Reports received from Austin indicate that the appointments to the State Highway Commission will be made by the Governor by the time this goes to press. This means that the machinery of that department will soon be in operation.

Before the Commission can act on applications to have any road designated as a State Highway, it will be necessary for the County Judge in the different counties interested, to have maps made, showing their highway system, and indicating the roads which they wish made State Highways.

A letter will go out soon to the county judges along our line, asking that they submit maps at once, so that our highway may be properly designated as a State Highway through their counties. This letter will give the size, also other information relative to the needed maps.





E UROPEAN WAR HAPPENING

Many Occurrences of Interest and Information Recorded Here in Condensed Form.

AMERICA'S PART IN WAR-

Reports that the German submarine blockade is becoming more and more efficient were given serious attention by the American cabinet and most of the discussion was directed toward supplying quickly as many ships as possible to carry supplies to the entente.

-0-Captain Rice of the American steamship Mongolia, said on arrival at a British port that the Mongolia had fired the first gun of the war of the United States and had sunk a German submarine. The submarine, Captain Rice said, was about to attack the great liner in British waters on April 19. He declared that the gunners made a clean hit at 1,000 yards.

-0-President Wilson has approved requests from France and Italy for immediate financial aid, and from \$200, 000,000 to \$250,000,000 will be loaned them within the next few days. In the case of Italy the amount has not been divulged, but is understood to be between \$50,000,000 and \$100,000, 000. France will receive between \$150,000,000 and \$200,000,000, probably the larger amount.

-0-Rafael Montoro, secretary to President Menocal of Cuba, officially denied reports to Washington that Cuba had asked for a loan from the United States. Cuba, he'said, had no intention of asking for a loan, but, he declared, "will face her war probem on her own resources."





-0-A violent earthquake in Tuscany and Umbria is reported in a Rome dispatch to have occurred on Thursday morning. Many persons are reported killed at Monterchi, near Arezzo, the capital of the province of that name. Considerable material damage is also reported.

WASHINGTON

Orders directing the country's railroads to give coal and iron ore preference over all other traffic were issued by the general railroad board of the council of national defense formed in Washington recently by railroad heads to operate American railway lines as one continental system during the war.

The coroner's jury returned a verdict finding there was no evidence before them to lead to the conclusion that the explosion at the Eddystone Ammunition corporation plant at Eddystone, Pa., on April 10, was due to a premeditated or any other cause.

The Japanese government has announced that the cruiser Azuma will sail April 28, bearing to the United States the body of the late George W. Guthrie, American ambassador to Japan.

-0-Contracts for the 38 submarines authorized by the last congress will be awarded at once. The boats will be duplicates of the 800-ton type craft already under construction. -0-Within ten days after the selective draft bill is signed, everytownship in the country will be registering its young men for duty and work will have begun on the 16 training cantonments or camps where preparation of the forces for war will start in August or September.

Special agents of the department of justice are said to have discovered evidence of supply manipulation and price fixing by combination among potato dealers in Chicago and it is said the federal grand jury will investigate. The wholesale price of potatoes ranged from \$2.75 to \$3.15, with 30,000 bushels in storage. A year ago there was in storage 19,000

bushels and the price was but 85c. -0-

EUROPEAN WAR HAPPENINGS-

The extent of the German losses in the recent desperate fighting along the Aisne is partially disclosed in the reference in the French official statements to the capture of 130 guns. The German losses in men are estimated at more than 200,000, with the probability that the total reached 235,000.

Telegrams received at Petrograd from Riga indicated that the Germans are continuing unremittingly their attempts to parley with the Rassian soldiers. At one place the Germans displayed a placard on which was written: "Russians: Do not attack. We also will not attack."






PLAN FOR OUTDOOR BROODER Farmer, Handy With Hammer and

Nails, Can Easily Arrange Device to Accommodate Chicks.

If your men folks are handy with hammer and nails, they can soon make you an outdoor brooder, writes Mrs. E. L. Eddy in Farm Progress. We used a pine box, 18 by 12, and with a keyhole saw cut out a circle from the bottom of the box. In this we fitted a gallon sirup bucket, turned upside down. Punch the inverted bottom of this pail full of holes.

Put a hinged lid on the box, covering this lid with tarred paper to keep out dampness, and nail laths on the underside of the lid, spacing these three inches apart. From the laths



GEESE ON RANGE OR PASTURE

If Grass Is Plentiful Fowls Will Take Care of Themselves During Whole of Six Months.

Full grown geese can be turned out on the range or pasture and if grass is plentiful will take care of themselves during six months of the year. They must have green food at all times.

During the breeding and laying season they should be fed twice a day with cornmeal and shorts in equal parts, slightly moistened. If their food is made sloppy it will cause bowel trouble.

Stale bread slightly moistened with water is an excellent food and to this should be added ground beef scraps.



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

Plan is to Confer Wide Powers on Department of Agriculture, Even to Extent of Fixing Prices.

Washington.-The food supply question, with all its angles, plans for increasing production, the prevention of waste and the conservatiaon of crops, will now engage the attention of congress as a part of the government's war program, and resolutions introduced by Senator Gore and Representative Lever, chairman of the respective committees, seek to confer wide powers upon the department of agriculture in carrying out the national policy.

Already the agricultural department has under way a campaign among farmers to stimulate production, and with it is being urged the city garden campaign for the production of vegetables that will more readily meet the needs of the people at home. The government does not fear in any sense and overproduction in the staple crops. The United States practically is the only country the agricultural facilities of which can not be interferred with, and a world-wide demand awaits its pro-

Price-Fixing to Come Later.

ducts.

The question of price-fixing, by far the most revolutionary step of the war touching the country in an economical way, is not dealt with in the resolutions offered, but is to be a part of legislation soon to follow, and, as forecast by members of congress, will embrace the maximum as well as the minimum prices. As a stimulation to production it has been regarded as essential to fix the minimum price farmers are to receive for their crops, but the big problem which congress will be asked to face is that dealing with the price to the consumer.
