THE PECOS PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Pecos Public High Schools Auspiciously Open.—Nearly Four Hundred Enrolled

School opened September 1, 1913, and three hundred and twenty-six pupils were enrolled the first day. More pupils have been enrolling every day and now the enrollment is three hundred and fifty-two. This is the largest enrollment in the history of the school at this time of the year. We have enrolled new pupils from every part of Reeves County, and from almost all the adjoining counties. Many parts of Texas and many states are represented in the school this year. A few days ago a certificate was sent to Pecos Public Schools from the State Department of Education at Austin, Texas, certificate shows that the State Department recognizes the excellent work that our school is doing and has given us a classification as good as the best in Texas.

The teachers and pupils are at work with a will and a determination to make this the best year's work in the history of our schools.

I have never seen better cooperation than we have enjoyed from patrons and pupils. Every child in school has been supplied with books and working material without the word of complaint from parents. This is a remarkable record and reflects a splendid school interest on the part of the parents. All the teachers appreciate this and wish to thank patrons, pupils and the City for their generous treatment.

No "missed rods" have been given the pupils and if our present good record continues from our pupils more will be given. Pupils should be proud because it is right and no blame they have to.

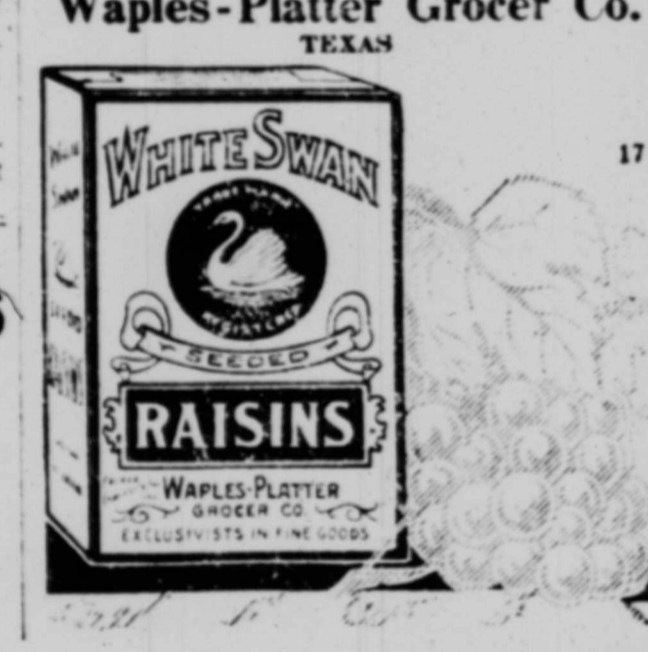

MIDLAND COLLEGE TO BE OPENED UP SOON

September 29 Has Been Selected As the Date for the Beginning of the Session of 1913-14.

The board of directors of Midland College met Wednesday afternoon at the office of E. F. Elkin and organized for more effective work. The report was made that satisfactory arrangements had been completed for carrying the small indebtedness of the institution and that a number of substantial citizens had guaranteed all expenses of the school for the coming year. Those expenses are to include the salaries of an able and experienced faculty and an equipment adequate for junior college work and affiliations with the leading institutions of this State and other states as determined by the inter-collegiate standard for college entrance.

F. G. Jones, of McKinney, Texas, was elected president and authorized to begin the organization of the college. Committees were appointed to get the building in condition and assist in securing service and food. So much work was done as the day of meeting. It was decided to start the school in the building in the fall in the several excellent buildings which indicated a willingness to take them. The board further authorized the purchase of a building for girls' boarding at a site.

It was also decided to purchase a building for the next five years.

The board had arranged from the number of members and applications that are being made to carry the students and materials, and they fully expect to open on September 29th.

Professor Jones, president of Midland College, is a graduate of the University of Texas and has been in the profession of teaching since 1891. **MIDLAND BAPTISTS
DEALING WITH
THE DANCE**

Baptist Church Officials Speak Out.
A High Standard Has Been
Set Up.

Inasmuch as the question of the right or wrong of church members engaging in dancing is up, the pastor and deacons of the Midland Baptist Church make the following statement:

1. We are sure that the New Testament is clear in its teaching that all such "reveling" is wrong. (Gal. 5:19-21; 1 Peter 4:3. And the only reason the modern dance is not mentioned in the Bible as prohibitive, is that no such thing was known in the days of the writers. We could cite many scriptures like the one just quoted, for instance: 1 John 2:15. The Bible is silent about saloon keeping and card playing for this same reason: such things were not known in the days of Paul and John.

2. Baptists everywhere, are, and always have been, opposed to dancing because the fruit of it is always bad and never good. No woman who engages in it remains true and loyal to the church and useful in its work.

3. The world always criticizes church members who dance, and offer that for an excuse of remaining away from Christ and out of the church. And the Bible says for us to shun the very appearance of evil for the sake of the unbeliever. Thus those who dance lose their influence over their associates, and are unable to lead them to the Savior.

4. To encourage the dance by attending it, by allowing it in our homes or by excusing those who engage in it, contributes to the fall of those who are too weak to resist its fearful temptations, and thus such persons become helpers of evil, rather than "helpers of the Truth."

5. Some are saying that their dancing is a personal matter, and we have no right, as a church, to dictate to them and interfere with their pleasures. This is but the old argument of the whiskey traffic, "personal liberty." This assertion may be so of those who are not members of the church, but it is not true of our members, because a church is a band of believers united together by the bonds of Christian Fellowship, and when one breaks that fellowship, the Bible is very

explicit in its direction to us to "withdraw from every brother that walketh disorderly." It is amazing to consecrated Christians that anyone would want to remain in a church and continue to do that which nullifies the work of that church, and proclaim that it is none of the church's business.

6. We do not want to lose any member of our church on account of the dance, neither do we want to make it hard for anyone to renounce the dance and quit it; we do want to help all to higher things, and we stand ready to do anything within the bounds of Christian duty to that end. We are praying very earnestly that all our young people will receive our admonitions and efforts in the tender spirit in which they are offered and will consecrate themselves to the Lord.

7. We would not leave the impression that we are not taking steps to recover those who have swearing, drinking, and doing other things, for we are. The honor and glory of the church is higher than the interests of any man and we are trying to get the church purged and cleansed so that God can afford to pour out His blessings upon us in the meeting which is to begin in October.

8. We feel we should not close this statement without saying that we deem contempt of such efforts as we are making, and rebellion against the high standards of the church and the Bible worse than even above mentioned. It is our settled conviction that the regenerate child of God will gladly give up anything which any considerable number of fellow church members point out as being wrong and declare hurtful to the church.

Our prayerful appeal to all members is to give up sin and all questionable amusements, and consecrate themselves to the services of God for the greatest work this church has ever done. And we make this appeal with humility and prayer for the forgiveness of everything in our own lives not in keeping with the will of our Heavenly Father.
