Even if the Germans were to land an army on the mainland, turn the Rissian right wing, and march in triumph to Petrograd-the latter feat being highly hazardous, considering the near advent of the severe winterthe main campaigns of the war would yet be little affected. The farther Germany extends her lines into Russia, the larger the military burdens she assumes and the stronger she unites the bickering Russian factions into a loyal consciousness of National unity. The war, moreover, cannot be won or lost on the eastern front .-Dallas Democrat.



This right is purely optional. The soldiers are sailors are not compelled to take insurance, but they desire to exercise the right. ney must do so before the 12th of 'ebruary, 1918. The cost ranges from 5 cents monthly, at the age of 21, to \$1.20 monthly, at the age of 51, for ach \$1000 of insurance. This is a mall charge on a man's pay-small in proportion to the benefits it may oring. The premiums will be deductd from his pay, if he desires, thus eliminating trouble on his part. To provide adequate protection unil February 12, 1918; during the perod when the soldiers and sailors are earning the details of this law, the lovernment automatically insures ach man and woman commissioned or enlisted in the military service of he United States. It pays the man 25 a month during total permanent lisability; if he dies within 20 years, it pays the rest of the 2400 monthly installments of \$25 each to his wife, hild, or widowed mother. I desire to call the provisions of this just and generous law to the attention of our officers and enlisted men and women so that they might not be deprived of their rights from tack of knowledge. Full particulars may be obtained from the Bureau of War Risk Insurance of the Treasury Department, Washington, D. C. earnestly urge that the officers of the Army and Navy give to the men under their command all possible aid in helping them to understand fully the benefits that this insurance may bring to their families and the small cost at which it may be obtained. 

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


