| Sold Under New Law $\qquad$ <br> NEW MEASURE IS SIGNED ALL UNSOLD SCRAP LAND TO BE OFFERED ACCORDING TO LAND COMMISSIONER <br> Austin, March 21.-Land Commis sioner J. T. Robison was asked for a statement of mineral laws passed by the recently adjourned session of the Legislature. In replv he said: <br> "In the first place there was no legislation affecting minerals in any respect that had not already been decided by the Supreme Court. Under the decision in the Green case, the State nor any of its institutions have any interest in any minerals that may be in any land that was sold or otherwise disposed of by the State prior to September 1, 1895, but minerals, are reserved in all public lands sold since that date, in case the land was classed mineral. <br> "The Legislature enacted a new land law, which if approved by the Governor, will make available all the unsold scrap land and other surveys, without condition of settlement but it will not be for sale until September 1. Under the Act those desiring to purchase scrap land will direct their inquiries to the Land Office first, instead of to the county surveyors. <br> "There is now much activity in the mineral land west of the Pecos River. Some wells are being drilled there, and geologists seemed agreed that it is entirely possible that a large oil field may be found. <br> "Another bill looking to the development of the metallic minerals was passed. It is modeled largely after the United States mining laws. <br> "Since the decision in the Green case the way is open for some wholesome measures from the State, and in doing so, the owner of the soil can be considered and dealt with fairly at the special session, if that subject is submitted. <br> 'In this connection I may add that I have concluded not to cancel any mineral permits now outstanding on the coast, until after the special session, for the reason that I very much desire to try to get the method of filing changed, so as to avoid those unseemly scrambles for the first place | at the county clerk's office, also to have the areas on. the coast, which are purely State property, and not encumbered with any individual ownership of the soil, sold for oil and gas purposes to the one who will pay the most for it." <br> NOTICE OF ELECTION <br> An election will be held in the town of Pecos City on Tuesday, April 7th, 1919, for the election of two aldermen to serve for two years. <br> Said election to be conducted in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas.
