Record Cotton Harvest Continues Full-Speed

Parmer County's 1996 cotton crop is edging close to a finish, with predictions of a bumper or near-

bumper crop.

"If things go right, the farmers could be 90 to 95 per cent through with their harvest. We're way behind on the ginning. We have almost as many bales stored in modules as we've ginned," said Jerry Butman, manager of Friona Farmers Co-op

Gin.

The cotton price is fluctuating between 60 and if formers average two 65 cents per pound, and if farmers average two bales per acre, as many are expected to do, they can make some money on their cotton.

Except for a brief delay from the early snow in

October, the weather has proven favorable for harvesting. Many farmers have been seen stripping after dark during the past few weeks.



FRIONA WINS, 27-6

ChiefsWhack Monahans; Make It to New Plateau

In all of its football history, Friona High School had never made it to the third round of the playoffs, but the 1996 Chieftains took care of that obstacle last Friday.

Playing before a large crowd of Friona supporters (and not nearly as many from Monahans) the Chiefs handed the Loboes their only loss of the season, 27-6, in a great defensive and offensive performance. performance.

performance. Winning the coin toss, Friona elected to "defer" and let Monahans have the ball first: That decision looked a bit shaky about four minutes

Led by their big (210 pound) running back Tyler Lee (#33), and his teammate Lucas Jaquez (30), Monahans marched the length of the field. Lee rambled 19 yards on the first offensive play, and Jaquez had runs of 12 and 15 yards.

With the ball at the Friona 15, Lee gained seven, then eight yards, and the Loboes were on the scoreboard first. Andy Kendrick burst through to block the point-after attempt, which held the score to 6-0.

Quarterback Kyle Grimsley fought for 11 yards for Friona's first first down, but three plays later the Chiefs had to punt and Monahans had the ball back.

The teams traded pass interceptions, Grimsley suffering only his second pickoff of the season, and Monahans started the second quarter with a first and goal on the Friona eight.

At this point, Friona's defense "sucked it up a notch." Outstanding defensive plays by Perry Hanes, Hugo Santiago and Eloy Trejo left the Loboes facing a fourth and goal from Friona's three-yard line.

top runner, Lee, who tried to
go up the middle, but was
stuffed by Chieftain
linebacker Quint Ellis, with a
supporting cast, and the
Chieftains had held. A score
at that point would have put
them in a two-touchdown
deficit.

On second down, Kendrick ran the ball out to Friona's ten, and it brought up a third-and-ten situation. Monahans' defense crowded the line, hoping to stop the play and get the ball back in favorable field position.

Instead, the Chieftain line opened a hole and Kendrick charged through practically untouched.

Andy found himself in the open at about the 25-yard line, and from there it was a footrace between the Friona senior and one lone challenger. Kendrick won the race-a 90-yard scoring run.

Kicker Angel Vega split the uprights, and the Chiefs had taken their first lead at 7-6 with 9:15 left before half.

Asked what his thoughts were when he saw daylight and found himself in the clear, Kendrick said "I was just trying to run faster. I could feel someone bearing down on me, and I was wishing I could go a little faster."

Andy credited his line with making the long scoring run possible. "I had great blocking on the play. Charlie Milner had a great block, along with the other linemen, and then Quint (Ellis) hit their linebacker, and that really broke the play open."

The 90-yard run is the longest scoring play for Friona since 1981. Nelson Jackson also had a 90-yarder for the Chieftains in 1981 against Olton and certifier.

Andy will be happy to know that his run is by far the longest scoring play for FHS in a playoff contest.

The back-to-back successes by the Chieftain defense and offense suddenly brought about a shift in momentum.

Monahans quarterback Brandon Stephens (who went to school with many of the Chieftains while in grade school-junior high) ran 20 yards to give his team a first down at the Friona 40.

But on the next play, Aaron King picked off Stephens' pass at the Friona 30, and ran up the sidelines 25 yards, to the Monahans 45.

45.
Grimsley hit Ellis over the middle for a first down, and facing third and one, Daniel Cuevas got the "one," to keep the drive alive at the Lobos'

Cuevas got the "one," to keep the drive alive at the Lobos' 23.

Grimsley and Cuevas had gains, and then Kendrick, on his first carry since the 90-yarder, slashed nine yards to the Monahans four. They ran the same play, and Kendrick hit the end zone for the score.

Vega's perfect kick made it Friona 14, Monahans 6, with 2:22 remaining before halftime.

Monahans used the clock, and drove to Friona's 20-yard line with 19 seconds left in the period. But on a fourth down play, King again made the interception, and that ended the half with Friona owning the 14-6 lead.

The Chieftain offense sputtered to begin the second half. But when Vega's punt was bobbled, Fidel Rodriguez was right there to recover for Friona at midfield.

Grimsley connected with Vega for a nine-yard gain, and then Kendrick, in his first carry of the second half, burst through the line for an 18-yard gain to the Monahans 22.

Friona seemed sure to score, but on a fourth and one, David Shelby was stopped for no gain, and the Lobos took over.

Monahans set up on their own 14, and started a drive. Jaquez burst into the secondary, saw daylight, but was taken down in a great open-field tackle by Grimsley, who may have saved a touchdown.

After that, good defensive plays by Hugo Santiago, Shane Blackburn and others stopped the drive and Frionatok over on their own 22.

On the first play of the final quarter, Kendrick picked up 14 yards to Friona's 46. On a third and four, Shelby made just enough for the first down.

Four plays later, the drive seemed to have stalled, at the Monahans 29. But on fourth down, Grimsley cooly arched a rainbow pass, and Vega came open at about the

At this point, thick fingers of fog began to envelope the stadium, and it got progressively worse as the last minutes were played. By game's end, the folks on Friona's home side couldn't even see the stands across the way.

The Chiefs then ran out

the clock, and after Grimsley kneeled down on the final play, the Chieftains and their fans celebrated Friona's first-ever area-round win.

Kendrick slashed, sprinted and legged his way for 227 yards rushing, becoming the first Chieftain back to top the 200-yard mark since 1990 (see separate story). Andy picked the second-round game to come up with his best effort of the season.

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Kendrick Lands Spot On All-Time List

When Friona fullback Andy Kendrick logged 227 yards while leading the Chieftains past Monahans in last Friday's fantastic 27-6 win over Monahans in the Area playoff game, he landed a spot on the top ten list of Chieftain runningbacks who have topped the 200-yard gained plateau in a single game.

Kendrick is the first Chieftain since Ismael Rocha gained 243 yards against River Road in 1990 to top the 200-yard mark, and is only the second Chieftain to hit that lofty mark since 1987, when Daniel Echols had a 218-yard game against Pampa.

His total of 227 yards

had a 218-yard game against Pampa.
His total of 227 yards against the Lobo(e)s ranks Andy seventh on the list of Chieftains who have topped or approached the 200-yard level.

Tony Perea, Friona's big, hard-charging fullback from the 1968 team, set the record for the most yardage in a single game, with 258 yards against Crosbyton in 1968.



Perea's name will be found on the list six times. He set the single-season record of 1,761 yards in 1968, and holds the career record as well, having gained a total of 2,823 yards in three years on the Chieftain varsity.

Perea was a workhorse runningback, especially in his senior year, when he carried the ball 274 times. On the accompanying list, you can see where he carried the ball 43 times in his 217-yard game against Lockney. Just for comparison, the entire Chieftain team had the same number of carries in their win over Monahans.

By coincidence, Kendrick's father, Danny, was the quarterback on the 1968 and 1969 Chieftain teams, and nanded the ball off to both Perea and Cordova, the first and second-place individuals on the yards rushing list.



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



A. Kendrick Joins "90 & Above" Club

When Andy Kendrick ran 90 yards for the goahead touchdown against Monahans last Friday in
Friona's area playoff game, he joined a very elite
group of Chieftain running backs who have run 90
or more yards on one play.

In fact, you can count these players on the
fingers of one hand.

The all-time record run by a Friena Chieftain is

The all-time record run by a Friona Chieftain is held by J. W. Baxter, who raced 97 yards for a score against Farwell in 1958.

Ted King ran 93 yards for a touchdown against Springlake in 1973, and Nelson Jackson duplicated that for a score against Farwell in 1981.

Halfback Milton Hargus ran 92 yards for a touchdown against Farwell to help the Chieftains break their 27-game losing streak in the first game of the season in 1963. Hargus duplicated his 92-yard run a week later against Sudan, to get his name on the list twice

name on the list twice.

Nelson Jackson, who had the 93-yard run listed above, came back with a 90-yard scamper against Olton in the last game of the 1981 season, to also make the list a second time.

When Kendrick logged his 90-yard run, he became only the fifth player to make a run that long--and the first Chieftain to do it in a playoff

Even the school's all-time rushing leader, Tony Perea, who rang up 10 games of gaining 100 yards or more, and six games gaining 200 yards or more, never had a run of 90 yards or more. His longest

listed run was 82 yards.





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Additional Sugar Acreage Is Needed Locally

The Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association is asking farmers to commit additional and new sugar beet acres for next year's production by December 15 to help maintain a secure regional sugar industry, says association president Kenneth Frye.

Regional beet acres are grown from as far south as Plainview, as far north as Dalhart and in Eastern New Mexico for processing at the Holly Sugar Corp. Hereford processing plant. Together, farmers and Holly generate millions of dollars for the regional economy, including about \$20 million paid directly to farmers.

"This year, about 350 regional beet farmers are harvesting about 14,000 beet acres for processing," says Frye. "At that level, the plant is operating at only 37 per cent capacity.

"For the plant to at least break even or turn a small profit, we must increase our acreage numbers to 25,000. That will help us maintain a healthy regional sugar industry."

Roger Hill, Holly president and chief executive officer, says that in order for Holly to make plant maintenance and other decisions for 1997, the company must have a commitment of more acres by December 15.

"In order for this factory to return to profitability, a minimum of 25,000 acres must be committed for next year," says Hill. "With the better sugar prices we're seeing now and expect to see in the years ahead we are confident that we will have sufficient acres to enhance the financial returns to both growers and our company."

Bill Cleavinger, association executive director, stresses that "sugar beets are a vital alternative crop" for area corn, cotton, grain sorghum and wheat producers.

"In the mid- to late

1980s, large grain and cotton surpluses caused prices to decrease for those crops," says Cleavinger. "However, growers were able to partially offset the lower prices by increasing their beet acres.

"We are again looking at increased grain and cotton production that is projected to cause lower prices. That's why we must make sure we have the option to raise sugar beets as an alternative crop."

Frye says growers have or will receive a return-requested card on which they are asked to commit acres for 1997. Current growers and others wishing to commit beet acres for next year may also contact the TNMSBGA office at (806) 364-6402, or the

Holly Agricultural Department at (806) 364-6475.

"The growers association believes it is well within our abilities to reach the 25,000 acre commitment," says Frye.
"We believe our regional sugar industry will remain strong and that it will continue to provide us with an alternative crop that has helped many of us through tough years in the past."

Hill adds, "Holly has been part of the Hereford-Panhandle area community since the mid-1960s. We are confident that Holly and this area's growers will continue to have a strong working partnership which benefits all of us," says Hill.



Improved Irrigation Efficiency: Just One Benefit Of Center Pivots

Use of several center pivot

Hancock operates eight
center pivot irrigation systems
on more than 1,000 acres of
cotton. During the past six
years, Hancock has installed
these center pivot sprinklers
on 400 acres west of Wolfforth
in Lubbock County and on
625 acres near New Home in
Lynn County.

625 acres near New Home in Lynn County.

"I started irrigating my land with row watering," he said. "I was able to grow a good crop, but I soon realized that about half the field was not getting enough water due to the uneven distribution of row watering."

Upgrading from furrow irrigation to a center pivot

Upgrading from furrow irrigation to a center pivot sprinkler system improved his irrigation application efficiency and provided notable results from a management standpoint. "A center pivot system reduces labor, improves water distribution, and increases management convenience," Hancock said.

Seven of the eight pivots he operates are Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) systems. "The LEPA system has allowed me to make the most of my available water. With only three gallons of water available per acre, the use of LEPA drops on 80-inch centers is a plus," he said.

Hancock installs furrow dikes under his pivot to reduce water losses caused by runoff. "Runoff is a potential problem since most of the

land that I farm is sloped. The furrow dikes hold water in place until it is absorbed into the soil, so the crop can get maximum use from it."

He also uses Potential Evapotranspiration (PET) data to guide his irrigation decisions during the growing season. This helps maximize his crop yield while increasing water use efficiency.

"By keeping accurate records of heat units and the amount of rainfall received, I know how much moisture is in the soil profile. This helps me better determine how fast the soil moisture is being depleted, so I know when to water a field," said Hancock.

Each of the Hancock's pivots run on a 60-hour schedule. "It's important to have the ability to get across your field fast while using less manpower, applying less water, and achieving greater yield," he said.

After using center pivot irrigation for several years, Hancock says he is now able to see that row watering actually cut his potential production in half at times. With the pivots, he expects his yield to stand at about one and a half bales (750 pounds) of cotton per acre.

"Pivots are a good tool," said Hancock. "There is a lot to them. They give you flexibility in deciding when to begin-watering your crop, the amount of water to apply, allowing late season watering in small amounts, if needed, and offering farmers the ability to apply fertilizer efficiently through the system without use of a tractor."

When deciding if center pivot irrigation would best meet irrigation needs, Hancock says producers have to the \$30,000+ cost per pivot and look at the benefits of the sprinklers and by using them, it will reduce labor and lower energy costs enough to pay back the investment.

"Looking at it this way, the expense is justified, and a

Pivot Use Spreading In District

This dramatic increase in center pivot sprinkler use becomes quite apparent when one compares the 1990 pivot inventory map to the 1995 inventory map.

Use of center pivot sprinkler systems allows High Plains producers to reduce labor and fuel costs, while improving irrigation application efficiencies. Farmers are able to maintain current crop yields with less water.

After six years of center pivot use, Hancock says the sophistication of LEPA center pivots has made him a believer. "I feel that the more innovative you can be with an irrigation system, the more efficient you will be with your crop."

Oh, what a difference a week can make. Above average temperatures and very low humidity accelerated the High Plains cotton harvest to full speed over the past week, according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG).

The weather conditions might have been considered ideal if not for the gusty winds which visited the area for several days. Fortunately, the wind never kept area producers out of their fields.

The result is that the Lubbock and Lamesa USDA Cotton classing offices processed approximately 1.2 million bales through Thursday and many area cotton gins are reporting significant backlogs on their yards. With the good weather, it appears the High Plains harvest has now passed the halfway mark.

Unfortunately, the pace could slow considerably in the days leading up to Thanksgiving. Forecasters were predicting a drop in temperatures and an increase in the chances of rain, snow or a combination of the two.

Estimates for the 1996 crop continue to be very close to the 2.81 million bales reported by USDA on November 12. The good news for producers is that it appears the cotton crop could even wind up slightly larger than USDA's November estimate which is reported statistically as 480-pound bales. Cotton bales normally average closer to 495-poundeach.

the Lubbock and Lamesa classing offices, which reflect production in actual bales, shows they expect to receive samples from 2.75-2.8 million bales. Converting 2.75 million

actual bales to statistical bales would mean a 1996 High Plains crop of 2.83 million 480-pound bales.

"High Plains producers are once again pulling an outstanding crop from their fields," notes Donald Johnson, PCG executive vice president.
"Even though they are harvesting their best fields first, it appears a large majority of the cotton fields that have made it to harvest are producing yields above grower expectations."


A decision by the Supreme Court is expected in the next one to two months.

Lawyers for both the TBWEF and the Hale County plaintiffs were given the opportunity to present their case before the Court. Attorneys for both sides were asked questions by members of the Court pertaining to different aspects of the situation.

Boll weevil populations continue to increase throughout the High Plains.

Since the original lawsuit was filed in 1995 by ten Hale County producers opposing the eradication program, the boll weevil has continued its spread across the High Plains region.

Hampered by a lack of collections in 1996, the High Plains program was unable to fully address the situation during the recently completed Fall diapause spraying program.

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Fifth Graders Complete "Water Wise" Program

Approximately 99 fifth grade students at Friona Elementary School know more about water and the importance of water conservation after successfully completing the "Learning To Be Water Wise and Energy Efficient" pilot urban water conservation program in November.

The program, sponsored

Efficient pilot urban water conservation program in November.

The program, sponsored by the High Plains Underground Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock, is designed to encourage water conservation through hands-on experience and classroom education.

"This has been a wonderful program for the kids," said Sheri Taylor, fifth grade science instructor at Friona Elementary School. With their parents' help, the fifth graders installed a free low-flow kitchen faucet aerator, a bathroom faucet aerator, a bathroom faucet aerator and a low-flow showerhead in their homes. In addition, they conducted home water use audits that allowed them to determine the amount of water normally used each day in the shower, the bathroom sink.

Classroom activities in the program helped emphasize the importance of water conservation to the students. Taylor said that the activities have helped both students and parents discover ways that they can conserve water in their daily routines.

"The students' involvement has been really great. They went above and beyond the provided activities. In fact, one student even built a model water treatment plant.

Mrs. Taylor said that she had been assisting her class

"We have been making
water conservation booklets
that we plan to share with
students in the lower grades.

In order to let the community know what we have been studying, we have also made posters that depict or list ways to conserve water which we will hang in the windows of some of the local businesses.

"I was very pleased with this program and the enthusiasm it seemed to generate in the students. All the students did a wonderful job," Mrs. Taylor said.

Friona ISD is one of four school districts participating in the Water District's pilot water conservation education program. Lubbock-Cooper ISD completed their "Water Wise" program in October while Hale Center and Morton ISDs will begin teaching it in 1997.

"We are pleased with the initial student/teacher feedback from these two school districts regarding the 'Water Wise' program," said Carmon McCain, High Plains Water District's information/education director. "Several other showerheads were returned to us, and we hope to test them in order to see how much water the fifth grade students saved with the installation of the new low-flow showerheads," he said.

Data collected from these schools' involvement will be used to determine if "Learning To Be Water Wise" should be implemented within the remainder of the 15-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area.

NRCS Will Assist With **Conservation Measures**

The Natural Resources Conservation Service of the U.S.D.A. provides technical assistance to individuals, groups and organizations in planning and applying conservation practices and systems to reduce soil erosion and to protect and conserve water.




