**PECOS CITY RIFLE CLUB SECRETARY'S REPORT.**

Made to the Executive of the Financial Standing of the Organization to Date.

To the Executive Committee: Regarding the financial status of the club and other items of interest and also recommendations as to improvements that are necessary at the range to make it more effective for rapid fire practice, I report the following:

Receipts—Enrollment of 65 members at \$2 each, \$130. Assessments collected \$9. Assessments due, \$56. A total of \$195.

The expenditures, an itemized bill of which can be seen in hands of secretary, amounted to \$121.97.

Outstanding bills amounting to \$41.88.

The following recommendations for better service at the range are suggested:

The target house must be enlarged to permit posting one of the targets inside the house out of the wind.

The pit must be equipped with pump to get water out, and pit must be floored after digging about 6 inches deeper.

The parafet must be made about 2 feet thicker and raised 4 inches to line with center of target frames.

A set of 20 inch marking disks must be provided for 600 to 1000 yard ranges.

Larger flags of red cloth are needed for the long ranges.

The embankment at the 300, 500, and 600 yard ranges must be raised about 12 inches or the ground about 100 yards from the pit lowered about 6 or 8 inches to prevent mirages from interfering with the sight when shooting.

The telephone is a necessity at the mid-range, and the long range firing points, and must be installed before competitive shoots are staged.

The club members have formed a very embarrassing habit of requesting the secretary to "order me one in the next requisition," without putting up the collateral, forgetting that the War Department does business on a cash basis. It is to be hoped that they will refrain from this habit, and will thereby relieve the secretary of the embarrassment of having to explain that the club has no

loan fund available at present.

Just at present we need \$25 to purchase ammunition, as the free issue is available only for use on the range, and a number of members want cartridges for hunting purposes.

It is to be hoped that none of the members residing in Pecos will refuse to pay the assessment, as the necessity of paying our debts and maintaining the range is thus laid before you.

Without taking any credit to myself, I will say that the range has been built with less expense than any other of an equal size and distance in the country. The cost of the ranges in different part of the country run from \$500 to \$25,000 according to size and the equipments.

As about nine members in good standing have left Pecos our assessments will only yield about \$45, which will leave us a very small margin, after paying our debts, to make the improvements needed at the target range.

We have at present in the hands of the members and the Executive Committee 10 rifles of the free issue, and 34 rifles and 6 carbines purchased by the members.

Approximately 3500 rounds of ball cartridges of the free issue.

We purchased and resold to members 2000 ball cartridges at a profit of \$7.50 which is in the treasury.

Receipts from all sources—\$146.50.

Expenditures—\$121.97.  
Cash on hand—\$24.53.  
Bill due—\$41.88.  
Deficit—\$17.35.

Assessments due from actual resident members, \$45.
