Letter From Ray Harrison Who Is With "Our Boys, Somewhere In France."

Dear Home Folks:

Thanksgiving day, and I am none the worse from the fact. We had a real enjoyable dinner and I nearly ate too much, in fact was very uncomfortable for some few hours after. This detachment has two unusually good cooks, one, in fact, used to run between New York and Chi cago in dining car service and naturally should be a good cook, the other has picked up his knowledge 'over here. I had previously written you that we were to have turkey for this eventful day, but when they arrived they were geese, but just as well appreciated. They were cooked fine, and in addition had some very fine dressing, mashed potatoes, celery, which I personally found in a cooperative store and purchased 15 bundles for four francs fifty, which is about 85 cents in the states; that's the cheapest stuff I ever saw here. We also bought some pumpkin and had pumpkin pie, apples, figs, and lemons cooked together which seems to be a very good dish; some good coffee, with condensed milk, and, later, some punch made from lemon juice and Pinard (wine). Needless to say that after this feed we had no desire for supper, and I venture to say that there wasn't a bunch of soldiers in France that had a better feed than we did. After our dinner Mr. Conarthy, who was, previous to his enlistment, agent at Clovis, N. M., and I took a four-mile walk. He is not located at this detachment but came over to spend the day with us. We have had our first snow now, and had it not melted about as fast as it fell would have probably been three inches, but the climate is too warm in France for snow to stay on say that, but I am not so sure, as I burg. have seen some pretty cold nights so far. think he could do that all right. If meat and eggs get much higher in the states you people are going to have to eat rabbits and birds this winter. I wouldn't mind having some myself right now. I have not seen any rabbits, that is, wild ones, since my arrival over here, but have seen several bunches of partridges. It is quite remarkable that they stay up so close to the firing line; one would think that they would leave the country, but you notice all kinds of bird life, and there is also a wild hog that stays in the forests. Some of the boys have seen some but I have not had that pleasure yet. Must close. Give my love to al and write often.

The same is true of real estate. If you sold part or all of the farm, Through Sleeper they figure as profit or income the difference between the cash value on March 1, 1913, and the price for which it sold, or the difference between its cost and selling price if acquired on or after March 1, 1913, Rents are considered income whether paid in cash or in part of the crop, or otherwise.

> Of course there are exemptions. The single person who is supporting dependent children or dependent parents or crippled relatives who cannot help support themselves is considered the head of a family and has the same exemption-\$2000-as a married person. Unmarried persons with incomes of less than \$1000 and no dependents are exempt from the tax. Where husband and wife both

have incomes they can report together and claim one exemption, or report separately, and divide the one exemption between them. In case they are divorced or living apart, the one caring for the children can claim

full exemption and the other only \$1000. There is an exemption to the extent of \$200 for each dependent

child under eighteen years of age. Suppose your net income figured up to \$2800 and you have four dependent children under eighteen years of age, you would be allowed \$800 deduction for them.

A vessel of this type would probably not begin her work of destruction until she had reached a point a thousand miles or more from North Sea, far beyond the reach of trawlers and small patrol craft, and

depend on the axtent of her fuel, her food and ammunition supply, but in all liklihood a vessel of 3000 tons would be self-contained for two and even three months. Having plenty of deck space and roomy quarters below, the crew would live as comfortable as on board a destroyer. A submarine cruiser of the tonnage mentioned might carry half a dozen 4-inch guns or a small number of heavier weapons, and, of course, carry torpedo tubes. Her speed might be as high as twenty-five knots.

The American submarine Schley, designed more than three years ago, has a speed of twenty knots on the surface, and as the internal combustion engine has been much improved since then, the new German vessels are certain to be faster than this. Below the suface they will be able to

"Nothing herein shall be construed as now affecting the possession, operation and control of street electric passenger railways, including railways commonly called interurbans, whether such railways be or be not cwned or controlled by such railroad companies or systems. By subsequent order and proclamation, if and when it shall be found necessary or otherwise desirable, possession, control or operation may be taken of all or any part of such street railway systems, including subways and tunnels, and by subsequent order and proclamation, possession, operation. and control in whole or in part may also be relinquished to the owners thereof of any part of the railroad systems of rail and water systems, possession and control of which are hereby assumed.
