





Santa Fe, N. M., May 25.-The Women's Christian Temperance Union has purchased from the United States the distillery at Farmington, San Juan county and will dismantle it. The distillery is fully equipped with stills and paraphernalia to make apple jack and

brandy whiskey. San Juan county is the dryest of New Mexico counties and the distillery at Farmington had been a thorn in the flesh of the prohibitionists for years. There was much rejoicing when the United States seized it because it had unlawfully permitted whiskey to be taken out without paying revenue thereon as

the statute provides. The plea of the manager that he had taken it out to sample the product availed nothing and he was sent to the penitentiary, but was

pardoned by President Wilson. The distillery was put up at public sale by the United States marshal and the W. C. T. U. bought it in for \$305 to prevent its falling into hands that would resume the manufacture of liquor.





In order that the earth should be neither growing hotter nor cooling at a rate allowed by the radio-active elements as they disintegrate it is necessary, he says, to assume that the earth's store of radium be concentrated near the surface. The radio-active elements are found most abundantly in acid rocks, and their most basic associates are less rich. These acid rocks the characteristic of only the outermost zones of the crust, and there are many plants, especially of cotton and othreasons for believing that with depth the non-acid rocks are predominant.

Ream out or countersink these two holes on the front face, so that the same bolts used for securing shovels or sweeps to the cultivator, may be used for this attachment. Next drill four 1-4 inch holes, one at each corner of the metal block, half inch | from the ends, and half inch from the sides, or 2 inches apart on centers. The end pairs of holes are used for rivets that faster spikes of teeth on the front face of the metal block. These spikes or teeth are made of half inch iron rods, that extend 6 inches below the lower dge of the block or plate. 
