
The experiment consisted in examining 296 literate and illiterate immigrants above the age of nine, by the means of puzzles, questions, and other psychiatric tests in order to find out the mental status of the normal or average immigrant at the time of his landing here. During the investigation which continued over a number of months, fully 15,000 tests were applied to these immigrants.

The volume shows how the various tests were executed by the different alien groups and throws light upon many points in connection with racial psychology. After the presentation of the data in each test a discussion of the test is entered into. The bulletin contains a number of new tests, and new ideas in regard to scoring and testing and the original findings in the field of experimental psychology.

While the bulletins were designed primarialy to increase the efficiency of the mental examination of arriving aliens, it is believed that it will be of value to research workers in other mental fields. The bulletin will be of service to examiners of mentally defective persons. It also contains material which will be of interest to the teacher, psychiatrist and public health officer.







# Instructions for

Many Work Hard, But The Garments Do Not Meet the Requirements According to Mrs. Slaughter

Mrs. Florence M. Rodgers, wife of Archie Rodgers, has accepted the position of instructor of sock knitting of the Dallas County Red Cross Chapfer, and will give a large part of ner time to the work. Red Cross officials said Mrs. Rodgers is an expert knitter of socks and knows how they should be knitted for the soldiers. She will visit the various Red Cross organizations and teach the student knitters how to knit socks for the Red Cross. Mrs. Gross R. Scruggs is supervisor of knitting of the Dallas County Chapter and Miss Mary Hobson is asmistant supervisor. As soon as possible expert instructors will be appoint- heel. ed for other parts of the work.

"A large per cent of the women of Texas are knitting garments for the goldfers" Mrs. A. A. Slaughter, who is in charge of a department of the Dallas County Chapter, said yesterday. "The extent of the activities of the women is tremendous. Everywhere women are knitting, working hard and faithfully, and nowhere can the aggregate results of this labor be seen to better advantage than in the Chapter headquarters. The great trouble, however, is, that many of the Joyal knitters do not make the garments according to Red Cross regulations, and we find it impossible to use many of them. For instance, we found vesterday that we could send the soldiers only eight out of 300 wool socks sent in by the good women of one town. The discarded ones will sent to refugees and civilian vicams of the war. For excellent reasons they cannot be sent to soldiers.' Mrs. Rodgers has prepared "standard" instructions for the knitting of Red Cross socks. She said that if one peemingly unimportant item is not followed explicitly, all of the socks may not meet the requirements. For instance, only gray wool should b used as socks of no other color can be sent to soldiers.

Have thirty-two stitches on two needles (sixteen each) for front, the remaining thirty-two stitches on one needle for heel. Knit a row and puri a row, always sliping the first stitch, until you have 32 rows of sixteen stitches (each stitch representing two rows) along the side of the





Common justice demands hat, the exact age of every man be stated and that no slacker be allowed to shirk military duty by misstating his age. If the sacrifices and hardhips of war are to be equally and fairly divided, the age of each man must be made a public record else some one will evade military service. while others, who are not matured. and are under the age, will enlist. Frequent requests are received by the Bureau of Vital Statistics for certified copies of birth certificates for those born prior to 1903 in which year the birth registration law was passed and the State has no record of any of the births prior to that year. In order to provide a permanent re-

cord of age, parentage and citizenship of those born prior to 1903, the Erreau of Vital Statistics will accept any cer-



#### SWEET POTATO ROT

The following treatment for sweet potato rot is recommended by the plant pathologist of the State Depart ment of Agriculture, Austin, Texas: There are numerous diseases that effect the sweet potato. There is no one set method of keeping these diseases in control, because we find them attacking the potato in the seed bed, in the field and in storage. The black rot is probably the severest, but the same treatments practically hold true

### POSSESSION OF LIQUOR CAN BE PROHIBITED

Washington, Dec. 10 .- With a decision upholding the Idaho prohibition law, the Supreme Court today gave a decision that may be one of the most far-fetching victories for "bone-dry" prohibition yet recorded. It was held that a citizen has no constitutional right to possess liwishes to forbid it.

Justice McReynolds, who gave the court's opinion held that a state "has power absolutely to prohibit manufacture, gift, purchase, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors in its own borders without violating the constitution."



If service in the army does nothing else for thousands of young men, it will save them from the sufferings that are exacted in middle life from wearing ill-fitting shoes in the younger days.



sound, healthy seed, and to guard against possible infection, immerse them for 10 or 15 minutes in 8 or 10 gallons of water containing 1 ounce of formaldehyde. A formaldehyde solution will also serve as a disinfectant for the seed bed, 1 pint of formealdehyde to 20 gallons of water being the proper dilution. Use this at the rate of one gallon per square foot of the seed bed. Cover the seed bed for 12 hours with canvas in order that the formaldehyde fumes will have ample time to penetrate the soil.

The black rot as well as other potato diseases may easily be carried over from one year to another in the field. The infecting agents or germs will live on potato roots and in the soil itself, besides causing infection to allied plants of the sweet potato, such as the wild morning glory. Keeping the fields clean is therefore necessary in eliminating infection in the field. The sterilization of the seed and the seed bed prove of very little value when the field, where the slips are to be planted, has produced an abundance of diseased potatoes year after

Successive planting on the sauce land year after year will almost always yield diseased potatoes. Rotation in growing sweet potatoes is absolutely necessary. Keeping the potatoes healthy in storage is another problem. A uniform temperature of 85 to 90 degrees Fahrenheit is least favorable to the development of black rot, and is therefore more favorable to the sound keeping of potatoes in the storage house. A fluctuating temperature in the presence of sufficient mois ture is conducive to the germination of the disease spores. Before storing




