## New Schedule for the P. V. S. R'y

Beginning Sunday Only Three  
Regular Trains Per Week  
Will Be Run.

The Pecos Valley Southern Railway Company is making some changes in their train schedule, effective Sunday, July 8th. The mixed freight and passenger train will run on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays only, beginning next week, and on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays the company will operate small open motor cars to carry passengers and mail, leaving Pecos at 7:45 as at present.

No baggage, freight of express handled on Tuesdays, Thursdays or Saturdays.

This change is necessary on account of the failure of their water supply in the Davis Mountains.

The company has been buying water for their engines from the Santa Fe for two or three months, but even that supply is now uncertain, so it is absolutely necessary to make some reduction in the freight service.

P. V. S. officials are working on plans for a gasoline motor car to carry about 30 passengers, besides baggage and express compartment, and hope to be able to put such a car in commission before long. But in the meantime they will do their best to take care of the business with the equipment they now have.

## Camp Meeting Set For Aug. 15.

The annual camp meeting at Skillman's Grove will open this year on August 15th. Rev. Mr. Milliken will be in charge at the opening. The date was decided upon last Sunday at the meeting grounds where leading members of the association and others gathered at noon that day.

The meeting was very brief, though many took their dinners, the necessities of the ranches took them home early in the afternoon. Rev. Milliken delivered a short sermon at 11 o'clock, and a business meeting was held at two.

## Draft Machinery Set in Motion Monday

Information That Many Who  
Have Registered Under Con-  
scription Law Should Know

On last Monday (by a proclamation of the regulations under which the selection will be made the president started the huge labor of singling out the Nation's manhood for service.

The regulations are in six general sections defining the men who are free from military services, the setting up of the exemption boards, defining their duties.

Only a small group of classes of men are exempt. All others must appear before the exemption tribunals and after hearing the evidence their cases will be decided. In cases of doubt to safeguard and to hedge in the action of the boards the utmost publicity is provided for.

The following classes are exempt from conscription, upon proof of their status being submitted:

Men indispensable to the industries necessary to the maintenance of the military establishment of national interests.

Men with wives, children or parents or dependents, who are dependent solely upon them.

Members of well-recognized religious creeds whose creed forbids the bearing of arms.

Students and ordained ministers of the gospel.

Legislative, judicial and executive officers of the United States.

Men engaged in the transmission of the United States Mail.

Pilots, and mariners of the United States Merchant Marine.

Criminals convicted of felonies and those morally deficient.

The district exemption board have power to decide which men are indispensable and also which are necessary industries.

One or more boards is provided for each federal district. The burden of proof for exemption is placed upon claimant.

Appeal from the rulings of the exemption tribunals is provided.

## Texas May Lead in Production of Sulphur

Sulphur Bids Well to One of  
Most Valuable Assets in  
Development of Resources

Texas, not being content with providing the "Palace" and "Throne" for the abode and reign of "King Cotton", now bids well to establish within its boundaries the sovereignty of "Queen Sulphur."

During the few years intervening since 1912, the sulphur deposit at the mouth of the Brazos River, developed by the Freeport Sulphur Company of Freeport, Texas, has placed itself second in the world in sulphur production. It is now only surpassed by that of Louisiana, developed by the Union Sulphur Company of Sulphur, Louisiana.

Prior to the discovery of these sulphur deposits, Sicily, and Japan operated the only two commercially producing sulphur mines in the world. However, Sicily virtually supplied the world demand, as Japan consumed practically all of its own output.

Back in the 90's the sulphur beds in Louisiana were known to exist, but, as they lay many hundreds of feet below the surface of the ground, the engineers were for some time unable to devise means of mining it in a profitable manner; and it was not for some time, about 1901 that the present method was invented and installed. This method enables the owners to bring the sulphur to the surface by means of super-heated water being forced under high pressure through pipes into the sulphur beds below, refining it to its native bed and lifting it to the surface through air lifts.

It was then only a few years until the Union Sulphur Company was the leading producing sulphur concern in the world. This was followed by the discovery of sulphur at the mouth of the Brazos River, and the organization and successful operation of the Freeport Sulphur Company of Freeport, Texas, whose sulphur beds lie below the surface of the soil, several hundred feet and must be mined in a like manner as the Union Company's deposits.

The sulphur industry of Texas, however, was not destined to be confined to one locality, as indications of sulphur were found to exist in Culberson County, in West Texas, where only last year a vast deposit of rich sulphur was discovered, which resulted in the organization of several companies to develop this field, notably: the West Texas Sulphur Company, the Michigan Sulphur & Oil Company and the United States Sulphur Company of Texas.

The sulphur deposits owned by these companies are located in what is known as the Rustler Spring district of Culberson County, and bid well to prove to be the most valuable and extensive yet discovered in the world. This sulphur, unlike the other two deposits in this country, lies near the surface of the ground, appearing in many places at a depth of only three feet, and the beds, or strata, lie in a vast formation of gypsum, estimated to run to a depth of at least two thousand feet, and associated with petroleum and hydrogen gas.

These rich strata of sulphur lie in blanket formation in this vast bed of gypsum, one immediately under the other, and ranging from five to thirty or more feet in depth. No driller has yet penetrated the series of strata. The association of the several properties in these beds with organic matter is continually forming and adding to the sulphur deposits and promises an unlimited supply that may never be exhausted.

## May Mean 324 Men Drafted

Telegram to El Paso Brokers  
Give 12 Numbers Said to Apply By Precincts.

Curtis, Montague & Co., El Paso brokers received a message over their special Logan & Bryan wire, Thursday, giving what is alleged to be a list of registration numbers which have been decided on at Washington in the first application of the selective army draft, according to today's El Paso Herald. It states further:

"According to the message the men holding the following numbers will be drawn from each precinct in the United States: 59, 61, 11, 17, 62, 67, 97, 100, 111, 125, 145, and 146."

"This information was taken to mean that El Paso men whose registration numbers in the 27 precincts correspond to the foregoing 12 figures will be drafted. If the 12 men in each precinct in the city of El Paso are designated it means that this call is for 324 men in this city. A second call is expected in another week, others to follow until the full number of men needed is secured.

There are 14 precincts in El Paso county, but the registered men in more than five of them total more than 100 each. They are Grandview, El Paso refinery, Sierra Blanca and in the smelter precincts.
