


KNOW THY STATE

SILO BUILDING. By Peter Radford.

The silo is a development agency and one in which both the commercial and agricultural interests of Texas can successfully co-operate in promoting.

If we are to place our cereal and forage crops on a stable and profitable basis, we must use all helpful devices and processes that multiply the value of the product after production and that enables us to turn waste products into profit. The economies easily possible in these two lines of endeavor are sufficient to make the Texas farmers home owners and wealth accumulators.

Feeding corn direct to stock by the old method, it is authoritatively estimated, adds approximately 30 per cent. to its value, and the farmers using silos will find that when corn is cut at the right time and is fed as ensilage, the efficiency of the feed is increased 40 per cent., making a net gain of 70 per cent. over the market value by feeding to livestock through the silo. The silo is a manufacturing plant built on the farm, and therefore lends itself to co-operation of the commercial and agricultural interests, and the farmer, by operating it, gets the prefit of both the producer and the manufacturer. The farmer does not want bonuses, fee sites, etc., but the commercial interests can materially assist him by making it easy to build silos. This can be done by making available money for building them on easy terms and at a low rate of interest. It is opportunity, rather than favors, the farmer needs, but when a community has money to invest in promoting agriculture, it can put it to no better advantage than by applying it in encouraging the construction of silos. When so expended, every dollar hits the mark and the merchant and banker spend their money where it does the most good, and they are helping those who help them.

A farmer can build a fair sized sile for two or three hundred dollars, and it will, under ordinary conditions, pay a dividend of 40 per cent. where it is run to its capacity. No better investment can be made than in the contruction of a silo.

The silo will help on to maturity crops that are frequently caught by a drought or burned by hot winds, and there is scarcely a year in Texas in diversified farming that the silo will not rescue a crop from the delinquent forces of nature. As a stimulation in diversification alone, it is a valuable agency.

My own observation is that the silo is one of the greatest business educators in agriculture, and, like all great and far-reaching improvements, stamps its characteristics indelibly upon its human associates. It arouses the spirit of enterprise, develops commercial ingenuity, awakens the joy of ownership and will take away the nomadic habits of the tenant farmer and plant within him a desire to own a home. Every farmer in Texas should build a silo.



lans to Call For Formation of Continental Army of 800,000 Men to Serve 6 Years.

Washington, October 16.-Employers throughout the United States, corporations, manufacturers professional men, tradesmen and business men of all classes are to be asked to contribute their share in the national defense, permission for their employees to engage without serious financial loss, in two months military training during each of 3 lears.

This is an essential part of the Administration's plan for raising a citizen army of 800,000 men in six years which, with the regular army of 140,000 and 300,000 reserves, would give the United States a trained force, exclusive of the State militia, of about 1,200,000 men in the event of a war.

The success of the plan, officials admit, depends not on the appropriations of Congress, for its cost will be comparatively small, but on the patriotic response of the employers, to whom an appeal will be made to furlough as many men each year at the different seasons, a they can spare, who wish to join the proposed continental arms.

Administration officials are confident that even though it is proposed to enlist only 133,000 men a year in the continentals or a total of nearly 800,000 in the first six-

IT PAYS TO SAVE CHICKEN MANURE.

In estimating, the proceeds from our poultry we often fail to put any valuation on what I have found to be a very important item-the fertilizer. For vegetables and for flowers there is nothing equal to it. This is especially true of onions, tomatoes and roses. They will not saffer from drouth so quickly and are not so apt to rot or blight when this manure is used.

Our hen house has a dirt floor, which is swept frequently and the manure is put directly where needed, and worked into the soil and is covered. If the weather will not permit spreading at once it is usually stored in barrels in a dry place. In the late fall I pile this manure around my rose bushes and work it in until spring. The result is thrifty bushes and exceptionally fine roses.

All on hand should be put, on the ground before freezing weather and none allowed to waste during the winter. Some trouble should be taken to save a fertilizer so valu-Progressive Farmer.

OUR PUBLIC FORUM

The Executive Committee of the Texas Bankers' Association, working in connection and in harmony with the bankers and business men of Texas, are making an ear nest and persistent effort to get warehouses built for the storage and protection of all farm products, especially cotton. It has always been said, that the farmer be ing primarily the producer of the world s actual needs, is the most independent business man among us. This probably should be true, but a large per cent of the farmers are in fact quite dependent, making themselves so by continually putting themselves at the mercy of the man who buys their crops. This awkward and unbusinesslike situation grows out of the fact that the farmer has no

place to store his crop after it is made. Wheat is now bringing a fair price everybody believes it will go higher, yet in the face of this good prospect for advanced prices, the femers all over this country are forced to sell their wheat because they have no place to store it. The facilities for storing and protecting cotton are much worse than the wheat,

The farmers of Texas lost by country damage enough in the past few years to build sufficient storage room for all the cotton grown in the State. In view of the facts above set forth and the unsatisfactory conditions arising therefrom, the bankers are auxious to see suitable warehouses built and cotton stored therein where it can be protected from the weather and from fire and made a basis of credit for carrying on the business of the country

The writer hereof, as chairman of the 7th District Texas Bankers' Association, has called the attention of every bank in the district-over four hundred-to the needs mentioned herein and urged action in all of their respective counties where cotton is reised or handled. The Seventh District is so large and its interests so varied, that uniformity of purpose and action is hard to obtain; nevertheless much interest has been aroused and many new warehouses are being built and old ones repaired so as to meet all requirements. At this writing conditions are such as to increase the difficulties that already beset us in the exportation of our surplus cotton and likewise intensify the need for storage for our 1915 cotton crop.

In my long experience in the banking business, I can scarcely recall a time when a farmer could not get credit extended and increased on stored and insured cotton. Our new Federal Bank Law as interpreted by those intrusted with its administration, has not only increased and made more rapidly available the facilities for handling such cotton, but has fixed beyond controversy the value and negotiability of duly executed warehouse receipts. Out of the conditions above recited have grown the consistent and persistent efforts of the bankers of Texas to get the cotton grower to house his crop and place it on the market in such a business-like way as to secure the best possible results. The effects of this campaign, I am persuaded, will be gratifying to all parties interested therein.
