Under the circumstances had he been as good as he thinks himself to be, he would have writ n arrearage and would have sent the little 30 cents he owed or the paper, along with a courteous re quest to discontinue it. The roubie with these peop and a lit tle of the education that money ran buy, and they think that they are better than other people, and it is their busipess to show other people how smart they are. Well, it just makes us tired, that's all Pea Ridge Pod.
All tender-hearted people will commiserate with this editor, comments the Memphis NewsScimiter. The iron has entered his soul and he has felt the sting of that marble-hearted fiend, ingratitude. In his ever interestwealthy citizen he gave this wealthy citizen many splendid personal notices, and carried his name not only to the extreme limit of the circulation of the Pod but flung it into the maelstrom of the New York dailies, that swirl about and circulate over at reast one-hali of the univer wonest of vices, and one of th
most dangerous. Great Caesar
whose name at one time could whose name at one time could
stand against the world, was van quished by ingratitude and inared more than by the daggers in the hands of traitors.
When an editor uses his very best style in writing up a wealthy citizen he does not go beyond the ounds of legitimate expectations when he places himself in a mental attitude to accept an invitation to dinner, or to receive a
contribution of farm products so abundant in Arkansas, and so welcome to the editor of an enter prising newspaper. The rank turpitude of this wealthy non paying subscriber is accentuated by the fact that the Pod wrote up an elaborate account of a wedding that occurred in the family, that valuable space and much labo were devoted to sounding the praises of a scion of the house who won honors in college, and

They may hold grim death, but life has grip ing for them, and they get nothing out of it, for the simple rea son that they put nothing into it. His pun ishment will come in this world and we may be sure that in the next he will get it again with ompound interest.

rich. They are all made out of the same kind of mud and sub ect to the same kind of fits. The trouble is they are all human and prone to evil, and usually the ditor is the first oue to catch the venom of a citizen who has been given the very best of the deal but can't see why he should not have been praised, as well as his whims and fancies, instead of getting the roasting he really deserved. If the people as a whole really understood how much the editor left out of his paper that would be good, legitimate news and most excellent reading, for the sympathy they have for the unredeemed public, they would likely have more compassion on the editor.
