a committee had been out for short time Tuesday and secured the names of ninety-two for membership in the organization and a good portion of these were in attendance.

After considerable discussion the organization was proceeded with and Judge J. A. Drane elected president, T. Y. Casey vice-president, and J. G. Love treasurer. The directors, other than the officers named above were then selected as follows: T. B. Pruett, Harry Anderson, R. S. Johnson, Dr. Jim Camp, M. W. Collie, O. T. Norwood and F. W. Johnson.

Heads of committees for the different departments were named by the president and these given instructions to get together and select for each head two others to assist in their work. A committee was also selected to draft a constitution and by-laws.

The executive in obeyance to an order of the club, which, by the way, named "The Chamber of Commerce of Pecos," met in the office of Judge J. A. Drane Wednesday morning to discuss the matter of a secretary, and it was decided to employ a male stenographer for the present, whose duty it will be, in addition to the stenographic work, which will be handled principally by the president and vicepresident, to collect the dues, which will be only one dollar per month per member for the present.

American Dead Will

ALL BODIES OF SOLDIERS AND CIVILIANS DYING IN EUROPE WILL BE REMOVED HERE AT

GOVERNMENT EXPENSE

Bodies of soldiers and civilian employes of the United States Government now buried in France will be brought back to the United States at license, otherwise a heavy penalty asked. Government expense except where specific requests are made to the Adjutant General to have the bodies remain there.

The following announcement was made last week by acting Adjutant General J. C. Ashburn:

"It cannot be stated now when the work of transfer will start," he said, "as it must be deferred until the conditions, including that of transportation, warrant the undertaking. Due notice will be given through the public press.

"It is not deemed advisable to grant the requests for friends, relatives or undertakers to go to France to superintend the preparation and shipment of the bodies, or accompany the bodies to the United States.

"Arrangements have been made with the French government for the use of certain sections of the country as military cemeteries, and organizations known as Grave Registration Units have been formed, whose duty it is to look after burials, care of the cemeteries and the preservation of identification records, so there will be no question as to the identity when the time comes for the transfer of the remains to the United States.

MODIFY HOMESTEAD LAY THAT FARMERS OF TEXAS ENJOY PRIVILEGES AS IN OTHER STATES

At a conference held at Houston the 9th of this month, of those ho favored such modification of the resent homestead law as will permit he farmers of this State to enjoy e same benefits as is now accorded he farmers of every other state in e Union, of obtaining loans upon aral homesteads, at a low rate of inerest and with easy payments upon e principal, the undersigned were ppointed a committee to issue an ddress to the public setting forth he character of amendment that is eemed necessary to accomplish the desired and the reasons why such endment should be submitted by e Legislature and adopted by the people of the State.

We believe that the rural homestead provision of our present constitution should be so amended as to provide that the owner thereof, when joined by his wife, could execute a valid lien thereon to secure the payment of a loan, the proceeds of which

Such loan should be restricted to a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent and should be made upon the amortization plan over a period of at least twenty years, with the right of prepayment given the borrower after

In order to further safeguard the loans made upon such homesteads, it should be provided that before the owner thereof could obtain a loan thereon, he should be required to execute an affidavit and file the same of record in the county in which the land is situated, stating the amount of the loan desired and that he will use the proceeds thereof for one or all of the above-named purposes.

The adoption of an amendment along the lines above suggested is in our judgment imperatively necessary in order to enable our farmers to bring about the real development of our splendid agricultural resources.

At the time of the adoption of the present constitution in 1876 money for development purposes could only be obtained at a very high rate of interest and upon short time. Now conditions have changed and there is an unlimited supply of capital' for our farmers at a low rate of interest and upon such easy terms that no active, industrious farmer can fail to meet the payments required.
