European War Puts Great Beet Sugar Territory Out of the Available Area.

Washington, D. C. April 7.—The effect of the present war in Europe on the geography of the world's sugar production is strikingly shown in a statement just issued by the National Geographic society. This statement is as follows: .

SAVING PIGS.

Prof. L. B. Burke of the department of animal husbandry of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, says of the amount of feed that should be given to the sow: "Immediately after farrowing, feed nothing but water during the first 24 hours. On the second and third days feed a small amount of light food, such as wheat, bran and shorts. After the third day, gradually increase the ration to about six to eight pounds per animal, getting up to the eight pound ration from 14 to 20 days, depending upon the condition of the animal. Care should be taken not to feed too heavy, or the animal will

HOME CANNING BY STEW-ING IN OPEN VESSEL

(Prepared by Home Economics Department, University of Texas.)

Sterilize jars and lids by placing on a wire or wooden rack, or by placing the jar on its side in a vessel containing luke-warm water; heat to boiling point. Allow to remain in hot water for fifteen minutes. When necessary to place glass in very hot water, lay it on one side and turn over quickly that there may be an equal expansion of glass. Dip spoons and rubbers in hot water. Use only fresh rubber rings. Rubber rings should be soft and elastic otherwise the jar will not be sealed air tight. Using rubbers the second year is false economy. Much fruit is lost by using

Cook fruit in agate or porcelain lined kettle. The fruit is placed in kettle with sugar or with a syrup sufficient to cover and heated slowly to boiling. Cook until fruit is tender. 




