A News Bulletin issued by the Post Office Department of the United States states that larger postal savings will now be accepted at the post office. This is made possible by an important amendment to the Postal Savings Act just approved by President Wilson. A postal savings depositor may now have an account to the amount of \$1,000 upon which interest will be paid. Formerly \$500 was the maximum amount he could have to his chedit. This enlargement of postal saving facilities will be very ratifying to thousands of depositors who have already reached the old \$500 limit are are anxious to entrust more of their savings to Uncle Sam. Another feature of the amendment that will be the means of avoiding further embarassment to the public and to postal officials is the doing away with the limit on the amount that could be accepted from the depositor monthly. Under the old law only \$100 could be deposited in a calendar month. The amendment abolishes this restriction While the Postal Savings system has already proved a signal success as is shown by the fact that more than half a million depositors have over \$80-000,000 standing to the credit, still it has fallen short of meeting the full demands of the public because of the restrictions which have now been elinminated. Postmaster General Burleson and Third Assistant Postmaster General. Dockery, have been tireless in their efforts to secure a modification of the limitations and the new liberalizing legislation is particularly gratifying to them.


