of operations \$150 for an appendectomy, for example. The allowance may or may not cover the surgeon's actual bill; it depends on your policy and your doctor. Some medical-surgical policies — the more expensive ones — cover the costs of a doctor's services in your home or at his or her office, as well as in the hospital.

These basic policies are not intended to insure you against the cost of a major illness.
