It was hoped that the increase in passenger rates recently made would have the wholesome effect of reducing unnecessary passenger traffic throughout the country. The smaller the number of passengers who travel the greater the number of locomotives and cars and the larger the amount of tract facilities that will be freed for essential troop and war material movements. Engineers, fireman and other skilled laborers will also be released for service on troop and necessary freight trains.

Among the many patriotic duties of the American public at this time is the duty to refrain from traveling unnecessarily. Every man, woman, and child who can avoid using passenger trains at this time should do so. I earnestly hope that they will do so. Not only will they liberate essential transportation facilities which are necessary for war purposes, but they will save money which they can invest in Liberty bonds and thereby help themselves as well as their country; and the fewer who travel, the more ample the passenger service

I may add that consistently with the paramount demands of the war, every possible effort is being made by the Railroad Administration to supply the largest possible amount of comfortable and prompt passen ger train service.

Canada last year imported from this country goods to the value of \$828,887,573, according to the reports of the Dominion Government. The total was much larger, for not all goods went through the customs. To this there must be added, also, the large sums paid in interest on federal provincial, municipal, industrial and private corporation loans and the expenditures of Canadian tourists. A competent observer expresses the opinion that Canada is our customer to a total of more than one billion dollars a year.

Canada's importance is further revealed by the fact that in ten months of the fiscal year 1917-18, her war exports totaled above a billion dol- ing after his cattle. war materials and \$438,904,400 the for her home at Van Horn after a value of her foodstuffs exported.







The editor believes, from experience, that every good-sized fryer raised in Pecos on feed purchased from our stores (and that is as cheap as if it had been raised at home now) will cost the owner at least seventy-five cents, or the price of three Thrift Stamps, aside from the trouble in caring for them, which usually, if not always, falls upon the wife, and thus figuring it is not hard for a sensible person to understand that when they are stolen just at the time the owner has anticipated the pleasure of popping his own tooth into this very uncommon delicacy, his ire is raised to the limit and he is ready to go gunning. There are very few in Pecos or surrounding country who would not much rather have his home broken into and his purse taken-in that event many of us would not lose as much as a good fat fryer. Boys, for the love of Mike, have a little sense and more of the fear of God in your heart, and somesympathy for your fellow man. But on the other hand, there is probably no part of Texas where farmers will produce more per acre, either in quantity or money value than those of Reeves and Ward counties will this In these counties there is much long staple cotton, which will make from one to two bales per acre. The short staple cotton will make from one-half to one and machalf restores vitality and energy by purifying and en-

present prices it can readily be seen the cotton farmers in Reeves and Ward counties are no paupers. The alfalfa raisers, and there are many acres in these two counties, have made fine crops-many of them having already cut four crops at one ton or more per acre per cutting. Alfalfa hay has sold for not less than \$22 per ton this year and is now bringing \$27 per ton in the field. Those who have raised seed have made even greater returns. The seed crop will average 500 pounds per acre and seed is now selling at 16 cents per pound, which makes the neat sum of \$80 for the seed. The straw is worth \$20, making a total of \$100 per acre. Besides this, alfalfa seed growers will get at least two cuttings of hay. At present prices this will bring at least \$54, thus bringing the seed growers the neat sum of \$134 per acre.

We in Reeves county have suffered greatly from the drouth, but none have starved yet on account thereof and so far as The Enterprise knows none have left the country on account of the drouth except a very few stockmen who took their cattle to greener pastures, and will return just as soon as conditions are more favorable-in fact, when their stock have been disposed of or their leases ex-

To put Reeves and Ward counties, and for that matter many other West Texas counties in the same class with other counties whose population has been materially decreased by the unprecedented drouth and consequent depleted purses of the people is doing us a rank injustice and the big dailies should in such articles designate the territory to which they re-

Recently private information has been asked for from eastern sections of the United States as to financial conditions effecting business because of drouth in West Texas, stating the conditions were noted from newspaper reports. This shows conclusively that by designating the whole of West Texas as being absolutely ruined or wrecked does a great injustice to those parts which as a matter of fact are in practically as good condition as any other portion of the

In order to give the public an idea of the value of the cotton crop in this country the case of Chas. Haughton, who owns a farm across the Pecos is cited. Mr. Haughton this year rented his 150 acres on the halves which was put in long staple cotton. This cotton, although he was short of water, and when other short staple crops were suffering greatly, his crop continued to grow and put on bolls.

Mr. Haughton only gets half of the crop, or the product of 75 acres. In town this week he informed the editor of The Enterprise that his cotton was breast high to him (and he is a full six-footer) and loaded with grown bolls and many limbs were weighted to the ground. 

The public should understand that

such as those in stock yards, and the operation of packing plants in foreign countries. Profits in this class are not limited.

Total profits for all departments together in 1918 will probably be between three and four per cent on an increased volume of sales.

The restrictions absolutely guarantee a reasonable relation between live stock prices and wholesale meat prices, because the packer's profit cannot possibly average more than a fraction of a cent per pound of product.

Since the profits on meat (Class 1) are running only about 2 cents on each dollar of sales, we have to depend on the profits from soap, glue, fertilizer (Class 2, also limited) and other departments, (Class 3) to obtain reasonable earnings on capital.

Swift & Company is conducting its business so as to come within these limitations.
