WIDOWS DIG GRAVES FOR THE DEAD.

Tabriz, Persia, Mar. 31.—Preceding the reoccupation by the Russians of Salmac plains in Azerbajan province, northwest of Urumiah, hundreds of native Chrisians were rounded up by the Turks in the village of Haftdewan and massacred. Many of these were searched out from the homes of friendly them.

The Russians, on entering the village, found 720 bodies, mostly naked and mutilated. The recovery of bodies from wells, pools and ditches and their burial kept 300 men busy for three days. The wailing of women intensified the horror of the scene.

Surviving widows who were able to identify the bodies of their husbands insisted upon digging graves and burving the bodies. Some of the victims had been shot. In other cases they were bound to ladders and their head, protruding through were hacked off; eves were gouged out and limbs chopped off.

A general massacre of the 10,000 or 15,000 Christians remaining in Urumiah is expected, unless it should be averted by orders from Constantinople.

Verbal messages from Urumiah confirm earlier reports that more than 800 persons already have been killed in that neighborhood and that more than 2000 have died of disease. These messages also confirm the reports of the maltreat-

A child whose bodily or mental condition makes attendance inadvisable.

Where no free transportation is provided for a child living more than two and a half miles by a traveled road from the school.

A child more than twelve years old who has completed the work of the fourth grade of an elementary school of seven grades and whose services are needed in support of a parent or one who stands in the parental relation to such child.

If the parents of a child are financially unable to furnish said child with textbooks the county superintendent of education shall furnich said books, upon the recom-

mendation of the district trustees. No child under fourteen years of age not lawfully excused from attendance, shall be employed by anyone during the prescribed school hours. Penalties are provided for disregard of this provision.

The attendance officer provision on which the bill came closest to foundering, follows in part:



JUST LEAVE IT TO MR. HOG. This question of properly balanced ration bothers everybody that

raises pigs. Here's a settlement of it that appeals to us as being not only simple but sensible.

The plan was worked out in Iowa, where they certainly know how to raise swine. John M. Evvard, experimentalist in charge of this work at Ames, had some pigs that weighed about 45 pounds apiece at weaning time. He wanted to make three hundred pounders out of them at eight months, and leave it to the pigs themselves.

He turned them loose in a dry lot, about 20x80 feet in size, and during the entire course of the experiment they had no access to pasture or forage. Mr. Evvard put the following feeds before the pigs:

Shelled corn. Meat meal (60 per cent protein.) Whole oats.

Linseed oil meal. Maple wood charcoal. Finely ground limestone. Common rock salt.

Water. "Now, boys," said he, "there you have all the ingredients you need for a first class pork factory. Help yourselves, do your own mixing,

The Ames people do not suggest any need for caution in allowing pigs to have all they will eat of the above items, but we think it likely if you gave it to older herds (instead of the weanlings) that they might be inclined to eat too much of the meat meal and perhaps of the salt, at first-especially if they have been starved for protein and


