

SEES MORAL UPLIFT IN THE LARGE SCHOOLS.

Bishop T. S. Henderson of the Methodist Episcopal Church, who has just completed a brief religious Grasses in Texas. campaign among the students at the University of Kansas, thinks that men and women at the large state institutions throughout the Middle West are showing a deeper interest in moral questions than at any time during the past ten years.

"Ten years ago, when I first began to visit large institutions, found that students were often scoffers at religion and that many led riotous lives," said the Bishop, "but now the real leaders among the undergraduates are godly men and women. During this trip, I visited the state universities of Texas, Nebraska, and Kansas as well as several small denominational schools, and everywhere I found an interest in my work and a response to my message.

"That is the proper condition," concluded the bishop, "for the taxpayers who support the work realize that the great leaders in industry in professional life, and in public life are Christians and that the men which the schools are turning out to replace them, must be men of character as well as learning."

(By W. R. Magee, Instructor in Animal Husbandry, A. & M. College of Texas.)

To All Members of the Boys' Animal Husbandry Club.

One of the most important things that each and every farm boy should learn to do is to be able to select the good stock from the inferior. In order for you to do this you will have to get the help of your father and then read such books and papers that you may have on the subject. This is necessary because if you are going to win the the other boys of your country, you must know how to select a good one to start with. This being true, you will have to learn what it takes

One of the most necessary things for you to consider in selecting your calf is the low-down, shortlegged, blocky type. The head eyes, showing large muscle, and the eyes clear and bright. These indicate a rapid fattening animal and one that can be fattened while from shoulders to tail head, and except a little lower in the middle. and back of the forelegs, should be with ribs well sprung, and the barrel or middle should be medium large and both rear and hind flanks low. When looking at the calf from the rear, it should show a smooth appearance, not rough over the hip bones, but yet showing plenty of width to indicate that the calf carries out his width well to the rear. The rump must not droop at the tail heard, nor should it rise at this point. The thighs should be full and deep, the meat being carried well down on the leg.

Another very important thing to consider is the quality of the calf. By quality is meant a soft pliable and loose skin, fine bone, hair fine, silky and showing the glossly appearance of coat. A lack of qual ity is shown in a large coarse, head, large heavy bone, thick heavy hide and a coat of hair that is coarse. The color of the hair does not require very much consideration, but a solid color, such as red-white, black, or roan should be chosen in

preference to a pale color. I have given you some of the indications of a good steer and will now describe an inferior one, or name some of the things that a good steer does not possess: a long narrow head with small muzzle, long thin neck, coarse open shoulders, sha'low narrow chest, long legs or high off the ground. Some other of the most common faults of calves. that must be guarded against are a low back, cut up in fore and rear flanks and showing a lack of quality.

Other Texas Products to Be Experimented With to Find Food Values.

The Texas Public Health Association has appointed Dr. L. B. Bibb of Austin to secure the co-operation of other agencies in the State to undertake a thorough scientific investigation by means of research and experiment that they may determine the value of cotton seed meal as a human food. The following board was appointed to devise means for carrying on these investigations: Dr. Bibb, Dr. Gilbert, and Dr. Graham, State Medical Association; Mr. Newton and Dr. Margaret Holiday, Public Health Association; Dr. Golaz, State Pure Food and Drug Department.

Anna E. Richardson of the Department of Domestic Economy of the University of Texas was appointed by the board to undertake definite investigation and nutritional experiments with the meal. FERTILIZER IN DRY FARM-ING.

Without irrigation, not much good will resut from the use of commercial fertilizer, when the annual average rainfall is below 35 inches. It is not only that it does not "take hold" as the farmers say, under drouthy conditions, but it often "fires" the soil and 'burns" the crops.

The best fetrilizer for the farmer where rainfall is shy, unless he irrigates, is organic matter plowed under, and the best form of this is lot manure; the next best being such leguminous crops as cowpeas, the clovers, etc.

Even the farmer in regions of 45 to 50 inches rainfall will, generally speaking, get more good from commercial fertilizer if his soil is full of humas, as result of rotting organic matter.

The 'dry" farmer gets double benefit from the plowing into his soil of lot manure and nitrogen gathering plants. He gets the fertilizing effect as well as the moisture-holding effect of the resulting

Naturally, the dryer the conditions, the slower will plowed under organic matter resolve itself into humas. And in sections where, as away-out-west farmer expressed his situation: "It takes years to rot a plowed under cornstalk"-well, his section is merely too dry for "dry farming."-R. R. Claridge, Agricultural Agent T. & P. Ry. Co., Longview, Texas.
