The official call for the payment of War Savings Stamp Pledges due on or before November 30 has been issued by the Government. All persons who have pledged themselves to buy War Savings Stamps are advised that the November portion of their pledge is payable at once, and that the Government desires the December portion paid now if possible. Wherever pos sible a reminder card calling atten tion to this fact will be sent to pledged persons at the direction of the Government, but the non-receipt of a reminder card does not indicate that the pledge is not due and that the Government is not expecting prompt payment

The signing of the armistice does not affect the validity of War Savings Stamp Pledges. These pledges, it is pointed out, are binding obligations made by the individual, they bear his name and are held for payment by authorized agents of the United States Treasury Department.





W. D. CASEY JR., DIES AT **RANCH OF PNEUMONIA**

W. D. Casey, Jr., son of W. D. Casey, pioneer Texas cowman, who is one of the wealthiest ranch owners in West Texas, died yesterday at Guadaloupe Mountain ranch, after a brief illness of pneumonia. The young man was 18 years old, and was manager and supervisor to a large extent, of his father's cattle interests, which comprised three large ranches.

Young Casey was born at Pecos, Reeves county, January 2, 1900 and spent, his entire life in Texas. He ittended the Peacock Military Acalemy at San Antonio for several cars and afterward high school at Paso.

He was one of the most prominent tembers of the El Paso high school [tudent body during his three years in that institution. One of the best linemen the school ever had on its football team, Casey was the unanimous choice as team captain during the 1917 season. Through his aggressive style of play on the grid, he earned the title of "Tear-em-up." He was an active member of the Forum debating club and president for a term, being one of the school's best



EOYS AND GIRLS MAKE RABBIT RAISING PAY

In Utah many boy and girl members of clubs are going into the rabbit-raising business, finding it most profitable, according to word received by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. They have found that it costs about 25 cents to raise a rabbit to the age of three months, and that at that time it may be marketed at 35 or 40 cents a pound. The pelts bring from 15 to 75 cents, depending or the kind of rabbit and its size. Compared with poultry raising, rabbits, in Utah, have proved more economical, as rabbits are more hardy and need no expensive feed. For example, one club boy reports that he feeds only oats, cabbage and water. In some places in the State the demand exceeds the supply. Hotels and restaurants which serve rabbits as often as they do chicken, are the chief buyers. The Bureau of Biological Survey and the Bureau of Markets are co-operating actively in developing interest in the production and marketing of domesticated abbits and in standardizing methods of handling these animals and the wild rabbits which are killed for sport or to protect crops from their depredations.



Whether this particular list is or is not correct, we all know individual cases in which such results have occurred. If the facts concerning all the fortunes made in oil could be tabulated, we venture to assert that in 99 out of 100 cases the fortune was made by one who lived at a place remote from the actual development.



When Mr. David T. A clipping from a Fort Worth paper under date of December 1, 1918, under the subject of wild cat operations in the vicinity of San Angelo:

"As yet no boom of any kind has developed, unless the first rush to Ballinger when the Russel well was brought in might be termed as such, yet San Angelo is filled with oil men daily and big trucks carrying heavy stems, casings and other materials to oil camps are a frequent sight on the street."

San Angelo is about 150 miles east of Pecos and Ballinger is 40 miles from San Angelo.

It is unfortunately true that the people living in the immediate vicinity of most of the large oil producing fields have enjoyed proportionately small profits from the development. We can readily believe that the earth may be rich in mineral deposits 300 or 3000 miles from us, but it is hard to believe that the old dirt the cows have roamed over since the time of the Indians can contain riches. of a geologist to make an exhaustive examination of the territory, and Mr. Hugh H. Tucker of Dallas, was engaged for this purpose.
