Another complaint is that we need more room. At the present we have ote basement room that is not in use and has not been this tarm. We are advised that we can get along very nicely anothe year with ope high school teacher less than we now have. In that case w will have two unased rooms for th. oming year, and this would be enough space to start the proposed domestic cience and manual training, and we hink that this should be started on a sma!! scale and worked up to perfection
As to the taxes, the scheme of the romoters is to double the valuation of property in the district and still ollect the fifty cents (the constitutiona) limit). Guess there is no limit to raising the viluation.
