In behalf of the Troop and Phone 11 without their knowledge, I am appealing to the manhood of Pecos to furnish the Troop a Scoutmaster, raise sufficient funds to pay him for at least a part of his time, and let the Troop have a chance to continue its development. The undersigned has applied for a place in the second, training camp at Leon Springs, August 27, and the chances are all in favor of his being accepted. The growth in the membership of the Boy Scouts of America, rapid as it has been, has not absorbed more than a small fraction of the boys who want to be scouts and who certainly ought to be scouts. while on the other hand, the war has brought out scores and hundreds of men, who having the character and most of the qualifications for military service, have been disappointed to find that they could not secure commission, nor enlist in any branch of the service because of disability or age. The time is ripe for bringing

these men and boys together.
