



Solid Comfort Expressed in This Design.

This bungalow is one where the future up-keep will be exceedingly small. Everything which enters into this construction is solid, the whole house being planned to embody comfort, convenience and utility. The porch columns, pedestals, and buttresses, and chimney are rough, hewn stones with smooth stone caps. The front porch girded with heavy iron beams gives an unobstructive view of the whole front.






