IRRIGATION BONDS VALID.

Supreme Court Upholds Constitutionality of the Law.

News has been received of the decision of the State Supreme Court in the injunction suit against Ward County Irrigation District No. 1. That decision sustains the constitutionality of the law on all points at which it was attacked. An application for rehearing has been filed by the plaintiffs.

The text of the decision has not been received, but as explained to the News, the substance of it is here given: The court holds that the contention of applicants for injunction, in that they have been deprived of property rights without due process of law, by having the value of their lands impaired on account of putting non-water right land on a level with that carrying such water-rights, for which they had paid, etc., is not well founded, as such water rights may be acquired by the district by purchase, gift, or condemnation under the power of eminent domain. They therefore have their rights at law for any loss they may suffer.—Ward County News.

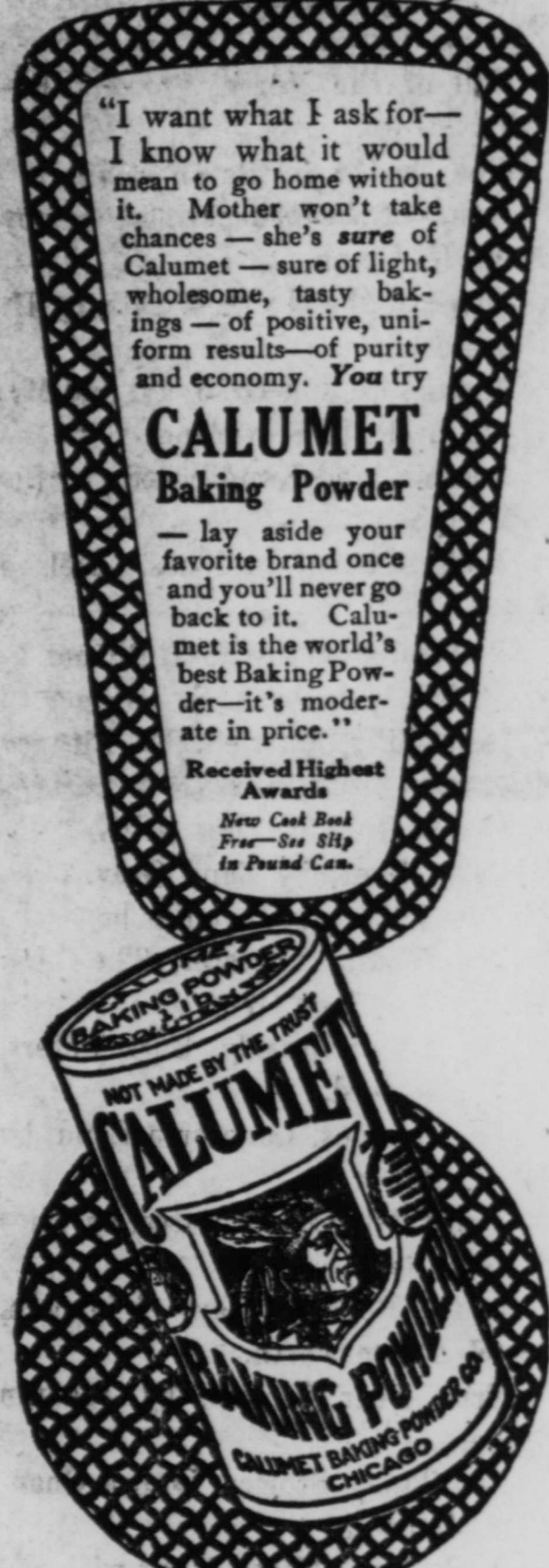

GERMANY ASKS U. S. TO GIVE AID TO THE POLES.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 1.—Germany has asked the American commission of relief in Belgium to undertake in Poland relief measures similar to those taken in Belgium. Officials of the State department have been informed that the commission has been told that between twenty and thirty million people in that part of Poland occupied by the German troops are destitute and in dire need. To adequately care for them would mean, it was said, an expenditure of approximately \$30,000,000 a month.

DON'T PITY ME SAYS BRYAN DISCUSSING FAILURE.

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 1.—Discussing his "unsuccessful political career" at a mass meeting for prohibition Sunday, W. J. Bryan told his audience not to pity him. "If I had lived two centuries ago and advocated what I do now, I should have been hanged," he said. "No one has accomplished any great reform without being abused and ostracized at first. But when a man believes he is in the right he must speak out."

FEDERAL LAW SUPERCEDES STATE LAW.

Austin Texas, Oct. 27.—In affirming today the case of the State of Texas against the Orange and North Western Railway company, et al, from Travis County, the 3rd court of civil appeals held that the Federal safety appliance law on the subject supercedes the state law. The state sued for the violation of the state law, but by today's decision, the state law has no preference over the Federal statute.

FIRST CALL FOR REGISTERED WARRANTS ISSUED.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 1.—State treasurer Edwards today issued his first call for registered warrants since the state went on a deficit. All warrants up to 5850 will be paid. This call will take care of \$137,898 of warrants, and there is \$360,000 in the state treasury to the credit of the general revenue to pay these warrants.

DON'T DUMP THE MARKET.

A good many farmers of thrifty proclivities in Texas and Louisiana are producing a surplus of hay of various kinds upon which they naturally desire to realize early in the season. It has been observed however that the price is usually much higher in the winter along toward spring, and sales much easier to make at the price. This would seem to indicate that the advice as to holding cotton to relieve the strain of the fall rush to sell, would apply equally well to the hay situation.

And the same may be said of stock peas. These are in demand mainly for seed, and naturally the planters hold off buying till nearly spring or planting time. Hence it would seem to be good business for the growers, or the merchants who purchase from the growers, to not crowd the market unduly till it is ready for the stuff.

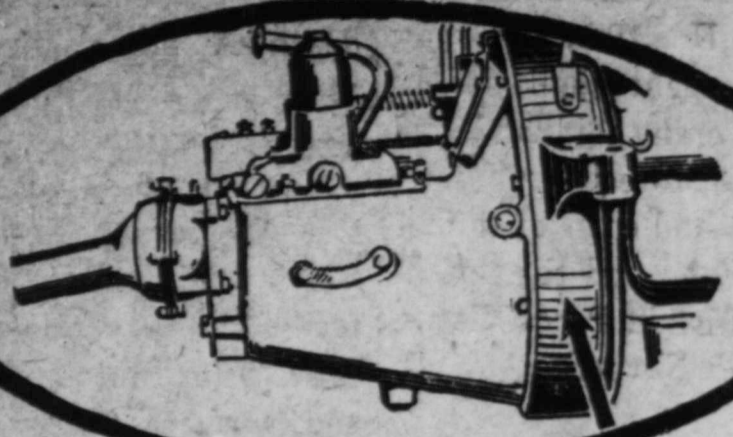

THE BOLL WEEVIL

The boll weevil is marching thru Georgia. He has already covered Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Florida, and portions of Oklahoma, Arkansas and Tennessee. In a few more years he will have marched across the state of South Carolina, and have the main part of the cotton belt.

All this means that cotton will in all probability bring high prices in the future. This year prices are good in spite of the big war in Europe, and seed is bringing perhaps the highest price in the history of its manufacture.

Cotton seed is bringing \$40 per ton, and over much of the cotton belt is worth 12 cents. This makes a bale of cotton and its seed worth \$80.

This high, dry country will never be trougled by the weevils. They will not live here. In all respects as well, we seem to have a splendid cotton country. Yields of from a half bale to a bale per acre are common and two bales are not infrequent.

Cotton perhaps needs only about one-third as much water as alfalfa, and where a bale to the acre is made it will be more profitable than any but the best yields of alfalfa when hay prices are good. To produce and market a bale of cotton on an acre, will cost approximately as follows: Preparation of the land \$2, seed and planting \$1, water, say \$1.50, applying the water \$1, two hoeings \$2, four cultivations \$2, the picking, \$10, ginning \$5, making a total of \$24.50. If the cotton and seed bring \$75, it leaves a net profit of \$50 an acre.

Even a half a bale to the acre, figured on the same basis will pay a net profit of about \$20 an acre, and that is enough to make the land producing it worth \$300 an acre. A half bale is less than the average in this country.

Mr. H. T. Collier, of Hoban, frequently surpassed this yield on field of over 100 acres. Mr. Sisk last year averaged three fourths of a bale to the acre. Mr. Couch has seldom had yields less than this.

Mr. Yeates, of Barstow, is just harvesting a crop of about 1 3-4 bales to the acre on 35 acres of cotton. This crop must be paying him something like \$100 net profit per acre after paying all labor and other expenses. Mr. Yeates broke a 12-year old alfalfa sod for this cotton and broke it so well that all the alfalfa was killed. He worked it well and watered it only twice after it came up.

This record crop emphasizes the great fertilizing value of alfalfa.

The alfalfa plant manages to draw great quantities of the richest fertilizing matter from the air and combines it and stores it in a form that other crops can use it; when the alfalfa or its roots rot in the soil. A good season's growth of alfalfa perhaps adds perhaps \$25 worth of fertilizer to an acre of ground.

As more cotton is grown in this section ginning prices will go down, better prices will be given for cotton and seed. There is no reason why the irrigated lands in this district may not grow enough cotton soon to justify an oil mill and a compress.

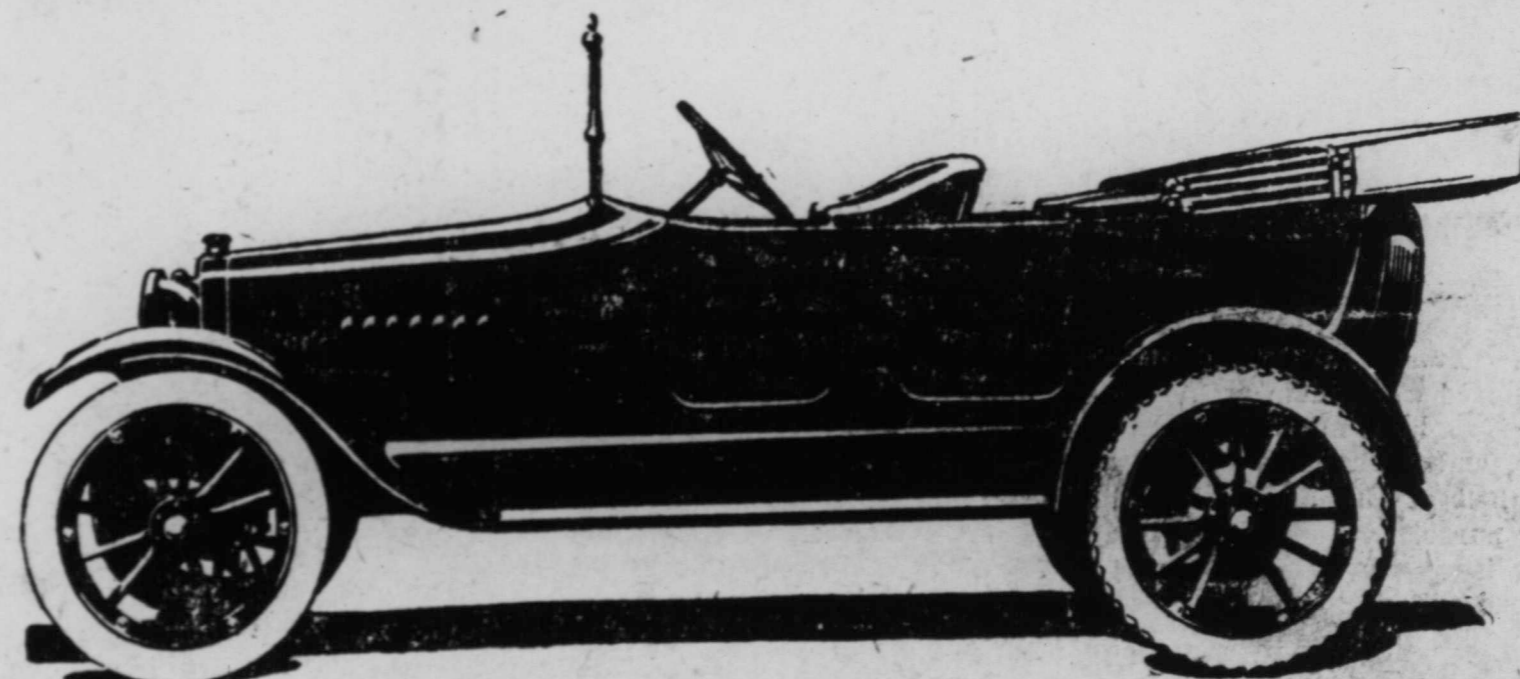

Talks With the Boys

THE BOY WHO IS VAIN.

Here is something I read yesterday that has a lot of truth in it: "There is hope for the boy who has to be whipped to the bathtub, but none for the boy who has to be driven away from the mirror."

Now, no one puts a higher value on personal cleanliness than I do. I would not want a boy in my employ who was not neat and clean. Nor do I care to have around me a boy who was manifestly thinking all the time about his looks and who gave proof of descending into the low estate of being "dudish" in every way. The out-and-out vain boy has a good deal of a vacuum where the gray matter in his brain should be. The handsomest boy I knew never by word or in manner gives proof of the fact that he is aware of his good looks. On the other hand, I know a boy with not much more beauty than a Japanese idol who is so vain that I suspect that he sometimes has to be driven from the mirror to his work. Nothing is more amusing than the illusions some homely people have in regard to their good looks. It is a sort of vanity that is out of place in a boy. He should not be standing too long before a mirror, even when it is able to reveal extraordinary good looks to him. For one thing boys, it is proof of effeminacy when a boy spends lots of time before the mirror and the effeminate boy is never in high favor before the rest of the world. Let a boy once acquire the deserved reputation of being a "sissy" and he is a "goner" so far as the respect of those whose good opinion it is well worth while to have is concerned. The world admires nothing more than it admires a manly boy, and true manliness and the mirror are not very closely related to each other. Some wise man said that every man has just as much vanity as he wants understanding. It is a great pity that understanding can't take the place of an oversupply of pure vanity in some boys.

It is not only vanity in regard to one's looks that is a hindrance to the best success in life and that subjects one to ridicule. There is also the vanity that causes a boy often to think that he is ever so much smarter than he really is. The too-smart boy often presents a too deplorable kind of vanity. He foolishly fancies that he is the object of admiration because of his smartness when he is really an object of contempt and pity. I saw a boy of this kind on an excursion boat the other day. He was doing everything possible to attract attention to himself and was succeeding in a way that should cause him to blush for shame had he known the real sentiments of those whose attention he was distracting. There were many to share the opinion of an old gentleman who said: "That boy needs some kind friend to take him aside and try to impress upon him the fact that he is the silliest person on this boat." Boys of this character are fond of displaying their smartness.

This type of boy is much more common than we care for him to be. Wherever he exists he is in evidence in a way that often becomes downright offensive. He often degenerates into a real nuisance that should be suppressed. Then there is the type of pure vanity that finds expression in constant boastfulness and a desire to make one's self the subject of conversation. When a boy does this, it is convincing proof of the fact that modesty is one of his least virtues. [The braggart always presents a sorry spectacle and the boy who achieves the reputation of being a "big blow" or a "brag" is never high in the favor of the other boys nor with any one else. He is sure to be an object of ridicule but is often too obtuse to discover the fact. The other boys can some-

times "guy" him to his face, and his colossal conceit keeps him from being aware of the fact. Shakespeare never wrote truer words than these: "Vanity keeps persons in favor with themselves who are out of favor with all others."

Then there is a kind of vanity that causes a boy to know so much in his own conceit that no one can tell him anything. His own parents are not so wise as he. He scorns the advice of everyone. He thinks that he knows it all, and if he goes out in the world to secure a position he cannot hold it long once it is secured, because his employers are a little adverse to having around them a boy who knows more than they do. The airs boys of this type can assume would be laughable were it not for the regret one feels because the boy is standing in his own light in such an unfortunate way. Sometimes those of real ability do this. It is not always the actual fool who presents the appearance of being one. Those who act foolishly are simply giving proof of the fact that they lack a certain quality called "balance." They are "smart" enough in some ways, but they spoil it all by being so foolish in other directions. Nothing in the world is more likely to cause a boy to lack "balance" than an oversupply of pure vanity. Now, the boy who is approaching the time when he is to strat out in life for himself will do well not to be too wise in his own conceit. He should try to have a quantil of the exact opposite of vanity, and that is modesty. Nothing will serve him better than this commodity. Emerson, the great philosopher, wrote a good deal it might not be easy for the average boy to fully understand, but any boy can understand these words wrote by Emerson: "The mark of the man of the world is absence of pretension. He does not make a speech; he takes a low business tone, avoids all brag, dresses plainly, promises not at all, performs much, speaks in monosyllables, hugs his fact. He calls his employment by its lowest name and takes from tongues their sharpest weapon."

NOTICE OF FIRE CHIEF.

To the citizens of Pecos City: The Pecos City fire department has adopted the following plan for a system of fire alarms, and has decided to divide the city into three wards.

Ward One means one tap of the fire bell, and this ward takes in all of that part of town east of Cypress street.

Ward Two is designated by two taps of the bell, and includes all of the town west of Cypress street.

The streets are numbered north and south, and, beginning at the T. & P. right of way, is First street, and one tap of the bell; the City fountain is second street and two taps; the fire house is third street, and three taps; the Carnegie library is Fourth street and four taps; W. D. Cowan's residence is on fifth street and five taps; Jac Love's residence is on Sixth street and six taps; John Hudson's residence is on Seventh street and seven taps; Mrs. Elizabeth Newell's residence is on Eighth street and eight taps; G. C. Parker's residence is on Ninth street and nine taps; and so on through all these streets running from one to nine, and from one to nine taps of the bell means in both wards, one and two.

For instance: If Geo. Landrum's house is on fire; in turning in the alarm, as he lives west of Cypress street and on second street, call up central and just say: "Fire, Ward Two, Street Two. Or if Mrs. Jo Camp's residence is on fire, call up central, and say: "Fire; Ward One Street Five.

North of the track is Ward Three and a fire in that vicinity will need only three taps of the bell.

We desire that everyone familiarize themselves as to the street they live on in regard to the numbering from one to nine, as it is an easy matter to locate the ward, there being only the three, one, two and three.

When sending in an alarm first give the ward then the street. By this method we will never get lost as to where a fire is. This is for your own protection and this is the reason we wish to impress upon you the necessity of knowing just on what street you live.

Two taps of the bell after the general alarm means that the fire is out.

We have one of the best volunteer fire departments in West Texas and every member is ready to answer all calls and do it quick, and the City Council has been very liberal in buying apparatus and equipment. We have the best equipped department of any town of our size in Texas. If you doubt this, just call around and see for yourself.

We have a 40-horse power gasoline engine and pump combined, that is always ready to go, an automobile hose truck that carries 1000 feet of hose and two ladders, an automobile chemical truck that carries one hundred gallons of chemical and also ladders, and we have reel cart that carries 900 feet of hose.
