The union meeting held by the Rev. F. M. Neal, Conference Evangelist of the M. E. Church, South, closed Wednesday night. Evangelist Neal was called by the Methodist and Presbyterian churches jointly, but the Baptist pastor, Rev. L. O. Cox, assisted by many members of his church worked nobly in the

cause of righteousness with the other churches.

Rev. Neal is an earnest, able and eloquent speaker and we never saw a speaker that commanded closer attention.

Rev. Neal inspires one with the thought that he has a message to deliver to poor, sinful humanity, and is earnestly intent in delivering it in a way that will reach the hearts of those to whom he speaks. He speaks bluntly at times. He says he cannot help it but does not wish to wound the feelings of anyone, but wants to wake them up. Well, he can do that.

The meeting closed Wednesday night with a great song and praise service followed by a splendid sermon by Rev. Neal on Spiritual Growth. At the close of the sermon 56 people were lined up for church membership in the different churches while hundreds of people passed by and shook hands with them by way of encouragement and to bid them God-speed.

The results of the meeting is the best evidence of its success. About 100 conversions and some 80 additions to the various churches is reported.

REDUCTION ON INSURANCE RATES.

We are informed by E. L. Collings that he and the other insurance men of Pecos have received notice from the State Fire Insurance Commission at Austin, that on account of the adequate fire protection in the business district, that portion of the city would be entitled to a 3-cent credit on the key rate applicable on all policies after October 28th.

BAYLOR OBSERVES 70TH ANNIVERSARY

WACO INSTITUTION WILL STAGE ITS HOME COMING NOV. 24 AND 25.

STRONG PROGRAM IS IN SIGHT

Class and Society Reunions, Seniors, Historical Pageants and Football Will Afford Ample Entertainment to Those Attending.

Commemorating the foundation of Baylor University in 1845, when Texas was a republic, that institution is arranging a big seventieth birthday celebration in the form of a monster home-coming for Nov. 24 and 25 and she is inviting all her sons and daughters, old and young, to come back home and join in the festivities. Marking the program will be addresses by some of her children who have achieved distinctive success along various lines, a historical pageant setting forth the university's development, class and society re-unions, soirees and a football game between the Baylor and T. C. U. elevens.

The celebration will begin on the afternoon of Wednesday, Nov. 24, with a reception to all visitors. On Wednesday night there will be an address of welcome by President Brooks, while the Home Coming message will be declared by Dr. W. B. Bizzell, president of A. and M. College, and Dr. C. D. Daniel, El Paso, superintendent of Mexican missions. Following these addresses there will be an old-fashioned soiree exclusively for the graduates and former pupils of the university.

One of the most elaborate pageants ever staged in Waco is planned for the big down-town parade which will be held on Thanksgiving day. The pageant will be a reproduction of the removal of Baylor to Waco from Independence, Texas, the first home of the institution, and will represent Dr. Burleson, the president of Baylor at that time, with his family in the big carriage in which they came overland to Waco. Following this carriage will be a wagon with the household effects of the Burlesons, the student body with their personal belongings, who will be dressed as were the students during the days of the early eighties. In the pageant will also be wagons loaded with the handful of books constituting the library and other equipment making up the limited paraphernalia of the early Baylor.

On Thanksgiving afternoon will be the annual football game between Baylor and T. C. U. This will be one of the hardest fought games of the Texas gridiron this year. The schools have been hot rivals from the days when both colleges were located in Waco and the contests between them have been some of the hardest the Baylor Bears have had to enter. The Baylor eleven so far has the distinction of being the only undefeated team in the state and after playing over half of the season unscored on. It is one of the strongest football aggregations in Texas this year. The contest will be witnessed by several thousand of the old students who will return for the celebration and there will be exhibitions of enthusiasm and pep rarely seen on any athletic occasion in Texas.

The various classes which have graduated during the past years of Baylor's life will have reunions and renew the acquaintances made in student days. These class reunions form some of the closest ties of life as the members again meet the ones who were closest friends during the days when some of the greatest triumphs and defeats were being gone through; and it is during these moments of renewing acquaintances that friendships are formed which are carried for the remainder of life.

The Philomatheans and Erisophians, the two male literary societies, and the Rufus C. Burlesons and the Calliopeans, the two young women's societies, will have reunions for the older members. Some of the men and women who helped form these societies and who fostered the life of these bodies while they were still in the formative period, will return to take part in these reunions and in celebrating with Baylor the successful completion of seventy years of usefulness in formation of character in the young men and women of Texas.

Some of the oldest living graduates of Baylor will return and give vivid descriptions of the early life of the school and will tell of the hardships and struggles of the men and women who sought an education during the days when Texas was barely a state and still subject to raids by the Indians, and when the state was foreign to refining influences. Waco will put on gala attire and receive the University in welcoming the old pupils home.

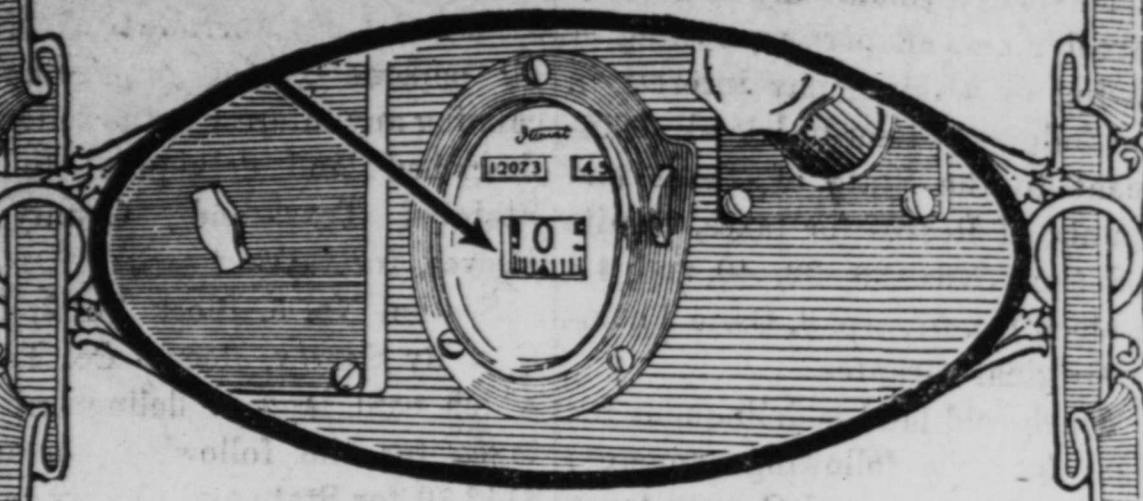

OPPORTUNITIES FOR THE CREAMERY.

The Southwest is especially adapted to the cream industry, but the local supply is entirely inadequate, and vast quantities are shipped to this section of the country from Kansas and other points. It is a highly profitable business, a mighty good side-line to farming, as it brings money in every day in the year, whereas farm crops are sold in their season, usually in the fall.

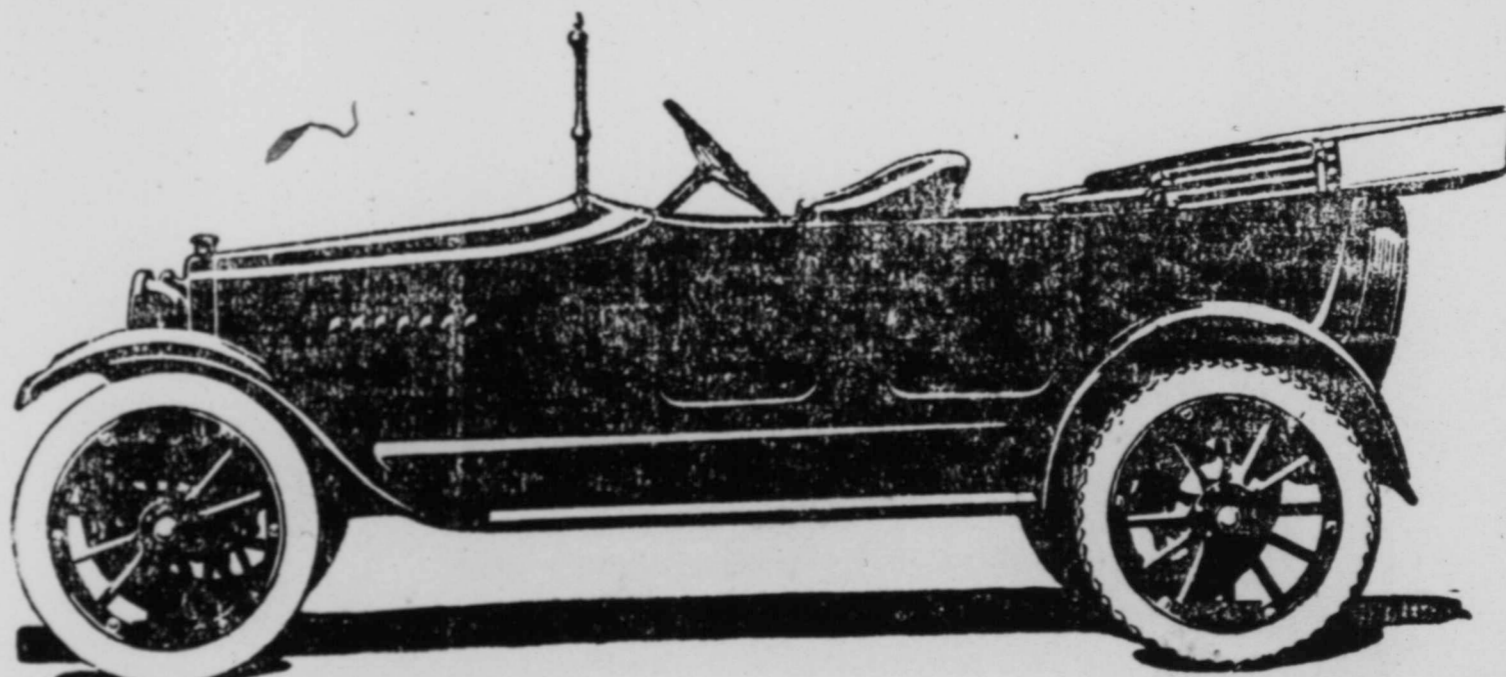

Talks With the Boys

THE BOY WHO THINKS WELL OF HIMSELF.

A certain amount and kind of self-esteem is absolutely necessary to success in life. No boy can get along without it. A man must have it or be a failure. It is far removed from what is self-conceit. It is not the foolish self-approbation of the vain. It is based partly on that good thing we call self-respect. How can you expect others to respect you if you do not respect yourself. A teacher in a public school not long ago told me that she happened to hear a boy talking in the corridor after school. The other boy wanted my neighbor's boy to go with him to a questionable place of amusement. "No, I'm not going I think too much of myself to be seen going to a place like that."

When a boy thinks too much of himself to do things that would reflect on his character he has the right kind of an idea of the value he should set on himself. He appreciates the fact that the world has a right to look to him for his own rating and that he must stamp his own value on himself. I remember that when I was a boy, there was a boy in our town, in his teens, who had fallen into the very shocking habit of profanity. His common speech was interlarded with it. One day when he was unusually profane another boy turned on him and said: "Oh, Ned, Ned! What makes you talk so? Don't you think enough of yourself not to talk like that? You make yourself look small and contemptible when you talk like that."

A boy who is profane does make himself look exceedingly small, and others can have nothing but contempt for him. And he proves that he is not putting a very high value

on himself when he goes around with a cigarette in his mouth. It is fine when a boy holds himself erect with a right degree and kind of pride and says: "I think too much of myself to lower myself in my own esteem by doing things that make me look small or mean or ridiculous in the eyes of others."

This is certain, boys: No boy can hope to succeed in life when he has lost the respect of all who know him and he is certain to lose this respect if he does not respect himself. He was a wise man who said long years ago: "Nothing can work me damage except myself; the harm that I sustain I carry about with me, and I am a real sufferer but by my own fault."

Nothing is so likely to work a boy damage as for him not to think highly enough of himself. You can set it down that as a fact no one can successfully dispute this. I once heard a boy talking who was having fun poked at him for being so very neat in his person and in his dress. He said: "I think enough of myself to look as well as I can."

Here was a boy wise enough to honor himself in his personal appearance, and he is a wise boy who does this. He owes it to himself and to others to present as good an appearance as he can. I never knew an untidy or slovenly man who did not repel a large number of people. Such men are always lacking in a kind of self-esteem that all men should have. Even high genius cannot show too great a disregard for dress and cleanliness without coming under the ban of condemnation.

Now, the boy who starts out in life with a certain degree and kind of self-esteem that will not allow him to be discourteous or vulgar or profane or slovenly in dress or person or untruthful or idle, is the boy who thinks well of himself in a way that is certain to cause others to think well of him no matter his station in life. No man can gain-say that.

FAST TRAIN FROM FORT WORTH TO ST. LOUIS,

The Texas & Pacific Railway, in conjunction with the St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern Railway, will, effective December 1st, 1915, inaugurate De Luxe fast train service between Fort Worth, Dallas, and St. Louis, which will be known as "The Sunshine Special." The schedule between Fort Worth and St. Louis will be approximately 24 hours less and between Dallas and St. Louis 19 hours or less.

In making this announcement, Geo. D. Hunter, General Passenger Agent of the Texas & Pacific Railway indicated that the establishment of this service does not in any sense signify a speed war, but it is the consummation of plans tentatively considered over a year ago and interrupted because of the war. At a special meeting of Texas & Pacific and Iron Mountain officials at Hot Springs a month ago consideration of these plans were renewed and a decision reached at that meet to put the "Sunshine Special" into commission December 1st.

The train between Dallas and St. Louis will be of new all steel equipment from engine to observation car and the schedule so adjusted as to make connections with fast trains at St. Louis to and from eastern and northern points. This will reduce the time between Fort Worth and Dallas and the North and the East four to twelve hours.

"The Sunshine Special" will leave Fort Worth about 3:30 p. m., Dallas about 4:30 p. m. daily, arriving in St. Louis before noon. Southbound the train will be scheduled to leave St. Louis early in the evening, arriving in Dallas about noon, Fort Worth about 1:00 p. m. The name of the new train "The Sunshine Special" was adopted as intending to suggest something of the charm of the Southwest country through which it traverses and which will bring into this country visitors from the North and East.

The chief idea in putting on this service is to increase tourist travel to this section and it is figured that the proposed schedule will have that tendency and it is hoped that it will be the means of drawing tourists from Southeastern resorts to the Southwest, because of the more attractive service and quicker time. The new train will handle thru traffic only making not more than three or four stops on the Texas & Pacific and stops will probably be made at Little Rock and division points on the Iron Mountain.

Both the Texas & Pacific and the Iron Mountain have recently been relaid with heavy steel and ballasted and are in better shape than ever before to handle the new train with safety and speed.

It is hoped that the venture will meet with the approval and patronage of the public as this is an attempt of the railroads to give the people of this section Twentieth Century service.

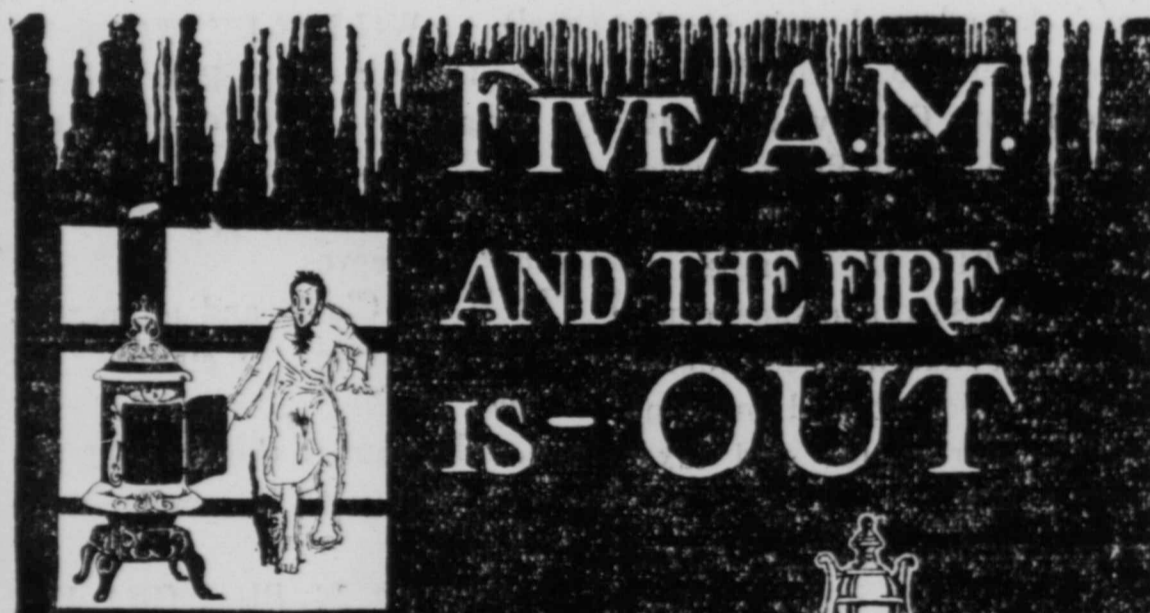
