

WAR DEPARTMENT SAYS THAT MANY CERTIFICATES ARE UN. DELIVERED FOR VARIOUS REASONS

From the Publicity Department of Camp Travis, Texas, come the statement that announcement has been made by the War Risk Insurance Bureau that a large number of insurance certificates remain undelivered, due to insufficient or no address having been given in some of the cases, while in many others the address of the beneficiaries have

In view of the fact that arrangedischarged soldiers may perpetuate this form of insurance, the matter should have the immediate attention of the men interested.

All officers and enlisted men, and all discharged soldiers whose insurance certificates have not been received either by themselves or by their beneficiaries should write the Insurance Division, Bureau of War Risk Insurance, Treasury Deing the following:

Full name: rank and organization at the time of application for insurance; Army serial number: present address; name and address of the beneficiary if it is desired that the certificate be sent to the beneficiary: if not desired that certificate be sent to the beneficiary instructions to be given as to its disposition.

Certificates will in no case be sent for file to the Adjutant General of the Army.



War Work of Congress is Reviewed

HISTORY OF THE THREE MOST EVENTFUL SESSIONS IS SUM-MARIZED IN FINAL COM-PENDIUM

Washington, March 23.-Accomplisments of the Sixty-fifth or War Congress are officially reviewed in compendium of the House of Representatives appearing to day. Unfinished business in the Congress, which necessarily must be considered in the legislative program of the new Congress soon to convene, also is collated in the publication, which was edited by W. Ray Loomis, an official of the House.

Constituting as it does, a statistical retrospection of the accomplishments of the Sixty-fifth Congress, Mr. Loomis says in a foreword of the compendium, "the final issue of the monthly compendium throws the searchlight on the transactions of three sessions of unparalleled events in the history of that body. When the Congress met in April, 1917, the country was at peace. In the interim a war had been declared, a war had been won and a war had been ended. So this issue carries legislative history of a character that perhaps never again will be duplicated, both as to the amount of money authorized to be expended and as to presiding officer. the extent of the revolutionizing of the social and business lives of the people of the Nation."
