Prohibits anyone receiving in oxicating liquor from a common arrier, whether for personal use $r$ otherwise.
Prohibits any person, firm orporation, or ofticer, agent mploye from "carrying or de ivering" to any person, firm o corporation intoxicating liquor for shipment into dry terfitory This applies to shippers or thei agents in wet territory, whethe inside or outside the state.
Prohibits the shipment of intoxicating liquor into dry territory
Prohibits common and othe carriers to receive intoxicating liquors for shipment into dry territory, irrespective of the use to which it is to be put
Permits a person to "person ally carry" intoxicating liquor into dry territory for use of himself or his family residing with him," but only in a total
quantity not to exceed une-balf gallon

Judge Alley, as he was famil iarly called, came to Texas when about 16 years of age. Forty-five years ago in Gonzales, Texas, he left behind. To the wife who is left behind. To them were born seven children. One died in in fancy. The others are: Miss Hoy, of Pecos, Mrs. Hattie Modges of nction, Texas, Mrs Mora Hall of Big Springs, Mrs Lizzie Shannon and Fenton Alley of Carlsbad, New Mexico, and Howard Alley of Colambus, New Mexico. All the children except Mrs. Hodges and Howard were resent when the father died.
During the civil war Mr. Alley nlisted in the cause of the Con federacy, and served in the conmand of General Albert Sydney Johnson. In later years he a member of Terry's Texas Rang ars He man rs. He served as County Judg Kimbal county, Texas, for six eighteen years. He came to Pe cos about twenty years ago, and erved one or two terms in the Mayor's office. Thus it will be seen that during all his life be was an active citizen in public affairs.
Early in life he made a public confession of his faith in Chris and obeyed Him in Baptism. For many years he had been a mem. ber of the congregation of Christ lans mecting in lecos, and wras all of us he had his virtues and his frailties, but above all he is fith. He abe all he hal of the Masonic and Odd Fellow raternities.
