



JAPAN TO SUBSIDIZE A FLEET OF STEAMERS

Tokio, Japan, April 25 .- Notwithstanding the failure of the Japanese diet to agree upon the budget, which was the immendoate cause of the fall of the Yamamoto cabinet, the government was advance funds for the subsidy of a tri-weekly steamship service thru the Panama canal to New York, feeling sure that the next session of the diet will ratify the action.

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Latest plans provide that the new line shall start from Yokohama and proceed to New York by way of Seattle, Panama and Colon. On the return trip the steamers will touch at New Orleans, Panama and Seattle. The original idea to make Boston the terminus has been abandoned for the present.

The Nippon Yusen Kaisha, which probably will receive a subsidy of about \$800,000 annually, will place nine 10,000 ton steamers in the Panama service. The government has selected Seattle as the Pacific port of call because it finds coal cheaper there than at Honolulu. and some port is considered necessary on the voyage of 7660 miles.

IMMIGRATION RECORD IS BROKEN AT ELLIS ISLAND

New York, April 25.—During the week just ended 31,000 immigrants representing every country in Europe passed through the gates at Ellis island, which is the official reception room for the port of New York, thus breaking all previous

The record for one day was 5369 mmigrants, this number being brought in by six steamers. The record for one single steamer was made by a German vessel which brought in 2049 steerage and third class passengers. Nearly 3000 of the immigrants brought in still remain on the island.

The majority of these are to be deported for various reasons while several hundred are waiting the call of relatives and friends. The resources of the island are taxed to the utmost, the detention rooms being uncomfortably filled.

Raisin Brown Bread-Three cups yellow corn meal, 1 1-2 cups graham flour, 1 1-2 cups white flour, 1 cup N. O. molasses, 1 teaspoon soda dissolved in half cup hot water, 1 teaspoon salt, enough sour milk to make soft batter. Mix flour T. E. Day. L. D. Terry, C. C. and salt then molasses with soda, stir until foamy, then add milk and 1 1-2 cups Sultana raisins. Fill mould half full and steam three

hours. German Nut Loaf.—One cup of seedless raisins, 1 cup chopped nuts, 1 egg, 2 cups milk, 1-2 cup sugar, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 4 cups flour. 




