In view of the approach of the hunting season in Texas, there is considerable interest in the laws sides, and often wrong impressions become circulated regarding federal and state laws on the subject.

For the benefit of the nimrods of this section, the following state and federal laws are reproduced as those now in effect. The synopsis has been furnished by J. D. Cox of Austin, chief deputy game warden. of Texas. Following are the condeased items of interest:

Deer-November 1 to January 1 Limit, three bucks for season; unlawful to kill does or fawns.

Turkey-December 1 to April 1: limit. 3 turkeys for the season. Quail and Doves-November 1 to February 1; limit, 25 birds in any one day.
