## Synopsis of the New Highway Law

Seal of the Highway Depart ment Must Be on All Cars. To Be Enforced.

At the request of some or our readers we give a synopsis of the State road law that became effective July 1st, 1917, All chauffeurs shall have a as follows:

it may lawfully be driven over ment. any street or road within this state.

That upon every motor vehicle so driven there must be disof motorcycles.

thereof number plates corresponding to the numbers assigned such vehicles by the Highway Department.

in case registration fees are such fees and penalties.

light in the rear which shall be visible a like distance. Under same conditions a motorcycle shall display one light in front and in the rear which shall be visible 500 feet.

All motor vehicles must at all times be provided with adequate brakes in good working order.

No muffler cutouts shall be used in any town or any highway near a closely built up section, and all vehicles shall be so arranged as to prevent unnecessary noise.

No drunk or intoxicated persons shall drive a motor vehicle in this state.

No vehicle shall be left in any public highway unless the brakes are set and the motor stopped thereon.

All vehicles shall be driven in a careful manner with due regard to the safety and convenience of pedestrians.

Two vehicles passing each other shall have the right- ofway and no other vehicle shall pass or attempt to pass such vehicles.

All travel shall be upon the right side of the highway unless the road on the left shall be clear and unobstructed for at least fifty feet ahead.

Every precaution shall be used in passing a vehicle that Drug Store.—Advt. is drawn by a horse, or two horses, or a person riding a horse to prevent frightening same and to insure the safety of the person or persons riding or driving same.

In passing any interurban railroad or street car while passengers are alighting from or boarding same, a motor vehicle shall be so operated as to insure the safety of such passenger's even thought it may be necessary to stop said motor vehicle.

Police patrols, ambulances, fire engines, etc., shall have the right-of-way at all times, but shall exercise due care at all

In crossing railroads and interurbans at grade crossings, all motor vehicles and motorcycles shall reduce their speed to six miles an hour, where the view of the crossing is obstructed. even partially.

In case of any collision between a motor vehicle and any other object the driver of and all persons in control of such vehicles shall stop and render such assistance as possible, including the carrying of any injured person to the physician or hospital, and shall furnish all information that may be asked by the person damaged. Violation of this provision shall be punished with imprisonment in the state penitentiary
