food enters the door of his company food enters the door of his company
kitchen it is subject to the severest system of regulation, sanitation and
economy economy. Perishable articles go at
once to the huge refrigerator where a whole quarter of beef can be hung
without crowding without crowding. Potatoes, onion
and similar vegetables go to especial ly constructed bins, while canned
goods and packages are alligned in rows on the storeroom shelves. The
refrigerator is emptied once a day refrigerator is emptied once a day
and scrubbed out thoroughly with
boiling water and sor. The fioo boiling water and soap. The floo
and shelves of the storeroom are
treated likewise so the treated likewise so that a linen hand-
kerchief may be passed over either
without being soiled.
No meat is served in an army mess
