

AFTER KILLING SHERIFF WHO ATTEMPTED TO ARREST HIM HE IS SHOT TO DEATH BY POSSE OF SANDERSON

On Tuesday of this week Ed Valentine shot and killed Sheriff Anderson of Terrell county, at Sanderson, when the officer attempted to arrest him for an alleged disturbance of the peace. Valentine, after the killing, took refuge in a house near the scene of the killing where an hour later, he was killed by a posse of Sanderson citizens.

Sheriff Anderson, reports-state, was held in high esteem by the people in that section and had a fine record as peace officer. He is survived by a wife and daughter.

Ed Valentine is well known in this section, and was a resident of Pecos for many years, and two years ago he moved to Fort Stockton, and, recently, to Sanderson.



The other contained 120 newspaper back pads, 16x24 inches. These are the larger dressings and require a much longer time in the making. 120 workers spent 30 hours during the month making 30 manytailed bandages, 70 split irrigation pads, 250 compress bandages and 120 newspaper back pads, a total of 470 bandages for May.







While no instructions have been issued defining a program, it is the opinion of the Federal Food Administration that the time has come when public eating places and meat markets should begin to approximate their respective trade in numbers. Every meat dispenser should begin to collate a list of families making regular purchases at his place of business. Families of five would be encouraged to buy not more than 10 pounds of meat a week; families of two not more than 4 pounds a week, and so forth. This is not obligatory but more and more, as the war advances and military necessity is demanding increasing quantities of meat, it would be to the advantage of every meat dispenser to know to a man the number of persons buying meat at his place of business. If at the end of each day the meat dealer will divide the number of his customers with the pounds of meat bought he will know the average purchase for the day in pounds per person; and if at the end of each week he will divide the total pounds sold by the total persons represented in the sales of the week, he will soon be in a position to guage whether or not he is meeting the Federal requirements. Such information would be invaluable, as the program is advanced to meet military need. All of this detail means additional work, but the present war is a test of men in service at the front and in the business world to survive, and



Pierre Hamp, a French medical anthority, estimates that of the 38,000,-000 people of all ages still living in France 4.000.000 must die of tuberculosis. The war will have killed about 1,000,000. This means that man with all of his inventiveness is far less efficient than Nature as a man killer. There have been over 400,000 new cases of consumption in France since the war began. This is why, despite the number of new hospitals, there is still not sufficient space available for tuberculosis cases.

The Question of Pensions.

Of course first consideration is as corded to the ever popular wounded men. Therein lies the tragedy of the consumptive soldier. With the new cases coming in daily from the trenches the consumptives are not as helpless as the wounded men. When discharged from the army the severely wounded are allowed a pension by the government. The consumptives, however, receive no allows ance unless they can prove that their illness is entirely due to their service in the army. This is not an easy thing to do, and consequently comparatively few consumptives receive govern-



to extend its aid the plight of most on these men was often pitiful. When discharged from the hospital they are given certain instructions which would eventually bring them back to health. But conditions are hard. They are usually unable to earn much and so do not get proper or even sufficient nourishment. Very often they are in no condition to look after themselves, still less to safeguard the health of others. To meet this difficulty local committees have been formed to look after the discharged patients and see that they do not pass on their disease to members of their families. The task is well nigh hopeless. Even if proper living quarters are to be had sanitation and hygiene cannot be taught overnight. They sleep in air tight rooms, kiss their bables, drink out of the same cups and use the same towels

as the rest of their families. In spite of these appalling difficulties, however, the rapid spread of the disease must-simply must-be checked. Even to attempt this would be an impossibility without the tremendous facilities and aid of the American Red Cross. No other agency could conceivably face, much less hope to ace complish, such a task.



In six months the American Red Cross supplied a million French politie with hot coffee, tea, chocolate, bouilion, at the time they needed it most-just as they were entering the communication trenches for a tour of duty under boche fire or coming out, tired and worn, after their grueling vigil. If you were dragging the tiredest pair of feet in France through the mud, and if you were greeted by a cheery voice and a steaming pint of beef tea, wouldn't it be "a grand and glorious feelin'? Oh, boy !"


