Enemy and Killed One Thousand at Tampico.

City of Mexico, Dec. 13.-It is strongly rumored that Washington will be advised at once that Rear Admiral Fletcher's attitude at Tampico must stop.

The government states that the American admiral tried to prevent the Mexican warships defending the besieged port; that he swung the American ships yesterday across the entice of the Pahuco River, delaying he Mexican gunboats from Vera Cruz anding ammunition for the federal oops. It is further complained that American warships showed the Car ancistas the position of the federals, with the aid of their searchlights, and it is asserted that such acts are evidence of intervention having practically been taken and fat the federals will demand an explanation. Orders have been issued to the Mexican gunboat commanders to disregard Admiral Fletcher's orders in the future, regardless of the consequences. Official reports say the federal forces were victorious at Tampico today, driving off the Carrancistas, whose casualties were placed at 1,000. It is also claimed that Gen. # HERE THIS WEEK

THE REEVES COUNTY INSTITUTE OPENS MONDAY AT PECOS HIGH SCHOOL.

Good Work Being Done--Will Recommend That Summer Normal Be Held Here.

The Teachers' Institute of Reeves County opened Monday morning at the Pecos High School building with a good enrollment of the pedagogues hard to find a better looking, more intelligent set of teachers anywhere than are holding forth this week, and word comes from their sessions that they are improving the time given

Hen. H. N. McKellar, as County Superintendent, opened the Institute and presided over the assemblage until the organization had been effected. Rev. J. F. Hedgpeth pronounced the invocation, after which Judge McKellar introduced Hon. W .A. Hudson, who formally welcomed the teachers to Pecos. Among other things, Judge Hudson said:

"Perhaps the dominant note of the age could best be expressed in the phrase so often quoted, 'the Fatherhood of God, and the Brotherhood of are probably doing more toward teacher, the physician, and the law-

Taking the four up in the inverse order of their importance, Judge Hudson then discussed each profession briefly, beginning with that of the lawyer, "formerly considered as a paid liar, but now fast coming into his own place as the guardian of our civil liberties. In the crisis the lawyer must take the lead, and the people have the right to expect that of him. For the lawyer is at least true to his client, and it thus has been said that lawyers transact the business of the world without bond.'

Not slighting the importance of the work of the physician, but holding it secondary to that of the teacher, Judge Hudson said, addressing his hearers, "On you assolve the future of the commonweal... and the republic. You are our quaracter-builders. It has been said that God made man in His own image, and that man has ever since been a copyist. Truly you pattern the lives of your pupils. It was once the case that a man was too lazy to work and too cowardly to steal; or when a woman was too old to get married, either felt well equipped for teaching school. 


