Dr. T. P. Gaines began practic ing medicine at the age of 19 and continued until his death. In all the time he had been practing he never lost over six patients. He graduated from the medical college at Memphis, Tenn.

### 1. Pigs have two characteristics LAYING OUT THE ORCHARD.

There are three common methods of laying off the land for orchard planting. (1) The square; (2) the triangular or quincunx, which is like a square except that a tree is planted in the center of the square; (3) the hexagonal, in which a tree is placed in the center with six trees around it. This last method is designed o economize space, but is more difficult to lay off than the others.

and modifications of the three methods mentioned. Trees may be planted in rectangles instead of in squares. The triangular method may be further modified by the setting of filers between every permanent tree in both directions.

Orchardists have their own methods of laying out the orchard.

A convenient way to lay off the land is to first lay off a base line. This may be along a fence, road, etc. Measure off the distance the first tree is to stand. This should be 20 or 25 feet from the highway. Then set a stake at the other end of the field the same distance from gardner arms himself with a spraythe highway as the first stake.
