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## **Clyde To Open New Cemetery**

Plans are being drafted for the newly acquired 15-acre tract for a City Cemetery, according to Mayor Cleve Young. The acreage which lies south of the Clyde cemetery and sep-arated from it by the Denton-Oplin Farm Highway, was re-cently purchased by the City of Clyde for \$350 an acre, or a total of \$5,250.

The area will be cut up into three sections—one for family plots, one for general use and one for individual-lot purchas-ers.

A restriction by the City Commission will require that all grave markers lie flat and even with the surface to enable mow-ers and other tools to be used without difficulty.

without difficulty. The present cemetery, which lies north of the proposed city-owned burial area and just across the street from the Ciyde Public School plant, has been a community - operated affair. It has been depleted of most avail-able burial plots, Mayor Young said.
