TO SYSTEMATICALL SUPERVISE USE OF WHEAT, COST $\$ 50,000,000$ <br> It is estimated that $\$ 50,000,00$ unld be required if the Nation was nacessfully placed on a ration sys tem for the handling of wheat flour cover the monthly operating expenses after the system was inaugurat ed. "For this reason," announce the the Federal Food Administrator of Texas, "we look to the -individuals for cooperation in observing the ration suggested and to the distri- butor to see that the quantities sug gested are dispensed as nearly degree suggested as possible." The placing of all manufacturers using sugar on a rationing ber asing sugar on a rationing basis has been achieved at a great expense to the Food Administration. Sugar used by the manufacturers may only be procured through the possession of a certificate issued by the State of a certificate issued by the State headquarters and the quantity is headquarters and the quantity based upon a definite schedule of al lotments. <br> The distribution of wheat flour in Texas, now that the State has adopt Texas, now that the State has adopt- ed a wheatless program, is handled alone in Victory Bread, through the licensed bakers. Homes and public eating places until the wheatless pro gram was adopted were on a 6 pound per person of flour per month.
