TERRELL NOT AFTER SODA POP STANDS.

Austin, Texas, July 17.-When requested for information as to the steps to be taken by his department in enforcing the Sunday closing law, applying to confectioneries, soft drink stands, etc., Comptroller Terrell, who returned today from Waso, denied any plans. Terrell was quoted in Waco as having said that the Sunday closing law applying to soda fountains and the soft drink stands should be enforced as stringently as against the saloons and wass alleged to have called upon the sheriffs to come to his department for assistance.

"It is not within the power of the comptroller to enforce such a law' said Terrell. "I have been misquoted as to asking sheriffs to come to my department for assistance. I did suggest to the sheriffs in wet territories who were having trouble in enforceing the 9:30 and other closing laws because of public sentiment that the comptroller would be glad to do everything in his power to see that the laws were obeyed."

Washington, D. C., July 19 .-An official dispatch to the state department from Mexice City late! today said Gen. Gonzalaz and the Carranza army had left the city to take Pachuca. Earlier private reports said Gen. Villa's Southern column was approaching the cap-

Pachuca is about 6 0miles northeast of Mexico City and is connected with the capital by rail. It has between 30,000 and 40, 000 inhabitants and is the center of a rich mining center.

The garrison of 600 men left in the capital is considered sufficient to hold the city against any attacks possible to be made by the Zapata forces, and to maintain order in the city.

A NEW LIGHT RAY FOUND.

THE COST OF THE WAR.

Not until the war of Europe has ome to an end will it be possible to figure the staggering cost in human lives, dollars and property. It is known, of course, that one year of the war has cost Great Britian \$5,000,000,000 in eash, not counting the loss of ships an dother property. The total loss of life will not be figured until the esimates of rival nations are boiled down to the true proportions.

Even now, however, it is possible to figure accurately the loss in ships. A total of 511 vessels has been destroyed by war in a period of ten months. Approximately 2 per cent of the world's tonnage, or 915,497 tons, has been wiped out. England alone has lost 327 ships,

with a gross tonnage of 609,934. When the war began last August the world's merchant tonnage of all classes was approximately 48,000-000 gross tons. Germany had in all parts of the world a gross ship tonnage of 5,082,061 tons. England gate gross tonnage of 20,431,531



STUDENTS' LOAN FUND.

Constitutional Amendment For There in Need .- An Ad dras to the People.

Recommending the adoption by the people at the election on July 24th, this year of the house joint resolution No. 9 by Metcalfe, amending the Constitution so as to allow counties the local option right to hold elections and determine whether a Students' Loan Fund shall be established or not.

The necessary and beneficient purpose of this amnedment is to aid those of our young people who need financial help to acquire an education.

When adopted the effects of this amendment will be:

1. To allow citizens of any county the local self-governing privilege to establish a perpetual public students' Loan Fund. It is purely a local option measure, the citizens the heavy rain last Friday night of each county will decide for themselves at a county election as to whether or not the fund shall be established in that county.

2. Deserving students who need We should worry. financial assistance to acquire an education will borrow and repay the funds; thus using and making permanent this public benefaction for those most in need.

3. Thousands of young people now without means to become educater men and women iwll fill the schools with paying students, whom knowledge will bless and develop into valuable citizens.

4. This benefaction iwll go to the needy ones who deserve assistance but are so constantly neglected and forgotten.

Here follows signatures of the members of the Senate and House of Representatives who recommend the passage of the measure, nearly

lowing to say:

"It is necessary the people shall understand the principles involved in this wise restoration and re-grant of local self-governing power back to them, so they may originate and perpetuate a fund to be used by those who are in need of financial aid to educate themselves; it will simply allow the legislature to pass a law directing how the commissioners' court shall select the neediest students; what interest charges shall be made, what security, if any shall be required, and all details of administration to make it apply properly to those whom it is intend ed to benefit and for its repayment and perpetual use by other students and to guard against misapplication or loss by improper use or neglect. The fund san of course be only established in any county after an election has been held and a majority of taxpaving voters decide in favor of so doing. The state election to be held the fourth Saturday in July, this year, merely incorporates in the Constitution the right for the Legislatures to pass a law as above, and this power carries the right for repeal at any time of a statute that might contain im perfect or improper provisions The Brown Fund in Georgia is a most notable benefaction of this character, given by governor Brown as a memorial to his son; while it is not derived from a public source it is similar in all other respects to what the Texas Students' Loan Fund will be, and serves to show how the original sums will compound and augment even with
