Fine Recipes For **Preparing Tomatoes**

Another Salad—Cut a small hole in the top of a large tomato and fill with chopped cucumber, onion, cabbage or cauliflower and the tomato which was taken out. Serve on a lettuce leaf with mayonnaise and parsley chopped fine with onion and vinegar.

Green Fried Tomatoes-Have large, smooth, green tomatoes Slice and let stand in salt water 10 or 15 minutes. Tablespoon of salt to one quart of water. Roll the slices in flour and fry a rich brown up and sprinkle with sugar.

Tomato Omelet-Beat six eggs separately; add a tablespoon of fine bread crumbs to the volks, a half teaspoonful of sweet milk, salt and pepper to taste. Cut two or three eggs dipped in mayonnaise fine, ripe tomatoes in half inch blocks, add the whites, then the tomatoes. Cook quickly, butter and serve immediately.







Homestead Entries

For the last year or more public ands in the Western States have been designated by the Secretary of the Interior as subject to entry under the so-called enlarged homestead act, or the 320 acres homestead act, only on petition of those who desire to avail themselves of the provisions of this law. This procedure was an outgrowth of a desire of the Department to designate no lands which were not actually enterable under the law in question. In order to accomplish this end the status of each tract had to be investigated to determine whether it was already entered, was a school section, was involved in a State selection, or for any other reason had been taken out of the class of "unappropriated" public lands which are alone enterable under this act. Small Flock Fattening Best For Market Poultry

That chickens intended for market should be divided into small flocks and should be fed heavily them range in a small grass enclosure is the belief of Prof. James G. Halpin, of the College of Agriculture of the University of Wisconsin. It has been found that as rule the average farmer pays little or no attention to the fattening of his market fowls, taking them to market directly from the range.

A mixture of four parts of ground corn and one part of wheat bran mixed with enough sour skim milk to make it crumbly moist is the rateion best adapted to small flocks, according to Prof. Halpin, who recommends that they be fed only such quantities of the feed as they will clean up in 20 minutes.
