Majority of American Editors Here Quoted Believe That Deed Was "Deliberately Unfriendly."

San Antonio Express: The degree of public indignation concerning the torpedoing of these passenger ships may, and very likely does, often depend upon the number of lives lost-particularly the number of American lives. But if the attack on the Arabic be proved circumstantially identical to the attack on the Lusitania, regardless of the number of casualities, the American people and the American government must resent very deeply this scornful, defiant repudiation of their virtual ultimatum that was based on a most righteous contention.

Temple (Texas) Telegram: We hope that the sinking of the Arabic with loss of American lives can be explained as an error on the part of the commander of the submarine. Otherwise we trust the presiden, to sustain American rights regardless of consequences.

Waco (Texas) News: Less warranted than the attack upon the Lusitania, the sinking of the Arabic is easily one of the most gross outrages of the war, and if it does





San Antonio (Texas) Light: The attack on the Arabic put the question squarely upto us. It was a deliberatly unfriendly act. Germany bas made it plain that there will be more acts of the same character hereafter despite the protests of the United States. The attack on the Lusitania was an act of war. The sinking of the Arabis was, from present evidence, another act of war. If Germanw persists in making war on us we will be obliged to make war on Germany.

The St. Louis Republic: The policy of "frightfulness" which destroys passenger ships without the slightest warning, has already been weighed and branded in the United States. The words of lovalty to the President and of an entire agreement in his position have been spoken. We are ready to face the consequences of every step taken by the Government thus far and every one of the words it has spoken.

The land is situated in the counties of Andrews, Bandera, Brewster, Crockett, Culberson, Dallam, Ector, Edwards, El Paso, Gray, Kerr, Kimble, Hartley, Loving, Marion, Hutchinson, Jack, Jeff Davis, Kinney, Haskell, Montague, Motley, Newton, Pecos, Starr, Sutton, Taylor, Terrell, Travis, Tyler, Reeves, Polk, Presidio, Randall, Real, Upton, Uvalde, Val Verde, Walker, Ward, Webb, Wilberger, Willacy, Winkler, Wise, and Zapata. In order to stimulate the sale of lands situated in certain counties

and classified as rough lands, the ban last' legislature amended the land laws so as to provide that such lands may be sold without the condition of actual settlement,

It is plainly stated, however, by the state that this land is unfit for residence, being rocky and mountainous. A baby should gain about five or more pounds during the first three months; three and a half during the second three months and twoand a half pounds during the next three, beginning with a weight of about 7 pounds, and having now a weight of about 21 pounds at the erd of the first year.

The milk used should, if possibe be certified milk, pasteurized in the nursing bottle at 145 degrees Fahrenheit for 30 minutes, or 140 degrees for 40 minutes. It may be simple milk mixed milk or top milk. Mixed milks are usually preferred or marasmie or sick children, and for healthy children a moderate amount of cream may be added to bring the total fat up to three per

The dilutent of the milk may be water, but a cereal dilutent is usally more digestive. This is generally a barley or oatmeal flour, an even teaspoonful to a pint of waer, cooked for one hour in a double boiler and strained. Babies who are not gaining or who are having curds in the stools will often do better if the milk is temporarily peptonized. An excellent food for young babies who will not do well on modified milk is whey, to which cream and sugar have been added. At ten months two ounces of a clear soup with no fat on top may be added, and rusk, or bread crust or toast with three meals a day.


