BANKING REFORM WANTED. Texas Senate and House Adopt Resolutions Urging Immediate

Action. Both the Texas senate and house of representatives have adopted resolutions calling upon the Texas delegation in congress to urge and insist upon adequate monetary reform immediately. It is sought to have this question disposed of during the first days of the special session to be called by President Wilson. The resolution was offered in the senate by McNealus of Dallas, Brelsford of Eastland, and Johnson of Hall; in the house by McKamy of Dallas: Wortham of Tarrant; Tarver of Navarro; Coffey of McLennan: Kirby of Harris; Field of Falls; Cooper of Jefferson, Lewellyn of Dallas, Byrne, of Bastrop; and Ro-

gers of Wise, The resolution follows:

"Whereas, the stabliity and efficiency of the banking and credit organization is fundamentally essential, and the National democracy has pledged to the country a speedy and adequate revision of our universally admitted defective system, and,

"Whereas. President-elect Wilson, being impressed with the urgent need for speedy revision, has been reported Night Phone 17 as having concluded to submit the question with the tariff, to the extraordinary session of congress which he will call, and,

> "Whereas, the democracy of Texas in convention assembled, has demanda rehabilitation of the monetary system by such revision of the National Banking Laws as will decentralize you right. Green & Smith. the contol of the nation's money and commercial credit; providing a system that will safeguard it from domination by sectional or particular financial or political influence, at the same time being fair to the honest business, farming and laboring interests of the whole country; and a proision for the use of bonded warehouse receipts; therefore,
