MEXICANS KILL BOY ON A DARE NEAR RUIDOSO

Marfa, Tex., April 13.-From Ruidoso, this county, has come a story of Mexican cruelty which has stirred the anger of border people. When 11 year old Luis Iguargan, whose parents live on the Texas side of the border, went to a Mexican rebel camp opposite Ruidoso to carry food to one of the Mexican soldiers, he was shot and fatally wounded, dying shortly after being taken back to Ruidoso.

After completing his errand, the boy, it is said, lingered in the rebel camp, picking up empty shells. Two rebels approached him and one dared the other to shoot the boy. The shot was fired and the boy fell, mortally wounded. Despite protests made to the rebel leader, it is said the man who did the shooting has not been arrested.

Border residents are urging that more rangers be sent to points where Mexican bandits are active. Raids by armed Mexicans are threat ened on the Texas side and border residents say the only protection is for Texans living near the border to arm and protect themselves and their property.


