



# Are the Packers Profiteers?

## Plain Facts About the Meat Business.

STATISTICS TO THE STATE OF THE

The Federal Trade Commission in its recent report on war profits, stated that the five large meat packers have been profiteering and that they have a monopoly of the market.

These conclusions, if fair and just, are matters of serious concern not only to those engaged in the meat packing business but to every other citizen of our country.

The figures given on profits are misleading and the statement that the packers have a monopoly is unsupported by the facts.

The packers mentioned in the report stand ready to prove their profits reasonable and necessary.

\* \* \* \*

The meat business is one of the largest American industries. Any citizen who would familiarize himself with its details must be prepared for large totals.

The report states that the aggregate profits of four large packers were \$140,000,000 for the three war years.

This sum is compared with \$19,000,000 as the average annual profit for the three years before the war, making it appear that the war profit was \$121,000,000 greater than the pre-war profit.

This compares a three-year profit with a one-year profit—a manifestly unfair method of comparison. It is not only misleading, but the Federal Trade Commission apparently has made a mistake in the figures themselves.

\* \* \* \*

The aggregate three-year profit of \$140,000,000 was earned on sales of over four and a half billion dollars. It means about three cents on each dollar of sales—or a mere fraction of a cent per pound of product.

Packers' profits are a negligible factor in prices of live stock and meats. No other large business is conducted upon such small margins of profit.

Furthermore-and this is very important-only a small portion of

amount of working capital. The additional profit makes only a fair return on this, and as has been stated, the larger portion of the profits earned has been used to finance huge stocks of goods and to provide additions and improvements made necessary by the enormous demands of our army and navy and the Allies.

\* \* \* \*

If you are a business man you will appreciate the significance of these facts. If you are unacquainted with business, talk this matter over with some business acquaintance—with your banker, say—and ask him to compare profits of the packing industry with those of any other large industry at the present time.

\* \* \*

No evidence is offered by the Federal Trade Commission in support of the statement that the large packers have a monopoly. The Commission's own report shows the large number and importance of other packers.

The packers mentioned in the statement stand ready to prove to any fair minded person that they are in keen competition with each other, and that they have no power to manipulate prices.

If this were not true they would not dare to make this positive statement

Furthermore, government figures show that the five large packers mentioned in the report account for only about one-third of the meat business of the country.

They wish it were possible to interest you in the details of their business. Of how, for instance, they can sell dressed beef for less than the cost of the live animal, owing to the utilization of byproducts, and of the wonderful story of the methods of distribution throughout this broad land, as well as in other countries.

The five packers mentioned feel justified in co-operating with each other to the extent of together presenting this public statement.

They have been able to do a big job for your government in its time of need; they have met all war time demands promptly and completely and they are willing to trust their case to the fairmindedness of the American people with the facts before them.







TREASURY PROPOSES TAX ON ALL KINDS OF LUAURIES

Washington, July 9 .- An extensive tax on what are denominated luxuries has been proposed to the Ways and Means committee of the Treasury Department to be included as part of the eight billion dollar revenue bill, which virtually covers every piece of wearing apparel of both men and women and many of the articles of home furnishings. The plan proposes to fix a dead line in the purchase price and all above such price paid for articles would come within the range of luxuries and bear a tax, generally fixed at 20 per cent.

A man's paying \$30 for a suit of clothes would not be considered an act of extravagance, but if he were to pay \$40 there would be a tax on the extra \$10, of 20 per cent, thus making the suit net him \$42.

The dead line on men's hats and shoes is \$5 each, shirts \$2, neckties and sox and other articles of personal adornment being in their proportion with a 20 per cent tax when the dead line is crossed.

Women would no longer be able to pay more than \$10 for a hat without contributing a tax to the govern-Her gowns, street dresses, ment. cotton goods, cloaks, stockings, her shoes and the like all would mean a tax after the agreed price is exceeded, if the Treasury's idea is adopted. The same would be true of carpets, rugs, furniture and other articles for the home, the intention being to force economies as well as revenue for war purposes.

Each family would be allowed one female servant, according to the proposal, but if there were two servants or more the government would collect a tax based upon a percentage of the salaries paid. In case a family had four servants the scheme would levy a tax of 100 per cent of the salary paid the extra three persons. Automobile drivers, footmen and the like come in for tax also.
